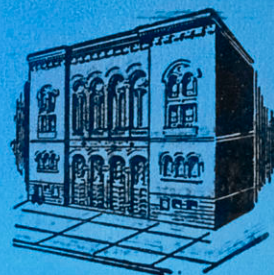

FATHER AND SON MINYAN TO RENEW ACTIVITIES Thirteenth Season Begins This Sunday

The Father and Son Minyan will officially launch its 13th consecutive season of activity with an inaugural service this Sunday morning at 9:30.

This unique program will once again be conducted by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein and will be held every Sunday morning until the end of March. The assistant rabbi will be aided this year by Charles Kleinhaus, a student at Columbia College who is himself an alumnus of the Minyan.

The Father and Son Minyan is a three part program for boys and girls and their fathers. The first part consists of a morning service in the chapel where the young men officiate as cantors. Rabbi Lookstein explains certain prayers in order to make the experience of "davening" a more meaningful one.

The worshippers then proceed at 10:30 to the social hall where a delicious breakfast awaits them. Following the breakfast and the Grace after meals, the boys engage in an hour and a half period of basketball in the gym.

This program of spiritual and physical nourishment is available to all young men (and ladies) and their fathers. We invite all to join us as we begin the season this Sunday morning.

MAX J. ETRA URGES ALL TO PARTICIPATE

Mr. Max J. Etra, president of the congregation, acting upon the request of Martin Markson, Chairman of the Adult Education Committee, announced that October 22-29 would be marked in our congregation as Adult Education Week. The occasion is the formal opening of the Kehilath Jeshurun Adult Institute. Mr. Etra, himself an active member of the institute who received credits for courses taken during the first two years, urged that every member in the congregation make an effort to attend at least one class during this week. He is confident that once a member participates in a class he will want to continue.

The Commandments of Judaism

Saturday, 50 minutes before
Mincha

Instructor: Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

This Sabbath class is continuing this year to study the Sefer HaChinuch, a compendium of the 613 Commandments of Judaism. The session each week will be devoted to the study of one specific commandment and will

be designed to show its source in the Torah and its development through Jewish legal codes.

The course, which proved to be very popular last year, will be given in English.

Talmud Class

Wednesday 8 - 9 P.M.

Instructor: Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

This class will continue the study of the tractate "Beizah" (Yom Tov) in an intensive manner designed to deepen the student's understanding of the laws, rituals, customs and spirit of Yom Tov and Shabbat. The language of instruction is English.

In addition to the fine group of students who are "regulars" in this class, there are many others in our congregational family who would appreciate Talmud study. All interested students are urged to come this week and learn for themselves what worlds are to be gained from studying the classic book of Jewish knowledge.

The Prayer Book - A Class for Women

Monday, October 31, 11 - 12 noon

Instructor: Rabbi Haskel Lookstein

This class, which will begin on the Monday following Adult Education Week, will continue the study of prayer begun last year.

This year the course will deal with specific prayers which are recited in the synagogue. All women readers are cordially invited to participate in this class.

HEBREW CLASSES

Beginners Course

Monday and Wednesday 8-9 P.M.

For the second year in a row we are offering a rapid course in Hebrew for beginners. This course will meet on Mondays and Wednesdays for the first four weeks and thereafter continue on Wednesday evenings.

If you cannot read Hebrew at present, here is your opportunity. If you would like to learn what 20 students learned last year — the reading, writing, and speaking of simple Hebrew — take advantage of this course. If you desire to be able to follow the synagogue service in Hebrew, come this Monday at 8 P.M.

Wednesday 8-9 P.M.

This class is last year's beginners class continuing the study of reading, speaking and writing Hebrew.

Hebrew 3

Wednesday 8-9 P.M.

This is a continuation of Mr. Fuchs' course of last year with emphasis on siddur reading and comprehension.

This class is one year ahead of Hebrew 2.

Hebrew 4

Wednesday 8-9 P.M.

Instructor: Mrs. Alice Rothkowitz

This is our advanced Hebrew class of last year, catering to students with a greater proficiency in reading, writing and speaking Hebrew. The course will deal intensively with Hebrew Literature.

— AM HASEFER PROGRAM — A JEWISH BOOK OF THE MONTH CLUB

This program enables members of a group to read one book of Jewish interest every six weeks (four in all) and meet at the end of the period to discuss the book. It met last year with outstanding success and will appeal to many people with an intellectual interest.

The rabbi explored with the group the traditional viewpoint on law in Judaism. A distinction was made between the non-observant Orthodox Jew who accepts the principle of law but does not adhere to all of the laws; and adherents to other views of Judaism who reject the principle of law altogether and consider their religion as an aggregate of customs which can be accepted or rejected depending upon individual preference.

