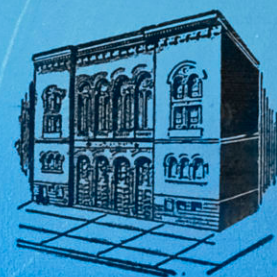

TORAH HONORS AWARDED TO THOMAS BORNSTEIN, JACOB P. SHULMAN AND SIDNEY FLATOW

Kehilath Jeshurun has again singled out three of its esteemed sons for the choice Torah honors of the year. Mr. Thomas Bornstein was selected to be "Chasan Torah." Jacob P. Shulman was appointed "Chasan Bereshith" and Sidney Flatow was designated as "Chasan Maftir".

Thomas Bornstein is one of the senior members of the congregation. His affiliation with Kehilath Jeshurun extends for more than four decades. Throughout those years his place in the synagogue has rarely been vacant and together with his dear wife he is always to be found at worship in our House of God.

Thomas Bornstein has filled many important offices in our congregation. He served with special distinction for many years as treasurer of Kehilath Jeshurun and always labored faithfully for the well-being of the congregation. His most valiant services were rendered during the dark and difficult days of the depression when he

was a tower of strength to Kehilath Jeshurun.

His sons and daughters were raised and married in our House of God. And now his grandchildren are continuing the tradition of their forebearers in their attachment to their ancestral sanctuary. Two of his grandchildren received their education at Ramaz School and in our afternoon religious school.

Mr. Bornstein is a generous contributor to all that is worthy in the community. He and his wife visited Israel twice and, while there, manifested love and generosity for many of the leading institutions in the land.

Jacob P. Shulman is relatively new in Kehilath Jeshurun. Nevertheless, he has already demonstrated loyalty and devotion to the congregation and has won high regard for his faithful labors in behalf of our House of God.

The "Chasan Bereshith" is a graduate of the Yeshiva Etz-Chaim which later merged with the Rabbi Isaac El-

chanan Theological Seminary, now the Rabbinic School of Yeshiva University. He received a law degree cum laude from New York Law School but devotes his time to the purchase, sale and management of real estate.

His three daughters were all married in our House of God. His two grandchildren are now students at Ramaz School. His good wife is active in the Sisterhood.

Jack Shulman has especially distinguished himself as vice chairman of our House Committee. He gave unsparingly of his time and effort towards the beautification of our main sanctuary and towards a variety of improvements in every part of our synagogue structure. In this area of activity he is one of the precious assets of Kehilath Jeshurun.

Sidney Flatow is a young man who can rightfully boast of a splendid career in Jewish life. Descended from a rabbinic family, he has given him-

self from his earliest youth to the advancement of the welfare of the Jewish community.

After distinguished service overseas with the Seventh Army during the second world war, he became an officer of UNRRA and was appointed the director of the Zeilsheim Displaced Persons Camp in Germany. He transformed this erstwhile Nazi slave labor center into a haven of refuge for the Jewish DP's. He is rightfully credited with saving the lives of thousands of Jewish concentration camp survivors.

Upon his return to America, Mr. Flatow toured the country and visited every community of the land in behalf of the United Jewish Appeal. He and his dear wife Frances are up to this day generous and devoted workers in behalf of that Appeal as well as in behalf of other important philanthropies.

We extend warm and hearty congratulations to the "grooms of the law" and to their families. The honors that have been conferred upon them are truly deserved. We wish them and their families the blessings that come from association with a Torah life.

During the Musaf service on Shemini Atzereth, the "grooms of the law" will be inducted into office at a special ceremony that has become traditional in our midst. They will be escorted to places of honor on the front platform alongside the Holy Ark. The entire congregation is cordially invited to attend the induction and in that way pay tribute to these deserving gentlemen. A very happy and gay festival is in store for all of us.

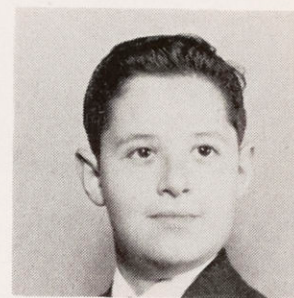

HAKAFOTH AT KEHILATH JESHURUN

On Thursday night, October 13, we will begin the celebration of the completion of the Torah — Simchath Torah. From year to year the congregation which assembles in the evening and in the morning grows in numbers, increases in enjoyment, and expands in merry-making. The Chassidic spirit is a rare phenomenon in Yorkville but on Simchath Torah it is experienced in full in our synagogue.

