

L.S.S. TO HOLD 3RD ANNUAL AUCTION

On Saturday evening, February 23, the New York auction spotlight will switch from Sotheby's and Christie's to our own Lincoln Square Synagogue for the third annual L.S.S. Goods and Services Auction.

The auction will take place in the Sanctuary and co-chairmen Rose and Simeon Schreiber are hoping that the seats and aisles will be as filled that night as they are Shabbat morning. "We hope to raise at least \$30,000 to help the Synagogue reach its budget goal," Mrs. Schreiber noted, "but this can only be accomplished with a large turnout of people actively bidding."

Among the types of services that have been donated are a cornucopia of party preparation and cooking help, home repair and decorating assistance, tutoring, party entertainment, vacation homes, and personal improvement opportunities. There will also be a number of special "events" in private homes to which a limited number of tickets will be auctioned.

Among those featured at these events will be New York City Council President Carol Bellamy, Rabbi Saul Berman, Rabbi Shlomo Riskin, Cantor Sherwood Goffin and a panel of heavyweights in the world of finance.

The catalogue is being organized by Co-chairmen Carol Gross, Karen Guggenheim, Gale Spira and Arlene Stone. Among the lots to be auctioned are: a series of private "Voice, Diction, Public Speaking and Performing Lessons" offered by WOR Anchorwoman Sara Lee Kessler; A week in a three bedroom condominium at the La Costa Spa in San Diego, California; A Shabbat as the guest of Rabbi and Mrs. Riskin in Efrat (transportation not included); A pair of 'house' seats to the New York City Ballet preceded by dinner at Benjamin of Tudela; A Pac Man arcade machine; a day of beauty and skin care services at the clinic of noted dermatologist Dr. Jonathan Zizmor; "Take Them Out to the Ballgame:" Mike Edelhart, Bob Ehrlich and Roy Stern will take up to 20 7-12 year olds to a baseball game and feed them!; a week at a ski condominium in Sugarbush, Vermont; a backstage look at the T.V. show

"Kate and Allie;" and a host of apparel and jewelry items.

In addition to being a major fundraising event, the auction has been planned, according to co-chairman Arlene Chertoff, as a "wonderful social evening." The program will begin at 7:30 with a viewing of the lots and silent auction items and a champagne reception. The auction, which has been planned to take no more than two hours, will be held upstairs at 8:30. It will be followed by a dessert buffet.

Once again, the auctioneering crew will be led by the urbane David Olivestone. According to Chaya Gorsetman, who is also serving as a co-chairman of the event, the auction will provide an opportunity for the entire L.S.S. community to share in a fun-filled social evening "so come, and urge your friends to join you."

The admission charge for the evening has been set at \$10.00 per person to cover the cost of the food. For reservations please contact the Synagogue office immediately. Patrons and sponsors for the evening are being solicited at \$50, and \$100 respectively to defray the additional costs of mounting the event. These persons will be acknowledged in the program. If available, tickets will be sold at the door.

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK. . .

As I write this message, a remarkable moment in modern Jewish history may be coming to a premature halt. It has been a proud time these past few weeks to see the entire world Jewish community united in the effort to rescue Ethiopian Jewry. The quiet but effective leadership of Israel in coordinating a major international airlift, the commitment of UJA-Federation in spearheading the fundraising drive necessary and the extraordinary responsiveness of members of our own and other communities in truly sacrificial giving for this great Mitzvah — for all this we have reason to be proud of Jewry and thankful to God.

Our additional hopes must focus on two elements. First, that the hiatus in this process of Pidyon Shevuyim (Redemption of captives) be brief and that the evacuation may be completed not only for those currently in refugee camps but also for those Jews still in Ethiopia. Secondly, our hopes and energies must be invested in the attempt to assure that the religious identity — preserved at such great cost while this community was Falasha (strangers) in Ethiopia, not be lost to secularism in the freedom of Israel.

But a further vital issue is raised for us in this context. No one has, but someone could easily raise a question which I am certain many have felt: "Aren't the dimensions of Jewish responsibility just too vast, too overwhelming? Help Israel survive, save Soviet Jewry, rescue Ethiopian Jewry, prevent intermarriage and assimilation, support Yeshivot and Day Schools, work for the Synagogue, join the Chevra Kaddisha, go to the hospital with the Bikur Cholim committee, invite guests home for Shabbat meals, be responsive to the

needs of singles and single parents, help feed the hungry and support the poor, go to daily minyan, learn Torah every day — a seemingly endless list to be achieved while working for a living and trying to maintain healthy loving relationships with family and friends. Isn't this just too much responsibility and too much guilt to put on one person?!"

The answer to the question is: Yes it is too much for one person — but it is not too much for a Jewish community. No one person need feel guilty over not solving all the problems which front world Jewry and all of humanity. Different responsibilities are even appropriate for different stages of life. Married persons with children should spend more time on obligations which can be fulfilled by and within the family unit such as welcoming guests and study of Torah, establishing priorities for family charity and bringing food to shut-ins. By contrast, singles of all ages should appropriately spend more of their time in activities such as visiting the sick and attending daily minyan, in giving of their time to religious institutions and more of their income to charity.

There is no simple formula for the selection of appropriate involvements. Too much depends on life circumstances and on personal predilections. But as clear as it is that no one has the right to deny all responsibilities of this sort, it is equally as clear that by acting as a community — by coordinating our energies and our planning, we can achieve infinitely more than any one individual possibly could. By acting as a community we can each take pride in what all of us together contribute to the strengthening of Torah and to the survival of the Jewish people.

