"THE BREAD OF AFFLICTION"

A Passover Message by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein

"This is the bread of affliction which our forefathers ate in the Land of Egypt." Thus does the Jew begin the Seder ritual. Alas, that declaration is more than an historical fact. It is contemporary reality. And it has always been so. When our people were in Spain and spoke of the bread of affliction, they might very

well have been thinking of their own sad plight in that inquisitorial land. At the Seder services in the ghettos of mediaeval Europe the same must have been the case. The Jewish map was dotted with many Egypts and the bread of affliction was our diet during many epochs.

When our brothers and sisters this year will be reciting that paragraph in the Displaced Persons' camps of Europe, they will not be mere narrators but actors in the tragic drama of our day. The darkness of Egypt could not have been much worse than the darkness of a D.P. camp. The bread of affliction of old was little worse than the rationed calories of today. To live in the shadow of the pyramids of Pithom is not more gruesome than to live with the memories of the gas chambers of Maidanek.

How long shall we continue eating the bread of affliction? So long as the Pharaohs of history will be concerned more with the building of empires than with the salvation of man. So long as making bricks will be more important than molding souls. So long as profits will count more than personalities. So long as oil will be more precious than blood.

What shall be our answer to a world that persists in feeding us the bread of affliction? "Whosoever is hungry, let him come and eat. Who-



soever is in need let him observe the Passover with us." These, too, are words of our Seder ritual and follow immediately upon the statement that opens the Seder service. While swallowing the hard crusts of affliction we think of the hungry. While suffering enslavement we plan the liberation of all who are in bondage. If our own kind have become Displaced Persons, then "personhood" has lost its place in the world. As we struggle for the liberation of our own, so do we

SUNDAY LECTURE SERIES A HUGE SUCCESS

Dr. Isidore Lubin to Speak on Russia

The problem of Russia and its relation to the western democracies is one of the most vital problems of our day. The entire structure of world peace and the future of the United Nations depend upon the proper understanding of this problem.

A forthright and enlightening address on "Russia in the World Picture" will be delivered by Dr. Isidore Lubin at our next forum on Tuesday, April 15th. Dr. Lubin is well qualified to talk authoritatively on this subject. He is a nationally noted economist and former director of the Federal Bureau of Labor Statistics. He was special assistant to President Roosevelt and served as associate United States representative on the Allied Reparations Commission to Moscow.

In addition, Dr. Lubin has served the Federal Government in many other capacities. He was Economic Advisor to the United States Commission on Education and Labor, appointed by the Senate. He was chairman of the Labor Advisory Board of the Federal Emergency Administration and a member of the Technical Board of the President's Economic Security Commission. Dr. Lubin is a brilliant scholar, a keen observer, and a stimulating speaker and we may look forward to a very informative address.
