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Previews of Things to Come

The summer time at Kehilath Jeshurun is a period of intensive planning for the rest of the year. Week by week, decisions are made by the affiliates of the congregation. Here are some of the results of the past three weeks.

ADULT EDUCATION

Martin Markson reports that his committee on adult education has met several times during the summer and has formulated a splendid program for next season. Several features are of special interest.

Hebrew — In addition to maintaining the three classes which met last year, the Adult Institution will offer a new beginners' course for those who have no knowledge of the language. The course will begin in late October on a twice a week basis (Monday and Wednesday evenings) for four weeks, and then continue once a week.

Lecture Series — This series will be devoted to the history of Jewish philosophy as expounded by great Jewish personalities like Maimonides, Yehuda Halevi, and Saadia Gaon. There will be four lectures on the first Wednesday night of November, December, January, and February.

Sunday Supper Lecture Series — On Sunday, March 5th and 19th Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein will deliver lectures following supper at 6:30. He will be continuing a program which was received enthusiastically by our members in past years.

THE WEEKLY PORTION

Saturday, August 6

Vaethanan

The portion for this week is best known for the second reading of the Ten Commandments which is contained therein. The book of Deuteronomy is a summary of the contents of Exodus, Leviticus, and Numbers, and constitutes an extended farewell address on the part of Moses.

As part of the general review, the Ten Commandments and the description of the Sinaitic revelation are repeated in this week's portion. The portion begins with an impassioned plea on the part of Moses for permission to enter the Land of Israel. This plea is phrased in the form of a prayer and was heard by God but not answered. The Jew has traditionally considered God as one who hears prayer. There is never a guarantee, however, that the prayer will be answered.

The closing part of the portion contains the "Shema" — the concise credo of monotheism accepted by every Jew and recited twice daily as part of his prayers.

Saturday, August 13

Ekev

This portion features a historical review of the sojourn of Israel in the wilderness with special emphasis upon the sin of the golden calf. In describing the richness of the Promised Land, the Bible says: "And you shall eat and be satisfied and then you shall bless God," thereby providing the source for the Grace after Meals.

This portion also contains the oft-quoted judgement that "man does not live by bread alone but rather upon God's word"; that is, man must live by ethical principles rather than by economic motives.

The portion closes with the second paragraph of the Shema, containing the classical expression of the principle of Reward and Punishment.

HIGH HOLY DAY SEATS

Letters were sent this week to all seat holders announcing the beginning of our sale of seats for the High Holy Days.

With our constantly expanding membership, it is becoming increasingly difficult to accommodate all non members who would like to worship with us on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. It is, therefore, suggested that those interested in reserving places contact the synagogue office without delay.

We also urge our members to inform us promptly of their needs for seats. Their attention to this matter will enable us to serve the community more efficiently and will help to avoid any unpleasantness resulting from a shortage of space.

KIDDUSH SPONSORS
