Let us resolve, for the New Year, to make a greater effort to maintain the morning and evening Minyon, by scheduled attendance. Please do not wait for a phone call.

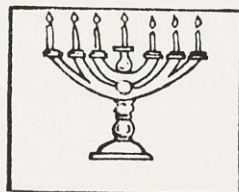
Because of the agonizing events in Lebanon that occurred this summer, plus the false statements printed in the media, great dissension was felt amongst many Jews.

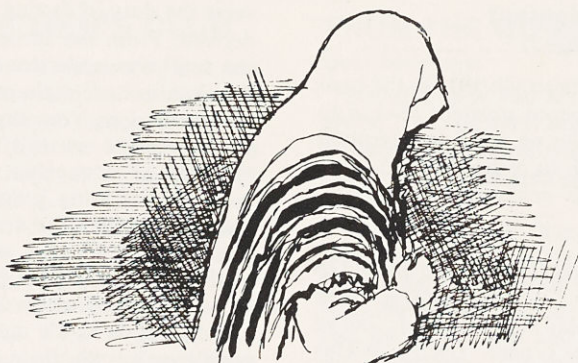

YOM TOV SUPPLEMENT

For this issue, we present a thorough discussion of the Yamim Noraim/Days of Awe.

What is the significance of the month of Elul? Elul, the last month of the year, is hallowed by tradition as a period of preparation for the new. Rabbinic tradition has it that Moses went up on to Mount Sinai to receive the second tablets of stone on the first day of Elul and stayed there for forty days and forty nights until Yom Kippur, when he brought down the Torah. During these forty days, Jewish tradition enjoins a special watchfulness and attention to the ideals of penitence, prayer and charity. (Of course, the pursuit of these ideals is not limited to one period of the year.)

As a reminder of the solemnity of these days the Shofar is sounded in the Synagogue at the end of each morning service, with the exception of the day before Rosh Hashanah, when the Shofar is not sounded in order to make a clear distinction between the optional and the obligatory sounding.

What are Selichoth? As the days of Elul go by and Rosh Hashanah draws near, the mood of supplication becomes intensified. From the week before Rosh Hashanah, until Yom Kippur, special penitential prayers known as *Selichoth* (from a Hebrew root meaning 'to pardon') are recited early in the morning before the services.

Is there a custom of visiting the graves during the High Holiday season? Yes, during the month of Elul. This originated in the belief that the righteous dead intercede for the living before the throne of G-d. Jewish tradition warns, however, against any kind of direct prayer to the departed;

the custom being observed rather as an act of filial piety in the remembrance of lives worthily lived.

What are the four names of Rosh Hashanah? (1) *Rosh Hashanah* (Rosh — 'the head of' or 'the beginning of', Hashanah — 'the year'), the most popular of the four names; (2) *Yom Teruah* ('The Day of Sounding the Horn'), the Biblical name for the festival; (3) *Yom Ha-Din* ('Day of Judgment'); (4) *Yom Ha-Zikaron* ('Day of Remembrance'). On this day G-d 'remembers' His creatures. Its meaning for us is that no deed or thought of man fails to bear fruit, for good or for ill, and that the life a man leads possesses permanent significance for his and for others. In the Rosh Hashanah prayers we speak of G-d as 'He who remembers the forgotten things', meaning that G-d remembers that which humans forget. The proud man, conscious only of the little good he had done, is forgetful of the *wrongs* he has committed, but G-d remembers the forgotten wrongs and forgets, as it were, the good so zealously recalled. But of the humble man, whose failings are ever before him, and who belittles his good deeds, G-d says, "He has forgotten but I will not forget *his good acts!*"

What is Tashlich ("casting")? The prophet Micah speaks of G-d "casting" the sins of Israel into the depths of the sea: 'He will again have compassion upon us; He will subdue our iniquities; and Thou wilt cast (*Ve-Tashlich*) all their sins into the dep-

ths of the sea.' (Micah vii: 19) On the basis of this verse the custom arose for Jews to go to a stream of water on the first afternoon of Rosh Hashanah to recite this and other verses and various penitential hymns and prayers.*

Please explain the idea behind the "Ten Days of Penitence." The Bible states: 'Seek ye the Lord while He may be found, Call ye upon Him while he is near.' (Is. 1v: 6) This verse, implying that there is a time when the quest for G-d is particularly blessed with success, is applied by the Rabbis to the ten days from Rosh Hashanah to Yom Kippur. Of course, G-d is near to us at all times and we can approach Him without having to wait for a special period of the year. But during the ten days of penitence, the Jew is expected to submit to severe self-scrutiny in the effort to improve the quality of his life. During this period, special care should be taken in prayer and the other religious observances, and, of course, special attention should be paid to consideration for the needs of others.

Could you give some history about the Shofar? The Shofar is one of the earliest musical instruments known to man. Fashioned from the horn of an animal, it could easily be manufactured and was extensively used in ancient times. In the Bible there are frequent references to it. According to the Rabbis the horn of any clean animal (i.e. an animal Jews may eat), sheep, goat or antelope, is fit to be used as a Shofar on Rosh Hashanah, but preference is given to the ram's horn because of the substitution of a sacrificial ram for Isaac in the Biblical story. The only exception made by the Rabbis was the horn of the cow because Israel had once worshipped the golden calf and it was considered improper that Israel appear before G-d on the great Day of Judgment with an instrument which recalls the severe lapse of loyalty.

The Bible speaks of "afflicting one's soul" on Yom Kippur. What does this mean? In Leviticus it states: 'In the seventh month, on the tenth day of the month, ye shall afflict your souls.' (xvi: 29) From this

verse the duty of fasting on Yom Kippur is derived. From the earliest times 'afflicting the soul' was understood to mean fasting. The Rabbis list certain other 'afflictions' to be practiced on Yom Kippur in addition to fasting. In the words of the Mishnah: 'On the Day of Atonement, eating, drinking, washing, anointing, putting on sandals, and marital relations are forbidden.' Another reason given for not wearing shoes with leather on Yom Kippur is that these can only be fashioned after an animal has been killed and, as G-d's mercy is over all His creatures, it is not fitting to wear leather on the day when we pray for mercy.

What is Neilah? In Temple times, deputations of laymen were delegated to be present each day when the priests offered up the sacrifices on behalf of Israel. Towards the end of the day when the Temple gates were about to be shut, these men would recite the Prayer of the Closing of the Gates (*Neilath Shearim* — *Neilah*, 'to close'). On fast days this special concluding service was added to the prayers of the day but in the course of time, this addition was reserved for Yom Kippur. At a later period it was natural to associate the idea of the closing gates with the gates of Heaven which were open to prayer during the long day. The note sounded at Neilah is one of hope. The sun is about to set, the prayers have ascended on high, Israel has become reconciled with its G-d. The traditional melodies express the mood of longing, of yearning for a better life, of triumph over sin.

**This year Tashlich takes place on Sunday afternoon on the second day of Rosh Hashanah.*

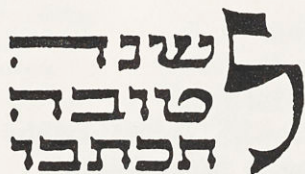
