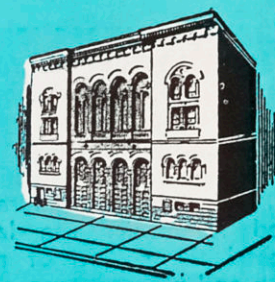

Federation Sabbath

Last Saturday, the congregation sponsored Federation Sabbath in the synagogue. The special occasion served a number of purposes.

First, we had an opportunity to render support to an organized philanthropy which maintains 116 Jewish institutions. As is our custom, a silent appeal was held. Our worshippers received cards on which they turned down a number corresponding to their contributions. No announcements were made of any pledges. Nevertheless the response was both warm and gratifying.

There was an important educational purpose served by the special sabbath. Our members were treated to an informative sermon by Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein in which he disclosed many hitherto unknown facts about Federation. He showed how the organization serves the totality of the Jewish Community from educational institutions to the poverty stricken and from hospitals to family guidance.

Unity Amidst Diversity —

Above and beyond the philanthropic and educational purposes of the sabbath, there was the added value in emphasizing the oneness of the Jewish Community of New York City. The Rabbi pointed out that in observing Federation Sabbath and in supporting the work of Federation we are contributing substantially to the cause of Jewish solidarity. In an age where differences of view and belief are paramount, there is much to say for an attempt which brings unity to our people where otherwise there might exist diversity.
