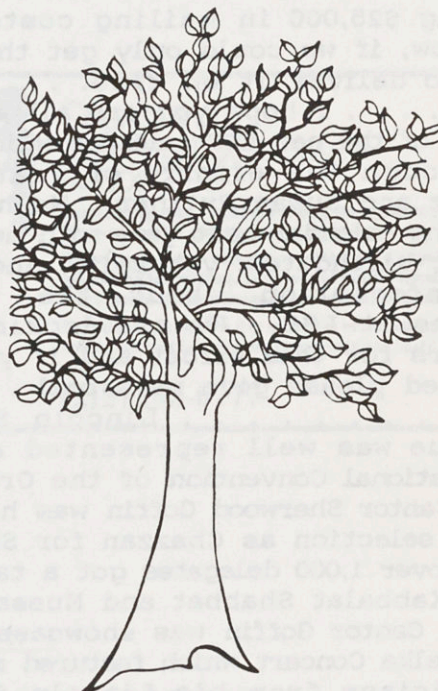

. Lincoln Square Synagogue was well represented at the recent National Convention of the Orthodox Union. Cantor Sherwood Goffin was honored with the selection as Chazzan for Shabbat and the over 1,000 delegates got a taste of an LSS Kabbalat Shabbat and Mussaf. In addition, Cantor Goffin was showcased in a Melave Malka Concert which featured many of the musicians from his Lincoln Center appearance. Our Rabbi contributed one of the convention's highlights at a plenary session when he presented a paper: "Land for Peace--What is the Orthodox Viewpoint." Rabbi Riskin had been scheduled to attend the convention, but was forced to cancel due to the happy circumstance of the birth and naming of his second grandchild, Mevaseret Tova Jacobs, daughter of Batya and Eddy Jacobs. Our Governor, Mr. Avery E. Neumark, served as program chairman for the convention and was re-elected as a National Vice-President of the O.U. LSS was privileged to host a moving Kristallnacht commemoration on November 10th, which was organized by the Jewish Community Relations Council of New York. The event was called

November was highlighted by two of their activities: the NCSY Yachad Shabbaton and the Youth Shabbat. 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LSS AS A HOUSE OF PRAYER

by
Rabbi Moshe Kahn

[The following are excerpts from Rabbi Moshe Kahn's presentation during the June symposium,
The Future of LSS: Body and Soul.]

One of a synagogue's primary functions is to give people the opportunity for *tefila betzibur*, communal prayer. How well are we doing with regard to davening? Is ours a meaningful davening? Are we behaving properly in shul?

I'd like to begin by mentioning a *halacha* that Rav Chaim Brisker developed in his book of *chidushim*, insights, on the Rambam's *Mishneh Torah*. Rav Chaim says there are two basic *kavanos*, intentions, we must have when we daven. First, we must realize before whom we are standing. Second, we must try to understand what we are saying, the concepts if not the words.

When do people come to shul? At the time of *Barechu*, how many empty seats are there? (I can tell you at the *Shabbos hashkama minyan*, there are quite a few.) Many come after *Barechu*. Others arrive after *Shemoneh Esrei*. Some come during and even after *Kri'as Hatorah*, Torah reading. Some arrive before, during or even after *Musaf*. Why are people coming so late? Now, I'm not naive; I realize other motives exist and that's a wonderful part of LSS - that people can meet. However, I'd like to think there's a dual motive, and one is to daven. I can hardly imagine that people can daven when they come so late. Do they know what to do or say? Do they try to catch up or do they just pick up where the chazan is?

To me this is indicative of a problem. I mean, *l'havdil*, if we had a very important business meeting, would we come late? If we had the opportunity to meet the mayor, or the governor, or the president of the United States, would we come late and say, "Sorry, couldn't make it on time"? But to meet *Hashem*? To pray to God - if we truly believe that's what we're doing - it's all right to come late? What kind of davening is that?

How much talking goes on during davening? Everybody likes to talk, and we all talk, and Jews may be notorious for talking. But there's a place and a time for talking.

Usually when everyone has finished the *Shemoneh Esrei*, the talking begins. How many times has the rabbi had to stop the chazan during *chazaras hashatz* and wait for quiet? During *Kri'as Hatorah* and between aliyas; during the recital of the *Haftarah*; during the recital of *Barechu* that starts each aliya, people are talking. And during the recital of *Kaddish*, people are talking.

Are people answering to *amen*, *y'hei shmei rabbah*? Some do, some don't. Either people are talking or they're just not paying attention to it. Aren't these things important? Do you know what the Gemara says? It says the world exists because of the people who say "*y'hei shmei rabbah*."

Where's everyone during the week? Not in shul - only a very small number are there. Are we implying that davening on *Shabbos* morning is more important than on Tuesday morning? We have no right to make such value judgments. I hope that everyone davens at home, but what about *tefila betzibur*?

I feel the examples I've just given are indicative of a problem in our community: people seem to lack the proper sensitivity to *tefila*. There is no quick solution, but this has to be addressed. Our rabbis have to speak about it often - not just in classes, but from the pulpit. *Tefila* is important in our lives; it has sustained us for thousands of years and, God willing, it will continue to sustain us. People have to find a *need* for *tefila*. There's got to be an enthusiasm, an excitement about *tefila* and *tefila betzibur* to make prayer as meaningful as it can and should be. The *kavana*, the feeling, is missing. We must overcome this obstacle.
