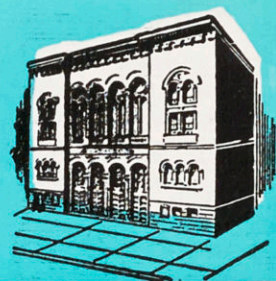

CHANUKAH NOTES

Chanukah of the year 5720 (1959-60), begins on Friday evening December 25th. The first candle is lit immediately prior to kindling the sabbath candles. On each successive night an additional candle is lit until Friday evening, January 1st, when eight candles are kindled just before the sabbath begins.

The daily services, which will be held at their usual time, will be supplemented by special prayers and the kindling of the lights.

Collegiate Sabbath and Youth Sabbath coincide with the first and last days of the holiday. Appropriate prayers will be recited and Chanukah melodies will punctuate the services.

The Father and Son Minyan will hold a special Chanukah service on Sunday December 27th. Many of our young men who are on vacation will certainly want to attend this Minyan.

A joyous Chanukah Festival is in prospect for our entire congregational family. We hope that all our members and friends will participate in the festivities and thereby enjoy the holiday to the full.

**DR. HENRY RAPHAEL GOLD ADDRESSES
SISTERHOOD — MEN'S CLUB MEETING**

A capacity crowd filled the social hall of the synagogue last Tuesday evening to listen to one of the most stimulating addresses ever presented to a meeting of either the Sisterhood or the Men's Club.

Perhaps the outstanding talk was due to the fact that this was a combined meeting of both groups. More likely, the success of the speech was the result of the personality, acumen, and eloquence of our speaker, Dr. Henry Raphael Gold.

Dr. Gold, whose educational background ranges from the Yeshivoh in Eastern Europe, to the classrooms of sociology and philosophy at Columbia University, and culminates in the medical and psychiatric programs of Baylor University, drew on this broad sweep of intellectual accomplishment to analyze the subject: "Modern Psychiatry and the World of Faith".

Our speaker began by asserting that psychiatry can never replace religion, nor can religion usurp the domain of psychiatry.

He went on to discuss the uniqueness of the mind as separate from the hand, of thought as distinguished from deed. Man can perform only one act, but he can entertain several conflicting wishes at the same time.

In a beautiful analogy, Dr. Gold explained that "Tephilin" illustrate the foregoing thesis admirably. The phylacteries on the arm are in one piece, reflecting the fact that a man can act at one time only in one way. The head

phylacteries, on the other hand, are composed of four individual compartments, illustrating the ability of the mind to entertain a variety of thoughts at any given moment.

Our lecturer discussed several manifestations of abnormal religiosity. Fanaticism exists, said he, when the overall goal of religion becomes relatively obscured in the presence of an exclusive preoccupation with details. Narcissistic religion is present when man turns religion inward and, in the spirit of Voltaire's quip, makes God in man's image.

Dr Gold dissented from the view that "religion is a mass neurosis" stemming from fear and guilt. He maintained that religion kills fear by supplying the element of wonder, and said that religion's goal was not to relieve symptoms but rather to enlarge the horizons of human life.

Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein who usually differs with, punctuates, or enlarges upon the remarks of the speaker, chose to do none of these things at this meeting. Instead he contented himself with asserting that our lecturer was not only a source of information, but also a model for emulation. Dr. Gold represented in his manner, breadth of knowledge, and conviction, a man who could teach as much by example as by instruction. Two hundred listeners were witnesses who could verify our rabbi's evaluation. The evening was certainly a memorable one in every respect.
