High Holy Day Message

If there is one word that can express the meaning of the High Holy Day experience, that word is "responsibility." The whole ritual of these Days of Awe, the prayers, the Shofar, the fasting, the confession, the pleas for forgiveness, all are centered on the belief that we are responsible human beings, that we are accountable for our deeds and that we are judged for the things we do or fail to do. If we face life without this sense of responsibility, if we do not believe that we can be held to account for our deeds or misdeeds, then Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur can have no meaning for us.

Judaism teaches us that first and foremost every man has a responsibility to himself. His very life has been put as a trust in his keeping, and what he does with his life, with his body and soul, with his mind, his intelligence, his potentials, are charged to his account. It is a sin to be careless of one's health, one's physical well-being and the punishment for such neglect is a very severe one. It is a sin to neglect the care and nurture of one's mind, to let it lie fallow and deteriorate through lack of exercise and stimulation. It is a sin to starve the spiritual yearnings of the soul, to deprive it of the nourishing experiences of the religious life, of the quest for beauty and goodness. For all these things we are held responsible.

Every man has a responsibility to his fellow man, to the community of which he is a part, to the society which upholds and sustains him. He is responsible for the welfare of his neighbor, whether he be the man next door or live in a neighboring continent. As a Jew he is responsible for all his fellow-Jews wherever they may be; for the survival of his people in the land of Israel and in all the lands of the dispersion. He is held accountable for the preservation of his religious heritage, for the culture and way of life which his people have developed and which have been transmitted to his care. For all these things he faces the Throne of Judgment on the High Holy Days.

The span of a man's life is brief. Time is fleeting. The years roll by in rapid succession. When are we going to measure up to our responsibilities? When are we going to square our accounts, first with ourselves and then with our fellow man? It cannot wait for tomorrow. There may be no tomorrow.

The great sage, Hillel, summed up man's responsibility in this terse comment: "If I am not for myself, who is? If I am for myself alone, what am I? And if not now, when?"

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON THE HIGH HOLY DAYS

- Q. *What custom is observed at the evening meal of Rosh Hashanah?*
- A. It is customary to partake of sweet fruit dipped in honey.
- Q. *What do the words "Rosh Hashanah" mean?*
- A. Beginning of the year (literally, "Head of the year.")
- Q. *When is Rosh Hashanah observed?*
- A. On the first day of Tishri, seventh month in the Hebrew calendar.
- Q. *By what three names is Rosh Hashanah known?*
- A. Day of Judgment (Yom Hadin), Day of Remembering (Yom Hazikaron), and Day of Blowing the Shofar (Yom T'ruah).
- Q. *By what Hebrew name is the person who blows the Shofar known?*
- A. "Baal Tokeah."
- Q. *Name three occasions in the life of the Jewish people on which the Shofar was sounded in ancient times?*
- A. To announce the new moon and festivals, to proclaim the jubilee or year of release, to issue a call to battle to communicate tidings of victory.
- Q. *What special greeting do worshippers extend to each other at the end of the Service, on the eve of Rosh Hashanah?*
- A. L'Shanah Tova Tikateb V'tehatem (May you be inscribed and sealed for a happy year).

YOM KIPPUR REGULATIONS

In conformity with the Biblical injunction "Ye shall afflict your souls", which is the Biblical synonym for "fasting", we must abstain from all food and drink, marital relations, wearing of leather shoes and anointing oneself from sunset on the eve of the Day of Atonement until after sundown of the following day.

Chapter 614: Section 240.21 Penal Law. Effective 9/1/67

"makes a person guilty of aggravated disorderly conduct who makes unreasonable noises or disturbances while at a lawfully assembled religious service or within 100 feet thereof with intent to cause annoyance or alarm or recklessly creating a risk thereof."
