"Im ain kemakh ain Torah." If there be no food (sustenance) then there can be no strength for the study of Torah. A discussion of economics in a synagogue bulletin is therefore appropriate and justified, especially when it touches each of us as citizens and Jews. And space certainly prohibits anymore than "touching" on it.

Our present "recession" is a deliberate misnomer in spite of the cheerfulness of White House advisers. President Ford told us, "We are in trouble." Every housewife, wage-earner, salesman and business executive knows it. We are in trouble! Our dollar is shrinking with double-digit inflation while business stagnates and our youth can't find jobs. Prices and wages are rising at an annual rate of 10% to 12% while unemployment is at the highest level in 35 years. To combat it we have been fighting inflation with recession and recession with inflation. It doesn't work! Our economic theoreticians and elected government officials urgently need "wisdom, unity and speed" in this "extraordinary test of the American system of government", as concerned economists and political theorists state the dilemma.

We learn, or should learn, so the saying goes, from history. What was the discussion in the early thirties? Was the great depression of the thirties caused by overproduction or was it underconsumption? Hoover philosophy maintained that American industry was producing so much that our economy could not absorb the production, that there were neither enough dollars nor buyers. The historic stock market crash of October, 1929, bankrupted our financial institutions, which led to financial ruin. The Economic Royalists of that age, as F.D.R. called them, finally

handed their business keys to the newly inaugurated president on March 4, 1933. F.D.R. maintained that the problem was not overproduction but that the American consumer lacked the wherewithal to buy the very necessities of life which the farm and the factory produced in over-abundance. This difference in philosophy, of which John Maynard Keynes was the prime exponent, propelled the new administration into a series of experiments. It succeeded in putting dollars into the pockets of more than 13 million unemployed, which enabled them to begin buying the "overproduction" of industry. F.D.R. was termed a socialist for these experiments. History proves, however, that he made the bankrupt institutions stronger and more powerful than they had ever been before. The means with which to buy that which our country could produce began to generate a demand so huge that the G.N.P. of \$39 billion in 1931 has grown to more than 30 times that amount today, and we still do not have socialism.

The brain trusters during that hectic period of experimentation successfully infused into our system checks and balances which today assure that the devastating depression of the thirties can no longer happen in our economy. The young lawyers in Roosevelt's first administration, such as Benjamin Cohen, James Landis and Thomas Corcoran, "made it possible for investors in the securities market to survive price gyrations that drove our grandfathers to total financial ruin and suicide." Nor did unemployment insurance, old age pensions and other social legislation break down the moral fibre of the individual. The \$3½ billion that F.D.R. used in deficit financing of the W.P.A., the P.W.A., the C.C.C., the A.A.A., just a few in a series of alphabetical agencies, did not bankrupt the Treasury. It was a pump-priming device to get the industrial machine moving again, our poor off the soup lines and out of Hoovervilles and our financial institutions to realize profits on capital investment.

Today's economy is controlled by the same forces that produced the crash of '29, only more so. The profit motive in a capitalist democracy is not the culprit that brings cyclical recessions. The

Passover and Its Meaning

CAUTION: To passover lightly the strict dietary laws singular to this holiday is to violate not only the individual precepts, but also to rock the very foundation on which the holiday and Judaism is based. Each and every product prepared for Passover should have reliable kashruth supervision by reliable Orthodox Rabbis. Check with your own Rabbi for any question that may arise concerning these matters.

PASSOVER—When the Jews were in Egypt and G-d decreed the plague of the smiting of the first-born Egyptian of every family, the Jewish first-born was spared. The angel passed over the Jewish homes that had the symbol of the sacrificial blood on their door posts and so we refer to the holiday as Passover.

SEDER—This is a Hebrew word which refers to the order of the ritual and ceremonial indulged in on the first two nights of the holiday, all of which we find embodied in the book called the Haggadah.

KITTEL — This is a special garment worn by the master of the house who directs the seder events. It is white and is commemorative of festive occasions especially recalling times of the temple. The high priest wore white.

MATZOHS — Normally we use this term to the flat baked cake-like bread eaten specifically on this holiday. This term is also another name for our holiday describing the hurriedness and anxiety with which the Jews left Egypt, which did not allow the bread to rise. Being that this article of food is so representative of the holiday, the Torah warns us to "guard" the matzohs. This implies that one is obliged to safeguard the wheat that goes into the baking of matzohs even from the time the wheat is actually cut. Hence we have on the market a type of matzoh known as shmura matzoh.

"Concerning the other symbols of

Passover, you are advised to pay careful attention to the reading of the Haggadah at your Seder on Passover Eve. All the information and understanding should be supplied therein."

From year to year it is quite evident that the preparations for the holiday take up far more of one's time and energies than the actual celebration during the days of the holiday. This is within keeping of the rabbinical dictum which stresses the fact that the preparation for a mitzvah is more than the mitzvah. Therefore, it will be pointed out that some of the preparations necessary, especially for the housewife, should be engaged in in a thorough fashion.

STOVE — Every part of the oven or stove which may have been reached by food during the year must be thoroughly cleansed and scraped. The oven and range must then be heated to a glow. Burners should be removed, cleaned and also heated to a glow. Also during Passover, special metal sheets are placed over the top of the range to prevent contact of any part of the stove with Passover utensils.

DISHES & UTENSILS — One should use special dishes and utensils set aside exclusively for Passover. Under certain conditions, however, some utensils used throughout the year may be prepared for use on Passover as well. They must go through a process called kashering. These laws are many and varied. Consult your Rabbi if any such problem should occur.