The singing and the dancing contribute to the gaiety. The marching of Junior Marshals before each Torah procession compounds the joy. The impromptu choir of young people which supports the Cantor as he incorporates a medley of congregational melodies into the prayers furthers the atmosphere of merriment. It is a wonderful evening and day for the whole family, with the children serving as the guests of honor.

In order to enable the evening services to run smoothly we should like to call your attention to the following matters.

1. Come with your families but please refrain from bringing children under 4 years to the synagogue. Experience has shown that their limited attention span works a hardship upon the children themselves and upon the adults who would like to enjoy the proceedings.
2. Please bring the children to the school auditorium on time — no later than 5:40. Please also be good enough not to bring them before 5:25 since a long wait will only make them restless.
3. Paraphrasing a well known commercial statement, "Don't make a fuss; leave their care to us." Competent leaders will be in charge of the children and are equipped to deal with all their needs.

After the benediction you may meet your children in the main synagogue lobby (downstairs) where they will receive the special sweets which constitute so vital a part of the Simchath Torah tradition.

Remember the schedule: Mincha at 5:30 — children not before 5:25 and not after 5:40. Come and participate in the festivities.

HEADLINES OF JEWISH INTEREST**World Bank Assists Israel**

The World Bank agreed this month to lend Israel the equivalent of 27.5 million dollars to build and equip a sheltered deep-water port at Ashdod on the Mediterranean Coast, twenty miles south of Tel Aviv.

At the same time, the United States Export-Import Bank announced a loan of 8.9 million dollars to El Al, Israel National Airlines, to assist it in the purchase of two Boeing-707 jet aircraft.

Progress of Zim Lines

On August 17, the S. S. Theodore Herzl left Haifa on her one hundredth voyage. During the three years of her Mediterranean run, this modern flagship of Zim, Israel's national shipping company, has carried 84,000 passengers including on her last voyage, a Mr. Theodore Herzl (no relative).

Next year, Zim will introduce a fifth major vessel, the "Moledet", now being built in France.

One Third of Israel Population in School

Over 600,000 students returned to or started school in Israel on September 1 after the summer vacation. Thus, out of a population of slightly more than two million, almost one third is engaged in academic study.

News for Tourists to Israel

The latest convenience to be introduced for the benefit of the more than fifty thousand Americans who visit Israel each year, is the issue in New York of travelers' checks in Israel Pounds.

An added convenience is that, from now on, American tourists will be able to exchange State of Israel Dollar Bonds into Israel, Pound travelers' checks up to an amount of 1,500 dollars per person.

Special Show at Tiffany

For the benefit of those who may be considering their "Chanukah shopping" in advance, a unique one-man show of blown glass objects by the Haifa artist, Ariel Bar-Tal, is now on display at Tiffany in New York. The exhibit, which shows strongly the influence of the ancient Palestinian glass of the First to Fourth Centuries, will continue through October 6th. Featured objects include urns, bowls, and vases.

ADULT EDUCATION WEEK COMING

In a few days you will receive the 1960-61 Adult Institute Brochure announcing the schedule of classes in our Adult Institute for the year.

The Adult Institute will formally begin sessions during the week beginning Saturday, October 22. That week has been designated as Adult Education week in our congregation.

We hope that this year we will continue the phenomenal growth of the past two years. We hope that every member of our congregational family will avail himself of the opportunity to increase the dimensions of his Jewish knowledge.

For your information we will mention a few of the opportunities which await you in this year's program.

1. Four Hebrew Classes—last year's three are continuing with the same instructors and we are adding an additional elementary course for beginners.

5. Two Groups in the Am HaSefer Program will read four outstanding volumes of general Jewish interest. These groups are limited to a maximum of twenty people to a group.
6. A Women's Class on the Prayer Book which will meet Mondays at 11:00 o'clock.
