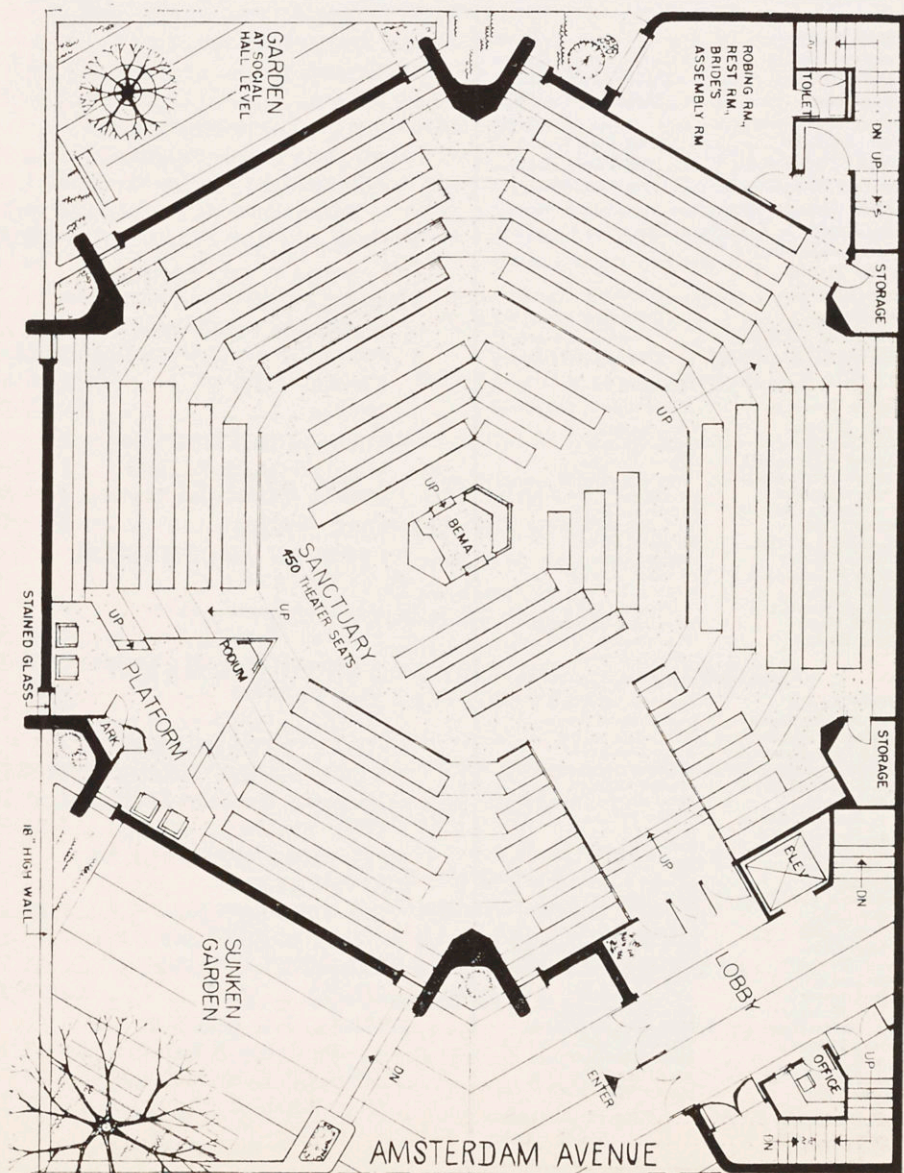

From the Rabbi's Desk...

The main miracle of Chanukah, according to our Sages, is the fact that a small cruse of oil — sufficient to kindle the menorah for one day — proved able to keep the menorah enkindled for eight days to enable new oil to be obtained. The logical question asked annually in the Yeshivot to test the intellect of the student is: if the cruse was initially sufficient for one day, the miracle lasted in reality only for seven days: Hence we should kindle the menorah in recognition of the miracle for seven days rather than for eight as tradition demands.

Many are the suggested answers, but I believe one particular response is most apropos. The miracle includes the first day as well, because logic would have dictated that — since the oil could only last one day, and eight days were required to produce pure oil — they wait for the new oil before kindling the menorah. Nevertheless, the higher wisdom of the heart urged that they light whatever oil they had, that they do whatever it was possible for them to do, that they take the first step of courage and commitment, and leave the rest to God. The first light is kindled on Chanukah in tribute to those who began, despite the fact that the outcome was at best a questionable one.

LSS initiated regular Sabbath Services on Shabbat Chanukah only five years ago. The idea of a Traditional House of Prayer and Torah Study in a new area almost entirely without traditional Jews seemed at best a naively optimistic dream. There were significant individuals who stepped forward to kindle the light, however, and, in the words of our Sages, "those who come to purify are helped from above." One spark ignited the other, and it was a result of those who demonstrated their faith by concrete gifts that our building is nearing completion on 69th Street and Amsterdam Avenue.

But as strange as it may seem, I still hear people in the neighborhood declaring: "When the new Synagogue is in use, I shall become a member and give my contribution." I urge you not to wait. Join the many who have already come forward, and identify with the symbol of the first Chanukah light by taking a first step of dedication and commitment.