Following the discussion and elections, the young people made plans for a gala Israel program to be held this Sunday, October 23, at 1:30 in the social hall. The feature of the afternoon will be performances and instruction by a special dance group. Paula Ballan and Vivian Salzman will lead songs while playing a duet on the guitar. Appropriate Israel delicacies will be served and a wonderful afternoon is anticipated.

All teen agers between the ages of fourteen and eighteen are cordially invited to come this Sunday with their friends.

JUNIOR CONGREGATION GROWTH

THE WEEKLY PORTION Noah, Genesis 6:9-11:32

This portion highlights the primeval flood which inundated the world when God viewed his creatures and the corruption which had seized them. One righteous man and his family were saved in order that mankind might not be obliterated altogether.

Following the flood, God made a solemn oath never again to wreak destruction upon a world. In an era when man has the capacity to destroy human life on this planet in a flood of nuclear explosions, that ancient promise of the Almighty takes on sublime meaning.

The other highlight of the portion is the story of man's attempt to reach Divine heights in the famous episode of the Tower of Babel. The result was a race of human beings who were less than human. The division of mankind and the estrangement of man from man which ensued from this dismal project is a source of anguish to the present day when we strive with meagre success toward the goal of a united world.

HEADLINES OF JEWISH INTEREST

30 Congressmen Petition Eisenhower

Thirty Congressmen from several states petitioned President Eisenhower to oppose the seating of the United Arab Republic on the United Nations Security Council.

Citing "the role the UAR has played in disturbing the peace," the 30 members of the House pointed out that the United Nations has received complaints against the UAR from Israel, Lebanon, Sudan and Iraq.

Postscript to an Embarrassing Issue

A total of 674 Jewish policemen — about half the estimated number of Jews on the force — were given the day off to observe Yom Kippur, the Police Department announced. The department said that all Jewish members of the force who requested the day off were relieved of duty by sundown on Yom Kippur Eve. The other Jewish policemen presumably either did not request time off or were not regularly scheduled to work during the Holy Day.

U. S. Grant to Hillside Hospital

The United States Public Health Service awarded the Hillside Hospital here a research grant of more than \$250,000 for the next three years to study brain function in human behavior. Hillside Hospital is a member of the New York Federation of Jewish Philanthropies.

Yeshiva University Enrolls 5,000

The 74th year of Yeshiva University will find five thousand students attending classes in its seventeen schools and divisions.

Among the most significant gains were made in Yeshiva College and Stern College for Women which both increased their student bodies by twenty percent. Qualitatively, the College classes show a much higher average score on the college entrance examinations than in previous years.

YOUNG ADULTS HEAR REPORT ON ISRAEL

The Young Adults League of the congregation held its opening meeting of the season last Sunday evening in the Social Hall. Forty brave souls ignored a driving rainstorm to attend this meeting. They were amply rewarded by a fascinating lecture given by Oded Remba, a recognized authority on Middle Eastern affairs.

Mr. Remba described the program of technical assistance given by Israel to twenty six African and Asian countries. He showed why this program has won so many plaudits from the nations of the world.

The program began in 1953 when Burma was looking for help in developing her land. She chose Israel's government and methods as a model. Burmese delegations lived on collective settlements in Israel for two years and then brought back the techniques to their homeland.

In the meantime, Israel sent experts to Burma and to other African lands. At present there are 526 Israelis working under this aid program in 26 Afro-Asian countries. They render assistance as medical experts, economists, statisticians, electrical and construction engineers, shipping experts and in many other capacities.

Why has the Program Succeeded?

The success of the program has been due to a variety of factors. First, these

countries all desire to maintain neutrality in the cold war and Israel's assistance is uncluttered by political strings. Second, these nations are anxious to have the government concern itself with the welfare of the citizens and the growth of the economy. Israel serves as a model for the successful application of this point of view.

Third, Israel gives only that assistance which the fledgling nation requests. Other nations tend to tell the young countries what assistance they should have. This frequently creates ill will.

Israel's purpose in this program is to develop a corps of friends among the young neutralist nations of Africa and Asia. That she has succeeded is evident from the fact that Nkrumah, Prime Minister of Ghana spoke out at the U.N. against Nasser, a fellow neutralist, and called openly for recognition of Israel and a solution to the Arab refugee problem.

The Young Adults League was fortunate to hear this analysis from Mr. Remba and cordially invites all young people of college age through the twenties to participate in its forthcoming program. The next affair will be a Saturday night dance on November 19th, with a band, refreshments, and a wonderful time.
