FROM THE PRESIDENT:

There are many unfinished pieces of business that our lame duck President will leave behind for Ronald Reagan to deal with when he takes over in January. One of these is the question of Israel and the Arabs. Reagan has over the years said that a strong and secure Israel is a moral imperative, a strategic necessity for the U.S.A. and a beacon of democracy in the Middle East.

The issues are complex and sensitive. For one thing talk about a Palestinian homeland on the Westbank ignores the fact that such a homeland was created by England in 1922, when it gave two-thirds of territorial Palestine to Hussein's grandfather and set up what was called the Kingdom of Trans-Jordan, in open and clear violation of the mandate by the League of Nations.

Then in 1948 they seized the West bank and the old City of Jerusalem by force and changed the name to Jordan. Then in 1967 Israel pushed them back to the East bank of the Jordan river. All of the past history was conveniently forgotten and ignored.

If Arafat and the P.L.O. have any claims, these are against Hussein and the Palestinian homeland of Trans-Jordan.

It is conveniently forgotten that during the 1948 War 800,000 Jews were driven out of Syria, Iraq, and Yemen where they lived for centuries. They fled with only what they could wear on their backs, leaving their homes, businesses and property without any compensation.

Those 800,000 Jewish refugees were fed, clothed, housed and absorbed by Israel. The Arabs who left Israel at the urging of the Mufti with the idea of coming back to rape, murder and plunder are still held in refugee camps in the Arab countries. These camps are supported and administered by the U.N. and are all dominated by the P.L.O. and used as a training ground for staging raids into Israel.

This is only one of the many problems which Reagan will have to face when he meets with Begin and Sadat. This will be a tough test of his statesmanship.

The talks between Israel and Egypt based on the peace treaty that grew out of the Camp David accords in 1978 were at a standstill. These talks were always tied to the negotiations on autonomy for the Palestinians on the West Bank.

Both parties looked for a breakthrough which did not occur easily. After an official exchange of letters between ANWAR EL SADAT and MENACHEM BEGIN in which each one blamed the other, in a very polite way, in breaking the CAMP DAVID decisions, they continued their intimate discussions via the telephone.
