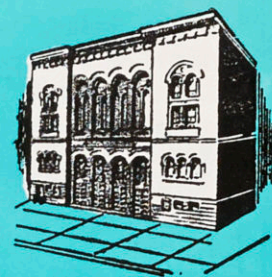

Report On Zionist Actions Committee

The Rabbi, who went to Israel to attend the world conference of the Zionist Actions Committee, has informed us by letter of the following title for his sermon this week: "A Close-Up of Israel and World Jewry" — An Eye Witness Report from the Zionist Actions Committee Meeting in Israel.

The Committee which is led by Dr. Nahum Goldman and which includes the top echelon of Zionist leadership, honored our Rabbi by making him Chairman of the Committee on Education and Culture in the Diaspora.

First Graduation at Bar Ilan

Rabbi Lookstein, as President of the Board of Governors of Bar Ilan University, delivered the major address at the first graduation exercises conducted by this first university under religious auspices in Israel.

He also presented honorary degrees upon the United States Ambassador to Israel, Ogden Reid, and upon Rabbi Judah L. Maimon the venerable Miz-rachi leader who serves as the guiding spirit of the Mossad HaRav Kook in Jerusalem.

Twenty seven students received their diplomas from the young university. An indication of the rapid growth of the institution is to be found in the current enrollment figures. There are, at present, over three hundred and twenty five students in the school.

While in Israel, the Rabbi held important conferences with Zalman Aranne, Minister of Education; Levi Eshkol, Minister of the Treasury; Dr. Joseph Burg, Minister of Welfare; and Moshe Shapiro, Minister of the Interior.

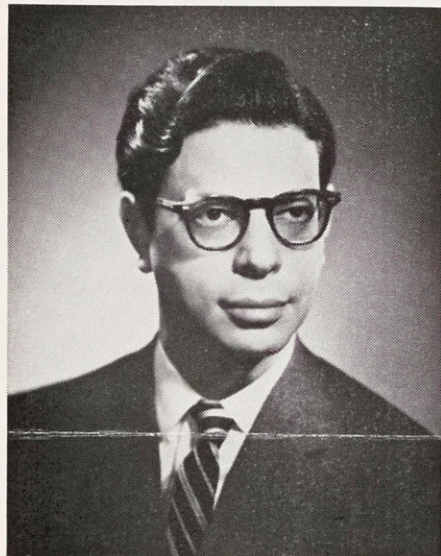
You will certainly want to be in the synagogue this sabbath to welcome back Rabbi and Mrs. Lookstein from their mission, and to hear the report.

Yeshiva University News:

130 ATTEND YESHIVA UNIVERSITY YOUTH SEMINAR 5 GIRLS ATTEND FROM KEHILATH JESHURUN

From December 24th through December 30th, the Youth Bureau of Yeshiva University conducted a Torah Leadership Seminar for high school students. One hundred and five youngsters participated in the seminar. They were supervised and guided by twenty five adults.

We were gratified to see that five girls from our congregational family attended the seminar. They are: Paula Ballan, Lillian Fortgang, Leah Heschel, Vivian Salzman and Judy Zaretsky.

68 Cities Represented

The seminarians came from the following states: Connecticut, Kansas, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and the District of Columbia. A few came also from the Canadian Provinces of Quebec and Ontario. By actual count, sixty eight cities were represented by one or more teen agers.

Joint Project of Yeshiva

Seven different departments of Yeshiva University were involved in this seminar. The Youth Bureau of the Community Service Division was, of course, in charge. A senior student of the Albert Einstein College of Medicine was in attendance in case of an emergency. The program was planned in part by the faculty of the School of Social Work. The Counselors were students of Yeshiva and Stern College. The faculty was composed of members of the Rabbinic Alumni, and the instructors from the Jewish Studies Program and the Teachers Institute.

Five Levels of Instruction

The educational program was conducted on five levels. The lowest began with an introduction to Judaism. Successive levels studied Fundamentals of Judaism, philosophical problems, and technical halachic questions.

The recreational program was, of course not ignored. The group had special evening activities, went ice skating and bowling, were snowed out of a projected skiing session, and sang and danced at every meal and during any spare time.

Special leadership sessions were also conducted in music, drama, the dance,

and journalism. The seminarians put on one play and even managed to publish a large newspaper.

The reaction to all of this? Perhaps the best evidence is to be gained from the weather conditions. On the last day, eight inches of snow fell in the Catskills where the seminar was being held. One and all joined in praying that the buses wouldn't get through to them to take them home. The buses did get through but there remains one consolation. In late August there will be another seminar; this time for twelve days instead of six.

An Eye Witness Report

Certainly the best testimony as to the value of the seminar would come from a participant. We, therefore, print, without editing, the following reaction of a girl from our community, Paula Ballan, who attended this event for the first time.

"The Torah Leadership Seminar which was held from December 24 through December 30, at Woodridge, New York, brought together the orthodox American teenagers whose role will be to lead the orthodox communities of the future. During this six-day period the participants lived a life of complete traditional Judaism.

"The activities at Seminar included not only recreation, but learning. We were divided into groups in accordance with past backgrounds, and, remaining in these groups, we met at sessions. These sessions were about an hour in length, and were not only classes of learning, but discussions and debates of extreme interest.

"Perhaps the most outstanding feature about Seminar was the spirit. This feeling was present at all times, and drew the Seminarians not only closer to each other, but closer to their religion and to God whom all felt was near at hand.

"When the bus which returned us to our modern and conflicting world, arrived at the Port Authority Terminal, no farewells were spoken, only brief goodbyes, for we will meet again soon; if not at Seminar then at the gathering of the orthodox leaders of the next decades."

YOUNG MARRIEDS DECIDE 'WHO'S BOSS'

A group of eight couples met last Saturday night at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Mort Blumenthal for a Young Marrieds meeting. The group seems to grow more cohesive with each successive meeting.

The feature of the evening, besides the delightful pastry of our hostess, was the showing of two films on Marriage and the Family, obtained through Yeshiva University's Audio Visual Department. The first, entitled "Who's Boss?", portrayed the dominance of one partner in marriage. The second, "Life with Baby" was a fascinating treatment of Dr. Gesell's discoveries in the field of child development.

The next meeting is planned for Saturday night February 20. On that occasion the group will discuss the pros and cons of a Day School education. Please reserve the date.
