A Forward Look

Young Israel of Parkchester has moved into a new era of concern and commitment that has touched every area of our activities. New programs are being introduced, programs that are challenging, innovative and necessary to meet the needs of a changing society. This is the time of reckoning. These years are crucial. The apparent difficulty of American Jewry to discern the peril must be brought into the spotlight by a determined and inspired nucleus — by you, and by me, by all of us together whose membership in Young Israel is a source of pride and gratification. LET US REACH OUT TO ALL JEWS TO STAND UP AND BE COUNTED TODAY.

I speak of the hundreds of Jewish families who live in Parkchester, and of equal hundreds who live immediately outside the Parkchester borders. Many are without roots; without any ties to a neighborhood synagogue. And I look upon this shocking neglect as a personal challenge to me, who has been entrusted with the Chairmanship of the Membership Committee. I have failed to reach them with my pleas, my many entreaties, and, with what I thought, my faultless arguments.

To me, the Jewish heart beats in tune with the hearts of his Jewish brethren. The Jew cannot divorce himself from his Jewish upbringing, his tradition, his Yiddishkeit. Always in the Jewish heart is the urge to relate one to the other. Each one of us is a link in the chain that binds us all together into one homogeneous society. We live best in the heritage that is ours.

We place our trust in your good judgment. We ask again that you join with us in membership — NOW!

Men's Club From The President

While we are busy with America's Bicentennial celebrations let's not forget that our Lady — THE STATUE OF LIBERTY is celebrating her 90th Anniversary.

Anyone coming by boat towards the shores of New York can see from a distance a big bronze statue of a woman holding in one hand a tablet and in the other hand a torch. On the tablet is written July 4, 1776, which is the independence day of the United States. The name of the statue is STATUE OF LIBERTY, which was presented ninety years ago by the French people to the government of the United States in memory of the war of independence. On the base of the statue is inscribed the words of the wonderful song "The New Giant" written by Emma Lazarus. The song's writer is inviting all the suffering people from other countries to come to our land of freedom in order to live a good and nice life.

Emma Lazarus was born in 1848 in New York to a Sefardic Jewish family. In her early youth she loved to read the works of the American philosopher Ralph Emerson and the American songwriter Emanuel Stedman. At the age of seventeen her first book of songs was printed and was highly praised by Emerson and Stedman.

In 1881 pogroms broke out in Russia and as a result many Jews fled the Czarist Russia and came to America. Emma Lazarus met the refugees and her heart was full of pity. At that time she started to learn the Hebrew language and became closely acquainted with the history of the Jewish people. As a result she developed a source of love for her suffering people in the Diaspora.

In her articles she wrote that the Jewish people must return to the land of their forefathers and establish in Palestine a land of their own. This thought she brought out even before the First Zionist Congress. She also appealed that the Jews in America should help their suffering brethren in Europe.

Emma Lazarus died in the year 1887. She was only 38 at the time of her death. She will be long remembered by the American Jewish community.
