ROSH HASHANAH 5720

The New Year began for Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun with a weekend of inspiring prayer. From the first note sung by Cantor Vigoda on Friday evening before a crowded men's section of the main Synagogue, until the last word of Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein's benediction on Sunday, before 1,000 worshippers, the inspirational character of the Days of Awe was everywhere in evidence.

The services were planned and executed according to a compact schedule. The decorum in the House of God was ideal. The smoothness and organization of the service were close to perfection. Yet, the spontaneity and enthusiasm of prayer were given free expression.

The Cantor sang the prayers in thrilling fashion. The Congregation chanted our melodies as a giant chorus. The sounding of the shofar on the sec-

ond day was so moving, that it made up for the required omission of this ritual on the Sabbath.

Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein spoke of the loneliness of man, on the first day. He pointed out that love, a sense of continuity, and an increased God consciousness were the only antidotes to the existential loneliness that grips mankind.

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein spoke of the disturbing "quiet on the religious front" on the second day. He suggested that the blast of the shofar and the voice of prayer should pierce the silence and cause man to question the adequacy of his own existence.

Rosh Hashanah in our Synagogue was a moving experience. Let us hope that it will continue to move us toward a good year in the months ahead.

Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein will preach this Sabbath at 11:00 A.M.

SPECIAL SERVICE ADDS TO CHILDREN'S OBSERVANCE OF ROSH HASHANAH

The children of our Congregants participated in a special children's service on both days of Rosh Hashanah.

Under the leadership of Harvey Dickman, a senior at Yeshiva College, the children enjoyed a junior version of the main synagogue service. They served as cantors, recited the blessings over the Torah, opened the ark, read in unison and responsively in English and in Hebrew, and sang the traditional melodies.

The youngsters sat enthralled as Harvey explained the salient prayers, and related stories pertinent to the holiday. They even enjoyed opportunities for self expression during the question and answer periods which were spotted throughout the service. Even as did their elders, they thrilled to the sound of the shofar.

The service was run with unusual smoothness. The only disturbances which interrupted the services from time to time were due to well meaning parents who would drop in to see how their "pride and joys" were doing. While parents serve a vital function in life, children at a children's service act much better without parental concern.

On Yom Kippur the service will be held from 11:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M. During that time only children from 6 to 12 will be admitted. For the benefit of the children themselves, please cooperate with this rule.

The doors have been redesigned to make entrance and exit more convenient for the holiday crowds. The color is a bright green, reflecting the mood of the harvest festival. As usual, the Sisterhood will supervise the decoration of the Sukkah with fruits, leaves, and flowers.

This year, again, catered meals will be served in the Sukkah on the first two days of the holiday. On Friday evening, October 16, Saturday noon October 17, and Sunday noon, October 18, the delicious fare which has become traditional for our Synagogue will be served.

The experience of eating together in the Sukkah becomes more and more delightful from year to year. Entire families come to drink in the holiday spirit. The children are always the guests of honor, and their spontaneous gaiety and joy serve as an inspiration for the adults.
