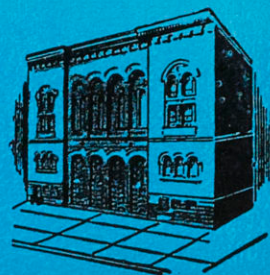

YESHIVA UNIVERSITY NEWS

Report No. 3

YOUTH BUREAU

This report is another in a series designed to acquaint our congregational family with the ever increasing services provided by Yeshiva University to the Traditional Jewish Community at large.

The Youth Bureau was organized as a part of the Community Service Division only five years ago. The Director at that time was Mr. Abraham Stern. He has continued to serve in that capacity to the present day and is now assisted by Mr. Cy Shavrick as Assistant Director.

Varied Services

This department serves as a virtual clearing house for all facets of youth work which affect the University, its students, and its alumni. The programs of the Youth Bureau center about six broad areas of service.

The Bureau handles all placement of students and alumni in youth activities. It maintains a consultive service for congregations affiliated with the Yeshiva University Synagogue Council. This service includes periodic field visits to assist synagogues in setting up their own Youth programs.

The Bureau also prepares publications for all facets of youth work and fosters training programs for youth leaders. The Bureau also carries on special services such as recruiting of students for Yeshiva and the maintenance of a large reference library for youth work materials.

Teen Programs

The outstanding area of activity to date has been the Youth Bureau's sponsorship of an organized teen program. This program can be divided into three spheres.

1. REGIONAL CONCLAVES — These assume the form of weekend meetings for teen agers of a given area. During the past three years over twenty five conclaves have been held in areas within a radius of six hundred miles of New York City.

These conclaves have attracted close to 3,500 youngsters.

The next conclave is scheduled for March 5-7 and will be held in Passaic, New Jersey. The youngsters will be accommodated at private homes and will have their meals and activities in one synagogue center. The fee of

\$11.50 is a nominal one. All interested are urged to contact Rabbi Haskel Lookstein for further details.

2. TORAH LEADERSHIP SEMINARS

These programs have been described in past issues of the Bulletin. During the past five years the program has reached 647 teen agers from the west coast to the east coast. Many of them have attended a number of seminars. The next one is scheduled for a twelve day period at the end of August, this year.

3. SUMMER INSTITUTE IN ISRAEL

This program is described in an adjoining article. In the past, some 40 to 50 teen agers have participated every year.

The Youth Bureau has made a significant contribution to Traditional Judaism in America. Under the leadership of its tireless director, it looks forward to more ambitious plans in the immediate future. The exact details of these plans will be disclosed in the next few months. Watch for them in the columns of the Bulletin.

TEEN AGE TOUR OF ISRAEL THIS SUMMER

For the benefit of our readers we wish to announce a Teen Age Tour of Israel for this coming summer. The tour is conducted by the Youth Bureau of Yeshiva University and is known by the name of Israel Institute.

The Israel Institute provides an opportunity for a select group of young men and women, ages 15 through 18, to visit Israel during the summer. Under expert direction, they become acquainted with its religion, geography, culture, and achievements.

The program features tours to all parts of the country. There are sessions in conversational Hebrew, Jewish laws and observances. The program seeks to relate the history and archeology of the country to Biblical sources.

The Institute, which includes a brief stopover in Europe, lasts approximately eight weeks and costs \$925.00, all expenses included.