Passover is certainly a time for careful cleaning and preparation. All of this is based on the law of the Torah which forbids even a trace of leaven to appear in our food or even to be seen in our home. Thus, we not only clean our homes of chometz, but we sell it as well, as a safeguard through the Rabbi to a non-Jew of the community.

managers of the global corporations, with an assist from big unionism, thirsty for big profits at any price and power, together with politicians who easily succumb to the pressure of lobbyists, embrace in an unholy alliance which stifles a free democracy. John Galbraith states, "In the modern large corporation truth tends to be what best serves (management's) interest." He continues, "The modern large corporation . . . loses its legitimacy as an entrepreneurial and capitalist institution" in which "the stockholder (supposedly the owner of American business) is a functionless and powerless recipient of income or capital gains or capital losses. When the corporation is in full bloom so are its immunities — its right to be free from government interference. However, when the great corporation has a loss then it is too large and too important to be allowed by government to fail." Why not a hand-out from the Treasury to Lockheed?

The top 500 corporations in America own 70% of all U.S. manufacturing and mining assets. Their interlocking global directorates tie them with the top dozen banks, also global. Among several books about these powerful multinational corporations two are particularly interesting: "Global Reach" (Simon & Schuster) and Richard Barber's "The American Corporation." Single corporations possess more assets than most governments, and some even have their own foreign policies. I.T.T. helped overthrow Allende in Chile. All of us have been exposed to the power of the oil cartel. "The Philippine subsidiary of Exxon refused," in 1973, "to sell oil to the U.S. Navy at Subic Bay because its . . . interest was to help enforce the worldwide Arab boycott of the U.S." "The transition from the old world economy," Richard Barber thinks, "in which thousands of companies competed, to one in which 300 giant industrial firms dominate the scene, is of nearly (sic) immeasurable public consequences." Today's economic chaos does not appear as easy of solution as the depression of the early thirties, in retrospect, was.

PASSOVER CUSTOMS AMONG MANY JEWS

The fact that customs aren't always the same among all Jews and may develop differently in different countries could be seen when thousands of Jews from different parts of the world came to Israel, each group celebrating the Passover in its own different way.

Persian and Kurdish Jews sit at the Seder on bright-colored carpets with cushions all around them. Yemenite Jews wear white gowns. They don't sit on chairs, but fold their feet under them as they are seated on the floor. Although "Elijah's Cup" has meaning to us as part of the Seder, Yemenite Jews are not acquainted with that practice and don't use it.

Bokharin Jews do not have a Seder dish at the table. Instead, they spread a large green or white embroidered cloth in the center of the house and on it place 3 matzot and other Passover symbols. When they reach the part in the Haggada "This is the bread of affliction" each lifts a corner of the Seder cloth while the youngest asks the four questions.

Jews from Morocco and Libya place on their Seder table a bowl in which swim live fish. At the start of the Seder the leader drops a gold coin into the jar as a symbol for abundance and blessing.

Most Oriental Jews observe the custom of the Seder leader placing a long stick on his shoulder on which he ties a bundle of matzot and he acts out the role of a wanderer. Those at the Seder table ask him: "Where have you come from?" "From Egypt," he replies as he walks back and forth. "Where are you going?" "To Jerusalem," he replies. He thus acts out the going out of the children of Israel from their slavery in Egypt.

PASSOVER FUND (Mo'os Chittim)

There is hardly a local charity in Jewish life that has appealed more warmly to the heart of the Jews than the Mo'os Chittim Appeal, providing Passover needs for poor families in dire and wretched circumstances.

Our Young Israel of Parkchester has never failed each year to put this Passover help into the outstretched hand of every deserving individual and institution, whether in our own locality, in Europe or in Israel. Last year, close to \$1300 was dispensed to various worthy causes.

Please send your contribution to the synagogue office and help those who need it most. Your preparations for Passover are not complete without having given your Mo'os Chittim contribution.

TO THOSE WHO HAVE PETS

Chometz is not permitted in one's possession during the entire Passover! Check the diet of your pets and substitute all Chometz with other Passover foods. Bird food is Chometz and we have been advised by Hartz Mountain Foods that Matzoh Farfel, ground up and spread out, is an ample substitute in the bird's diet for the Passover week.

One should also check cat and dog food to see if it contains Chometz.

Men's Club FROM THE PRESIDENT

I will devote this column to the memories of two great Rabbis who lived close to 1700 years ago. To those members who attend our Sunday Mishna Class or the Saturday Talmud Class under the direction of our Rabbi, the names of these two men are familiar, to the others—new revelation. The names that I refer to are RAV and SHMUEL.

Both Rabbis lived in Babylonia. Rav was the head of a Yeshiva in the city of Sura and Shmuel headed a Yeshiva in the city of Naharda. Occasionally they did not agree with one another, but they never quarrelled or became angry at each other. The Jews who lived in Sura and its surroundings followed the rules and decisions of Rav, while others who lived in Naharda and its surroundings followed the teachings of Shmuel.

As a young man Rav went to Palestine and studied for thirty years in the city of Zipors under the tutorship of Rabbi Jehudah the Great, then returned to Sura and founded a Yeshivah. Shmuel studied in Babylonia at the beginning under his father, who was also a great Rabbi, then he devoted time to general studies namely medicine and finally became a great physician specializing in ophthalmology. He also studied astronomy and became an expert in this field. He used the expression "The paths of the sky are as clear to me as the paths of Naharda."

Rav, who was much older than Shmuel died at the age of ninety six. Shmuel died seven years later.

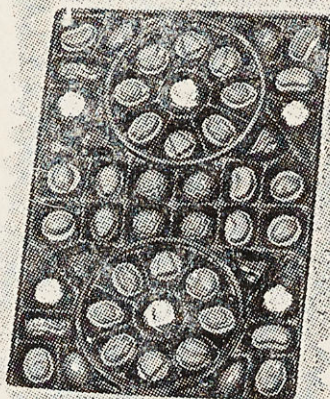
