A Sermon on the Eve of the Twelfth Anniversary of Israel

The 1960-61 volume of the Book of Remembrance is now in preparation and will be ready for use by our worshippers for the Shavuoth Festival.

This booklet, together with a special Yizkor order of service, has become a regular feature of our synagogue service. To our knowledge it is the first such volume of its kind in any synagogue.

Worshippers will recall the old days when Yizkor was invariably associated with an appeal for funds. In order to maintain the sanctity and dignity of the service we have eliminated all such appeals.

In order, however, to fulfill the pledge for charity which is a regular part of the Yizkor service, we invite our worshippers to memorialize their dear departed ones by recording their names in our Book of Remembrance and by making a contribution in their memory once a year before Shavuoth.

Since this memorial booklet is not intended for fund raising, we try to stress the purely religious character of the offering by limiting it to no more than ten dollars and no less than five dollars for each name to be memorialized.

You have by now received correspondence from the Synagogue Office concerning the 1960-61 Book of Remembrance. The task of preparing the volume is an exacting one. You are requested therefore to return the authorization card listing the names of those to be included in the book. Please send the card with your token offering to the synagogue office without delay.

YOUNG MARRIEDS PARTICIPATE IN SOCIOLOGICAL STUDY

Thirteen couples from the Young Marrieds Group of the Congregation are serving as subjects for a study on empathy between marital partners. The purpose of the study is to determine effective methods for evaluating the husband-wife relationship.

The sponsor of the project is the Department of Home and Family Life at Teachers College, Columbia University. The supervisor of the study is Professor Mark Flapan, Associate Professor of Education at Teachers College.

The couples will jointly fill out a questionnaire and will be interviewed in their own homes. Their answers together with those of many other couples throughout the city will be evaluated and the results of the study will be published in the near future.

The Young Marrieds participating in this project are to be congratulated for helping social scientists to understand better the structure of the family and the relationship between husband and wife. When the study is finally published it will no doubt furnish a very interesting discussion topic at a future meeting of the Young Marrieds Group.

SUMMER ULPAN FOR COLLEGE STUDENTS

This summer, an unusual opportunity is being made available to college students to study Hebrew in an ULPAN—an accelerated course designed to give a thorough reading and speaking knowledge of Hebrew during a period of seven weeks.

The ULPAN is sponsored by the Student Zionist Organization of America whose offices are at 515 Park Avenue. The program consists of four hours a day devoted to Hebrew studies and one hour a day dedicated to modern Jewish history and current Jewish problems.

There will be substantial periods devoted to sports, swimming, and free time. Evening programs will include social and recreational events, as well as discussions, guest speakers, movies, and Israel dancing.

ISRAEL INDEPENDENCE DAY TO BE CELEBRATED AT SERVICES THIS SABBATH

This year the 12th anniversary of the establishment of the state of Israel occurs on Monday May 2nd. We will mark the observance of Israel Independence Day at special services this Saturday in the main synagogue.

Special prayers will be recited in both Hebrew and English which will capture the mood of an independence day celebrated in the tradition of Judaism. Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein's sermon will deal with some aspect of life in Israel.

Services Sunday Night and Monday Morning

On Sunday evening at 6:30 and on Monday morning at 7:30 the regular daily service will be embellished by

special prayers which follow the order of service prescribed by the Chief Rabbinate of Israel. On Sunday evening the Shofar will be sounded and on Monday morning Hallel will be recited.

We urge all our congregants to make a special effort to attend these services in honor of Israel Independence Day. According to our tradition the acquisition of freedom and independence is not marked by parades as much as by prayers, nor by fireworks as much as by fervent expressions of thanksgiving. We have an opportunity to live in accordance with this tradition by observing Israel Independence Day this week in the synagogue.

family problems. Last year, 14,000 families in greater New York came to the Agency for help. They came from every social, educational and economic level in the community.

Why did they come to the Jewish Family Service? A few examples will answer this question

- - - A bright boy is failing in school because he cannot tolerate the constant and bitter quarrelling of his parents. The school cannot cope with this problem and neither can the parents.

- - - An aged woman feels unwanted in her son-in-law's home and talks of leaving. Where can she go?

- - - A man and woman, married over 30 years, find that they cannot even talk together any more now that the routine problems of home building and child rearing are over. What is left of marriage for them?

Cases like those outlined above are handled by trained personnel who have a considerable scientific body of knowledge upon which to draw. These counsellors are in a position to offer guidance and advice which sometimes lessen and often resolve the emotional and social problems which affect so many families in the community.

The Jewish Family Service is but one of the outstanding agencies operated by the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of New York City. Its address is 113 West 57th Street.

Jewish Family Service

May 1st to May 7th has been designated as National Family Week. Whenever a special week is designated nationally, it is an indication of the importance which the nation ascribes to the project. It also indicates that all is not going well in the area with which the project is concerned. Our national leadership is alarmed at the disintegration of the family unit and the loss of moral, educational, and spiritual support which it once gave the citizenry of our nation. With these deficiencies in mind, National Family Week was proclaimed as an educational medium.

The Jewish Family Service, and the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies, is an Agency which observes National Family week 52 weeks a year. It is the largest counselling agency in the country which concerns itself with
