MITZVAH SUPERMARKET AT L.S.S.....GREAT SUCCESS!

Curious eyes peeked into the bank at 9:00 A.M., Sunday, November 23rd, at which point we were still setting up last minute exhibits and getting things ready for the opening of our Mitzvah Supermarket. The whole day people were coming in and out; some made reservations but many were from off the street who saw through the glass windows of the annex the hustle-bustle of the Mitzvah Supermarket. Parents came with wide-eyed children to watch the soferim examine the tefillin and mezuzot to see if the letters were all intact. Children brought their jackets and coats to be checked for shatnes and the checkers patiently explained the procedure to anyone who was interested.

Thank you to all who participated in the Mitzvah Supermarket. There were over 400 people who came to have various articles checked, see exhibits, films, have utensils kashered and toveled. Many deposited shaymote and kashrut questions.

92 articles were checked for shatnes. 250 mezuzot were checked and 70 pair of tefillin. 66% of the tefillin that were checked were found to be kosher.

Special thanks to the LSS staff members who participated. It could not have happened without your support and presence. Thank you to all the volunteers who made this day possible.

It is my hope that through the ritual mitzvot performed we will merit and reach a higher level of spiritual awareness.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Day by Day at L.S.S. (A Selective View)

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 8th. Over 250 members braved the rain to attend our General Membership meeting and Melave Malka. The meeting was spirited and informative and gave many of us the opportunity to offer suggestions and be better informed about the governance of Lincoln Square Synagogue. After the meeting, tribute was paid to Morris and Debra Tiefenbrunn, long-time pillars of this Shul, who are moving to Efrat. Rabbi Riskin spoke warmly about his old friends and commented on the fact that Morris Tiefenbrunn's life encompasses the full circle of Jewish life in the twentieth century: from Poland to America and now to Israel. Moving tributes to the Tiefenbrunnns were also paid by Edith Landau and Molly Pollack and Esther Lopian presented them with a Mezuzah for their new home on behalf of the membership. Following the meeting, dessert was served in the ballroom accompanied by music and dancing.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 9th. Over 100 people attended a lecture by Dr. Jenna Weissman Joselit entitled "Menus, Mikveh and the Modern Jewish Woman." The lecture was sponsored by the L.S.S. Women's Service and, as usual, Jenna was informative and insightful as she shared with us her research into early twentieth century American Jewish communal life.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 10th. I knew that Lincoln Square Synagogue was slated to be featured in this week's issue of New York Magazine, but I wasn't prepared, as I approached a mid-town newsstand to see my friends Karen and David Eisner staring at me from the cover. Anyone associated with our Shul couldn't help but be proud of the extremely flattering portrait of our outreach work. A future issue of Echad will feature reactions to the article.

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 11th. This evening featured this year's second meeting of our Boards of Trustees and Governors. At the suggestion of trustee Molly Pollack, each meeting this year will feature a different department head who, along with the Rabbi, will familiarize the boards with the work they are doing, the programs they are running, and their budgetary implications. This evening we heard from Suri Kasirer who heads our outreach activities and directs the Feldman Hebrew School and the Stern Hebrew High School. Following Suri's presentation, Governor Ben Belfer reported on the Yom Kippur Maintenance campaign, which reached its goal of \$190,000. Thanks were extended to Ben and his co-chairman Fred Gorsetman by Treasurer David Stone who indicated that this was the first crucial step in our goal of achieving a balanced budget this year. David concluded his report by explaining some of the implications for charitable contributions in the new Tax Bill, and urging anyone who wishes to pre-pay contributions or to donate appreciated property of any type to the synagogue to contact him or Rabbi Martin Katz.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 12th. The Wednesday Night Lecture. The Shul was packed to the rafters to hear a debate between Rabbi Riskin and Rabbi Beryl Wein of Monsey, New York on the topic "Should Orthodox leadership in the diaspora go on Aliyah?" Obviously, Rabbi Riskin voted with his feet on this issue, but the evening was filled with the searing illumination that comes when people look deep within themselves and honestly report on what they have found. Both Rabbis spoke of the need for strong, capable leadership to remain in the diaspora, but Rabbi Riskin summed up by saying that the topic he was often asked to discuss in speaking engagements in this country was "Will the Jews Survive?" In Israel, he noted, he is most often asked to speak on "Are we in the Age of Redemption?"

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 13th. Today was the funeral of one of Lincoln Square Synagogue's earliest and most enthusiastic supporters, Mrs. Joseph (Bess) Shapiro. Appropriately, all of our rabbis and Cantor Goffin took part in the service which was conducted in our Sanctuary. Mrs. Shapiro and her family endowed the Joseph Shapiro Institute and her funeral reminded me of a class where each speaker, and especially Mrs. Shapiro's grandson Rabbi Mordechai Feuerstein, instructed us on how her life was almost a textbook example of the art of helping others.

In Case of Emergency.....

Every congregant should know the building's emergency evacuation procedures. Accordingly, you are reminded of the following:

MAIN SANCTUARY: A) People in top three (3) rows of womens' section move to center aisle and out rear door. Go down stairs and exit building. Turn left and continue until across roadway and in Lincoln Towers parking lot.

B) People in all other rows exit through front doors of sanctuary and out glass doors of building. Proceed away from building either toward library (across roadway) or toward 70th street.

SECOND FLOOR: Leave via rear door, down stairs and exit building. Turn left and continue across roadway into Lincoln Towers parking lot. Congregants on the second floor should assist in the evacuation of nursery children in Classroom I.

For the record we mention there is an emergency exit through the ladies room near the coat check room. To leave the building, go up stairs. Turn left outside and continue to Lincoln Towers parking lot across roadway.

We respectfully point out parents should know where their young children are. Many are seen running unsupervised throughout the building. Should an emergency occur these children are in extra jeopardy.

During emergencies everyone should move silently and quickly-- without pushing. Because of the weather no drills will be conducted now. It is therefore all the more important to keep evacuation procedures in mind. You will be reminded of them from time to time.

Now let us mention a matter of security. The rear door of the main sanctuary is intended for emergency exit only. If a woman leaves via this door it is essential she makes sure the door is closed behind her. There can be no exception to this. The unlocked door is a serious breach of sanctuary security and a potential hazard to all inside. We must consider the possibility that someone intent on harm can enter the back way.

This is the second in a series of articles appearing in "Echod" related to ushering and public safety. We trust you will recognize the importance of being informed and alert. Being prepared for emergencies is a congregation's responsibility, not just a committee obligation.

A Greeter stands by the glass door entranceway to the Shul welcoming new, moderately new, and sometimes not so new, worshippers.

A Greeter will assist one in finding the Beginner's Minyan, the coat room, the toddler's playgroup, or hopefully any of the myriad of activities simultaneously progressing through the Synagogue and Annex. Every week there are three greeters who each serve half hour shifts beginning at 9:45 AM. The Greeters thusfar are Elon Zapinsky, Sandy Gross, Alan Axelrod, Rachel Landau, Debbie Pine, Barry Cheskin, Joel Wachs, Izzy Hirsch and Shiela Klein and operate on a rotation basis of every five weeks or so.

Greeting has been coordinated in conjunction with the Ushering & Public Safety Committee. "Indefatigable" once was a word attached only to Martha Cohn but that Committee's co-chairpersons, Shirley and Mark Wald must also have the adjective attached. Altogether we should have a greeted, ushered and safe congregation.