Chanukah Law and Lore

1. *Chanukah* means Rededication, for it was on the twenty-fifth of Kislev that the Jews rededicated their Temple which had been defiled by the Greek-Syrians. After a miraculous battle against overwhelming odds which incited by devastating anti-Jewish decrees, the Maccabees led the Jews to a victorious rekindling of the Menorah in the Holy Temple.
2. *The Kindling of the Menorah.* In thanksgiving and commemoration, we kindle one candle on the first night of Chanukah (Thursday Evening, Dec. 4) and add a candle each night until we have eight lit candles on the last night of the holiday (Thursday Evening, December 11). The candles are placed in the Menorah from left and are kindled from left to right. The count does not include the *shamash*, the candle which lights the others.
3. It is preferable to place the Menorah on the window-sill in order to "publicize the miracle." One should endeavor to kindle the Chanukah lights at the time of the coming out of the stars, but many still kindle them as long as there are people walking in the street or awake in the household. On Friday evening, however, one must kindle the Chanukah lights *before* the Sabbath candles, and should use candles which are large enough to burn for thirty minutes after the coming out of the stars.
4. Before Kindling the Chanukah Candles, the following blessings are recited:
Baruch Ata Ado-nay, Elo-henu Melech Ha Olam, Asher Kidshanu Bemitzvotav Vetsivanu Lehadlik Ner Shel Chanukah.
Baruch Ata Ado-nay, Elo-heyinu Melech Ha Olam, She-asa Nissim La Avotenu Ba Yamim Ha-hem Ba Zman Ha Zeh.
 Blessed art Thou, O Lord our God, King of the Universe, who has sanctified us with Thy commandments and has commanded us to Kindle the Chanukah Lights.
 Blessed art Thou, O Lord our God, King of the Universe, who has performed miracles for our fathers in those days at this time.
 On the first night only we recite:
Baruch Ata Ado-nay, Elo-henu Melech Ha Olam, She hechyanu Ve kimanu Ve higianu La Zman Ha Zeh.
 Blessed art Thou, O Lord our God, King of the Universe, who has enabled us to live and reach this time of celebration.
5. *Latkes.* There is an interesting legend that Judith killed a Greek general after putting him to sleep with the aid of warm milk and latkes. Enjoy the latkes, but don't overeat!
6. *Dreidel.* The proverbial top goes round and round, and so does the destiny of the Jewish people. Children and adults alike have all spun the dreidel to the words: *Nes Gadol Haya Sham*, a great Miracle happened there. This game inaugurated the acceptance of light gambling only on Chanukah.

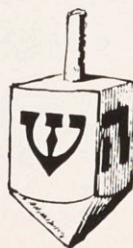

The problems and difficulties which were encountered have been resolved, and those yet to accrue will be determined by our able Building Chairman, Mr. David Pollins, and his committee.

Foremost in the conception of the building was the decision that first consideration must be given to those requirements necessary for the continuation and development of the programs we have already launched. Incorporated in this is the extension of facilities for services, educational and cultural programs for every age group and various social activities. We have done very well in planning and in the construction of these essential accommodations. Qualifying Jewish organizations will have the use of meeting and assembly rooms in this central area of our city.

Lincoln Center is the hub of culture in New York. It is fitting that our edifice, dedicated to living Judaism, be recognized as an important component of this complex. Care had to be taken so that no conflict exist in the aesthetic design or in the selection and use of materials. Architecturally, this accomplishment is a tribute to those responsible.

One major problem now is that of funds. Support must be forthcoming so that we may continue meeting commitments. Unless we meet these challenges progress will be seriously impeded. It was the determination of our congregants that first prompted initiation of the building program. Unfortunately, the burden has thus far been carried by but a portion of our total membership. We need and must have the help of all. With such dedication and G-d willing we will be justly proud of our results.

A Tour Through The Second Floor...

What woman would not 'kvell' over 26 feet of storage space in her kitchen?

What Talmud Torah wouldn't like a chapel easily converted to three separate rooms to supplement its permanent classrooms?

And what office staff would turn down a closed circuit TV system keeping vigil over the Synagogue entrance during sparsely populated hours?

These and countless other unique and aesthetic features will be an integral part of the second floor of our new Synagogue with each member's help and support.

Sometime around Pesach, Im Yirtzeh Hashem, you may take a tour of the finished product. The following is what you will witness:

After exiting the automatically programmed Shabbat elevator, we step into the vestibule adjacent to the Synagogue Office with staff capacity for 5 clericals; beyond is the principal's office.

A spacious milch-dik kitchen with all necessary major appliances will be accompanied by an auxiliary kitchen unit for the use of sponsored functions by outside organizations.

Two classrooms, 397 sq. feet each, separated by the chapel, will hold 20-30 desks. Modern green blackboards will be installed enhancing readability, complimented by an extensive display area. Each classroom will have a stained glass window, consistent with the building design.

Whoever heard of a classroom without bells? — ours will have chimes via a timer controlled speaker system. The same system will also serve as a public address unit.

The chapel, 1903 sq. ft., almost triple our present area, will have a potential seating capacity for close to 300. It will be convertible to a nursery, kiddush room, study hall, for daily services and three separate classrooms through the manipulation of folding partitions.

The Rabbi's Office, facing West, has a 12 foot panoramic picture window, providing a view of the Hudson River. Its beauty will be enhanced with hard wood bookshelves, cabinets and carpeting.

Extensive storage space will be provided, as well as lavatory facilities and central heating and air-conditioning throughout.

Tile will cover all floors excepting the chapel of parquet and the Rabbi's carpeted study.
