Last Forum Meeting Hears Norman Thomas —

The last Forum Meeting of the season was held Tuesday evening before the largest attendance ever to attend such a function. An overflow auditorium, with many occupying seats in the balcony, heard Norman Thomas present his views on "American Foreign Policy—Toward Peace or Toward War."

Dynamic Mr. Thomas, in a talk laden with factual material but spiced with humorous touches, analyzed the policy our country is pursuing in its relations with Russia and the other nations of the world. The dilemma presented by our efforts to avert World War III on the one hand, and the world race for rearmaments, can be resolved in only one way, said Mr. Thomas. And that is by universal disarmament under the effective supervision of a strengthened UN—a total disarmament just down to the level of a police force.

The calibre of the written questions which followed the talk were definite evidence of how Mr. Thomas impressed his audience and the manner in which he stirred all who were present to serious thought on the subject.
