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"THE DRAMA OF GOD AND MAN: A STUDY OF FOUR MAJOR BOOKS OF THE BIBLE" THEME OF SUPPER LECTURE SERIES

Rabbi Lookstein will Again Lecture

Continuing an activity that was established several years ago and has by now become one of our most important institutions, the Sunday Supper Lecture Series will begin on February 25th and run for four Sunday evenings, through April 1st. The series, which will probably turn out to be the most enlightening ever to be delivered before any congregational audience, will again be conducted by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, and will be on the general theme, "The Drama of God and Man: A Study of Four Major Books of the Bible."

The subject of the lectures this year is an especially dynamic one and should be of interest to all during these days of stress and re-evaluation. The series, thus, will provide an opportunity for intellectual activity as well as for pleasant sociability.

The subjects of the individual lectures are:

1. February 25th — "Job: an Encounter with Evil"
2. March 4th — "Ecclesiastes: an Enquiry into Cynicism"
3. March 18th — "Jonah: The Resistance to Fate"
4. April 1st — "The Psalms: The Epic of God-Intoxication"

The supper-lectures will be held in our beautiful Social Hall, and a full-course supper will be served before each lecture. The charge for the en-

tire four-lecture series, including supper, of course, is \$6.00; individual lectures are \$2.00. Reservation cards will shortly be in the mails, and an exceptionally large response is expected.

The annual Supper Lecture Series was instituted in 1947, under the sponsorship of our Men's Club. This year, under the same sponsorship, the series was incorporated into the larger body of adult studies in the Kehilath Jeshurun Institute, and constitute the second set of Bible Lectures which the Rabbi will deliver. The first Bible Lecture Course was conducted on alternating Monday evenings, from October to the middle of December.

During the past five years, our guests at the Supper Lecture Series heard discussed such subjects as "From Basle to Basle — Fifty Years of Zionist History"; "The Religious Complexion of American Jewry," which analyzed Reform, Conservative and Orthodox Judaism; and "The Making of the Modern Mind," an insight into such movements in Jewish life as Rationalism, Hassidism and Rabbinism. Those who attended these talks and there are many who were present at them all — will need no urging to make reservations for the 1951 Series. To the others we say: You will be missing an intellectual and social treat if you do not join us in the forthcoming group of lectures.

BERTHOLD BREINER AND AARON SIMON JOIN YEAR BOOK EFFORT

This year, we have good reason to believe that he will exceed that amount and rank among the top ad-getters.

Mr. Simon is a member of a family that has long been identified with our Congregation. He has participated in Year Book work for a good number of years, each year with a goodly sum in ads. In the current drive, Mr. Simon, realizing the necessity for reaching our \$35,000 quota, has more than doubled any previous attainment — and is still going strong.

Both gentlemen, as well as all those who are engaged in Year Book work,

are, in a sense, to be congratulated. Each of them — almost without exception — participates in every drive which the Congregation undertakes. They are among the leaders in their own industries, and are no strangers to such work as UJA, Federation, and the like. Yet they manage to find time to do their share for the Year Book, as well, and manifest thereby their deep interest in Jewish education.

What does this indicate? Simply that it can be done! The cause is worthy of their support; the time and effort can be expended even during busy days. This means that you, too, can share in the work of providing scholarship aid to so many deserving boys and girls, who would otherwise be deprived of the educational advantages to be had in Ramaz School and our afternoon Religious School.

We do not stipulate any minima — neither in the time you should devote to the Year Book, nor to the amount you are to raise. Every bit helps — even one ad brings us closer to the goal. So won't you pitch in and do your bit? Believe us when we say that the satisfaction you will derive from having joined in this drive is alone worth the effort. 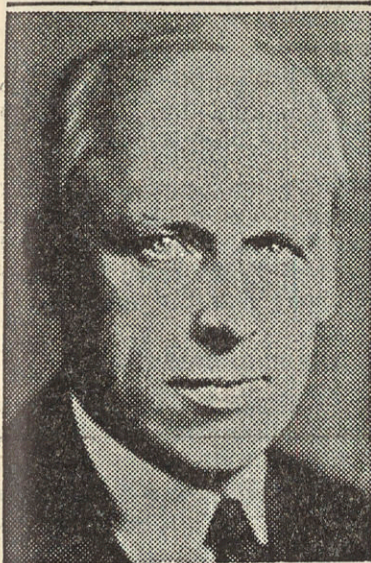

Now for some specific information about our Theater Party: arrangements have been completed for the Orchestra and Loge seats for the eve-

Tickets — scaled according to the location of the seats — are priced at \$18.00, \$15.00, \$12.50 and \$10.00, and the proceeds will go toward furthering the program of the Men's Club.