L.S.S. KEHILLAH CONTRIBUTION BILLED OUT

The religious needs of the L.S.S. community are serviced not only by the synagogue, but also by several local and national organizations.

Every year we ask our members to make a voluntary contribution of \$30 to the Kehila fund. This form of tzedakah, which is not a part of your membership dues, helps support such establishments as the Mikvah, the Eruv, the Midtown Board of Kashruth, our local yeshivas — Manhattan Day School and Chofetz Chaim as well as the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations.

We hope your positive response to this request will not lessen, in any way, the support you may otherwise give these establishments.

One service of LSS which we pray may be unnecessary is that of the Chevra Kadisha. To insure the provision of a proper burial service, we urge our members to immediately contact the Synagogue office, or any of those listed below.

In the interim, Mr. Joselit advised the boards that LSS is continuing its efforts to obtain the former bank building and the land on which it stands.

West Siders become integrated into the community more quickly and begin to feel like they belong to the LSS family.

The third category of guest that Hospitality places is the out-of-towner who finds him or herself in New York over Shabbat while here on a business trip or vacation. As someone who travels fairly frequently on business, I can truly appreciate the reassuring feeling of knowing that when I'm alone in a strange city, I can make a call to the local shul and obtain a place to sleep and Shabbat meals so that I don't have to stay alone in my hotel room. As a host or hostess you have the chance to change the image of the "cold, unfriendly New Yorker" in some out-of-towner's mind by showing that our LSS community opens itself up to accommodate these visitors.

Finally, we also place people who live outside the West Side area. These are people who have heard so much about LSS that they want an opportunity to spend a Shabbat here to see what the shul has to offer; or who already know about LSS and wish to avail themselves of the shiurim or minyanim that are available each Shabbat. By spending a Shabbat with an LSS member they see that our shul "practices what it preaches."

A TRIBUTE TO... HILLEL GROSS

Dear Reader:

This issue should reach you before Purim, L.S.S.'s office staff and Mr. Joselit's censoring notwithstanding. The following article is offered in the spirit of Purim to counter the rumors that ECHOD is turning into a staid, establishment-like, well edited and informative bulletin, so different from those of the previous three years. So return with us to those thrilling days of yesteryear. . .

Hillel Gross, former editor of the ECHOD, has always been available for comment on any issue important to L.S.S. His treatises on the Opera Buffa as a model for the synagogue as well as his comments on Verdi's non-approach to Halachah and his shrewd analysis of "The Daf Yomi as a Cruel Mistress" are world-reknown non-classics. The finely etched portraits of shul notables in his "I Call On. . ." articles has made an impression upon all. However, Hillel Gross has not received the recognition, the kudos his notorious years as ECHOD editor earned him. This article will serve as a tribute to Hillel Gross — editor, politico, and commentator.

Legends about Hilly at L.S.S., of his political prowess and sharp understanding of rabbinical controversy (and the need to create it). Hilly honed his political skills when he served as campaign manager for Norman Mailer's race for mayor. Hilly has championed other well-known politicians such as George McGovern in his campaign for the presidency in 1972. It is even rumored that Hilly is responsible for the

governorship of Mario Cuomo, simply through an off the cuff remark made by Hilly in a note when he was campaign manager for Howard Samuels for Governor in 1974. Fortunately for some of us at L.S.S., if any of these candidates would have won, we never would've had Hilly as Editor.

At L.S.S., Hilly managed to stay in the good graces of President and ex-school chum Fred Ehrman, even though his articles in ECHOD managed to ruffle a few feathers. Hilly demonstrated diplomatic flair as he communicated the various grievances of one warring faction to the other, of one rabbi to another. And, true to political form, Hilly campaigned vigorously for his choice of candidates for the new roster of shul officers.

For all of Hilly's political entrepreneurship, he is best known as the risk-taking former editor of ECHOD. Hilly was not afraid to lampoon presidents, officers or chairpersons, to challenge rabbis on issues from Halacha to protocol — which left the congregation breathless but not always speechless. Hilly brought artistic license to new bounds on the ECHOD and his imagination was limitless in almost any situation. Even as a child he awed his classmates with his skill as a raconteur, when he presented an impromptu book report in class on a book he'd never read. His children will attest to Hilly's convincing style, when he instilled fear in their hearts for their brother Pesach on a trip to Philadelphia to view the Liberty Bell. Hilly

had confided to them while still on the road, that their brother Pesach had accidentally cracked the Liberty Bell on a previous trip to Philadelphia. When on tour in Philadelphia, the girls were particularly on edge when the tour guide pointed to the crack on the Liberty Bell and announced that "no one knows how it got there."

Hilly's imagination was at work when he told a small girl, a daughter of a close friend that he was the only religious Jew on the New York Mets baseball team. Imagine the girl's disappointment, along with that of her friends, when she scanned the line-up of a Met game and found no "Hillel Gross?"

Perhaps the most infamous examples of Hilly's skill at unleashed creativity were his "Letters to the Editor." After years of *Panic Stricken, Frustrated and Confused Activists* as well as E.M. what kind of reaction could Hilly expect to the letter in ECHOD that campaigned for the next Annual Dinner honoree to be none other than Hillel Gross?

Hillel Gross, who in earlier days was ready to "tanst oif alleh chassenehs" is now in quiet retirement. His wife Felise, is glad, "Thank God there is nothing by him in print, now that the children are reaching marriageable age." Hilly himself has found retirement to his liking, "I've almost forgotten what it's like to talk to someone without ulterior motives." But Hillel Gross still remains sharp-witted, and will critique anyone and anything at L.S.S. anytime he feels its needed.
