The High Holy Day Season will be ushered in on Saturday night September 26th with the traditional Selichot Service.

As in past years, this service which inaugurates the penitential season, will contain all of the special features which have made it a wonderful experience for the entire congregational family.

"Midnight" Snack

The experience begins with a "Midnight" Snack, sponsored by the Sisterhood and Men's Club, to which all the members of these groups, as well as the entire membership of the Congregation, are invited.

Our Congregational family has been scattered all over the world during the past few months. Many new people have recently moved into the neighborhood and will be worshipping with us for the first time. The pre-Selichot snack is an ideal time for all to renew old acquaintanceships and greet the newcomers. This "social hour" will begin at 11:30 P.M.

Selichot Service at 12:30

At 12:30, the congregation will assemble in the main synagogue for the Selichot Service. The service, which lasts a little over an hour, is rendered more intelligible by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein's clear interpolations and explanations of the prayers. Cantor Vigoda will lend a tone of inspiration through his musical interpretations of the special prayers. Congregational melodies and responsive readings will enable all to participate actively.

For the convenience of the ladies, a special section will be reserved for them on the main floor of the synagogue. In recent years, more and more young people have come to feel that Selichot is not a service for the "old folks," but rather a religious experience which they too find rewarding.

Our warmest invitation is, therefore, extended to the entire Congregational family to attend the Midnight Snack and the Selichot Service again this year, and thereby usher in the High Holy Day season in the proper religious spirit.

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein will preach this Sabbath at 11:00 A.M.

SATURDAY CLASS BEGINS LAWS AND PHILOSOPHY OF "DAYS OF AWE"

Special emphasis will be given to the laws and significance of the shofar, the structure of the High Holy Day Services, penitence, fasting and other salient features of this season of the year.

These classes, which form part of a series on Holiday Laws for which credit is given in our Adult Institute, were inaugurated only last year, and were unusually well attended.

We are certain that this year as well, our congregants will avail themselves of the opportunity to become more familiar with the precepts concerning the High Holy Day season.

YESHIVA UNIVERSITY NEWS Second Annual Summer Institute In Israel

The Youth Bureau of Yeshiva University through its summer Institute Program, has afforded a large group of teen-agers a wonderful opportunity to acquaint themselves with life and letters in the state of Israel.

During a well planned seven week period, these young people, under the leadership of a trained staff, acquainted themselves with the surgent tempo of the young state. The teen-agers travelled throughout the country visiting biblical and modern landmarks from the Galilee down to Eilat at the Gulf of Aqaba. The group participated in seminars devoted to Hebrew, Talmud, Israel Law, Education, Archeology, and Bible Study.

The Summer Institute Program of Yeshiva University has proven once again to be a most successful vehicle for the promotion of a keener insight amongst American teen-agers into the land and culture of Israel.

ETHICS OF THE FATHERS CLASS CONCLUDES SUCCESSFUL SEASON

On Saturday, September 12th the class in Ethics of the Fathers held its final session of the season.

Since the Sabbath following Passover, this class met regularly, week in and week out. The attendance ranged from twenty to thirty students at each session. Neither temperature nor adverse climatic conditions could deter our students.

Sections from the third and fourth chapters of the "Ethics of the Fathers" were discussed and expanded upon by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein and Rabbi Haskel Lookstein during the course of the spring and summer.
