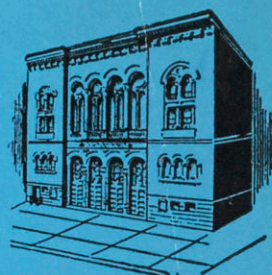

The Seudah-Seminar, introduced last year, has been one of the most successful programs conducted by our congregation. For many months now each Saturday afternoon a large turnout has attended this activity. The Seminar begins with Mincha Service in the chapel and continues with refreshments and Z'miros in the Social Hall. The highpoint each week, of course, is the discussion of the Bible Portion of the Week by a member of the congregation who volunteers to put in the time and effort necessary to prepare such a discussion.

"THE RABBI OF OLD IN A NEW WORLD"

On the Occasion of the Ordination of 120 Rabbis at Yeshiva University

SEMINARY UNIT OF YESHIVA UNIVERSITY TO ORDAIN 120 RABBIS THIS SUNDAY



Semicha, the highest degree in Jewish theological learning, will be conferred upon 120 rabbis, graduates of Yeshiva University's Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary, Sunday, March 4 (21st of Adar), on the Yahrzeit of Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Spector (left), revered as the greatest rabbi of the 19th century. The exercises will be the largest of their kind ever held in this country.

Dr. Bernard Revel (center), first president, expanded the seminary by adding an academic high school (1915), a Teachers Institute (1921) and Yeshiva College (1928), the first liberal arts college in the world under Jewish auspices.

Dr. Samuel Belkin (right), an esteemed trustee of our congregation,

is a distinguished scholar and author. He became president in 1943 and the institution continued its pioneering growth, paralleling that of our great American schools of learning such as Yale, Harvard and Princeton, which also started as seminaries. Under Dr. Belkin's inspiring leadership, Yeshiva became a university in 1945, the first in the nation under Jewish auspices. Additions to the University have since included the Harry Fischel School for Higher Jewish Studies (1945), the School of Education and Community Administration (1948), Institutes of Mathematics (1945), Cantorial Training (1954) and Israeli studies (1954), Teachers Institute for Women (1952), Stern College for Women (1954) and the Albert Einstein College of Medicine (1955).

Three thousand men and women from all parts of the United States and abroad are enrolled at Yeshiva University, which has programs leading to fifteen different graduate and undergraduate degrees from B. A. to Ph. D.

Yeshiva University today includes 15 different schools and divisions in Washington Heights, Midtown, Bronx and Brooklyn, N. Y., offering the widest range of programs and services of any Jewish educational institution in the world. It sponsors four auxiliary services, publishes four famous scholarly publications and trains young people in the arts, sciences and Jewish learning for service to America and Jewish communities the world over.

Our congregation has long been identified with the life and fortunes of Yeshiva University. Mr. Max J. Etra, president of our congregation, is the chairman of the Board of Trustees of Yeshiva University. From among our congregants the following are members of the Board of the institution: Mr. A. Phillip Goldsmith, Mr. Benjamin Gottesman, Mr. Samuel Rosen and Mr. Abraham R. Winer.

The sermon this Saturday will take official notice of the ordination of the 120 young rabbis. Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, who is a Professor of Homiletics and Practical Rabbinics at Yeshiva University, will speak on the subject, "The Rabbi of Old in a New World."

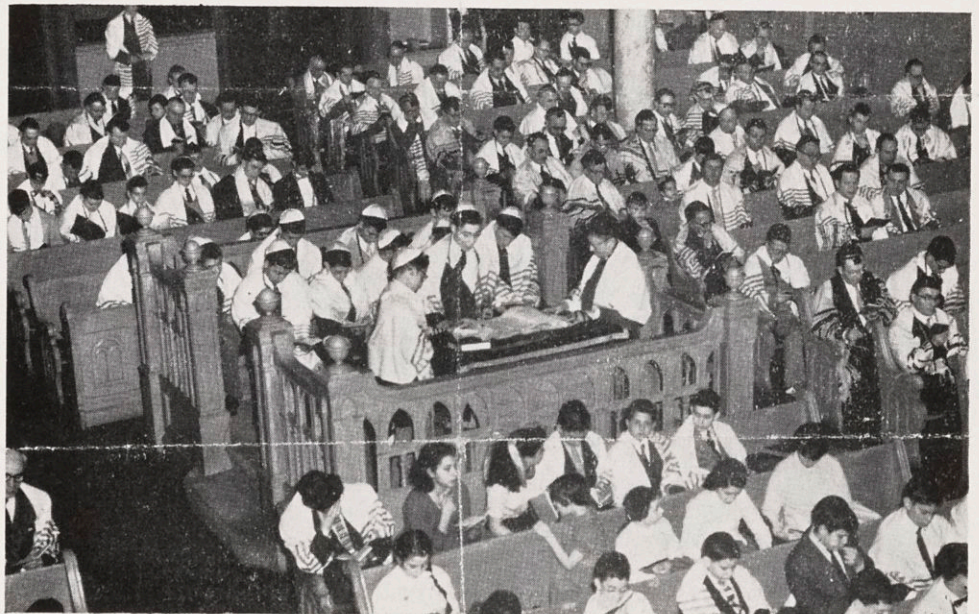
This past Sunday morning over 700 men, women and children, joined us at our special service in celebration of the festive holiday of Purim.

Judaism is not opposed to waging war, when necessary. But it deplors any occasion of bloodshed. An interesting phase of the Jewish attitude towards war is described by Dr. Hertz in Verse 12 of Chapter XXX.

Do you think that Aaron was justified in participating in the production of the golden calf? See Dr. Hertz on Verse 5 of Chapter XXXII for an explanation of his behavior.

What is the difference between "anger" and "indignation"? See Dr. Hertz on Verse 19 of Chapter XXXII for an explanation of the "anger" that Moses exhibited when he broke The Tables of Law.

What is the meaning of God in the Jewish religion? See Verses 5 to 7 of Chapter XXXIV and Dr. Hertz' comments. Of related importance is Dr. Hertz' comment on Verse 19 of Chapter XXXIII.
