Since Aidel wasn't pregnant, and thank G-d neither of us was in *aveilut* (mourning), and we had exhausted every other acceptable excuse — Aidel and I suddenly came to the stark realization that there was no gracious way out of serving as the guests of honor at the annual Lincoln Square Synagogue dinner!

As someone who is personally uncomfortable about accepting gifts and awkward about receiving compliments, I found myself forced, on a most intimate existential level, to reconcile my personal feelings with the role we were about to play for the next few months.

The reconciliation was not as difficult as I had thought. The fact is that no other synagogue is doing what Lincoln Square Synagogue does. No other synagogue has accomplished what Lincoln Square Synagogue has accomplished, and all of this on a relatively modest budget. Despite the fact that we are a central resource for Jews throughout the Metropolitan area, we receive no funding from the local philanthropic organizations. Never mind the fact that our programs are being emulated nationally and internationally, we receive no financial support from national Jewish charities.

After all, what does monies raised through the dinner journal mean? More homes koshered, more Jews studying Torah, fewer Jews joining cults, another alienated Jew returning to tradition, another family being strengthened by love of G-d and Jewish observances, another young person contemplating intermarriage learning to appreciate his/her own heritage, another already-committed-Jew continuing to grow in commitment.

Notwithstanding the fact that Aidel and I are uncomfortable in the role of guests of honor at the Lincoln Square Synagogue dinner, we feel that our discomfort is a small price to pay for the privilege of serving as a means of raising funds for the noble work of our synagogue.
