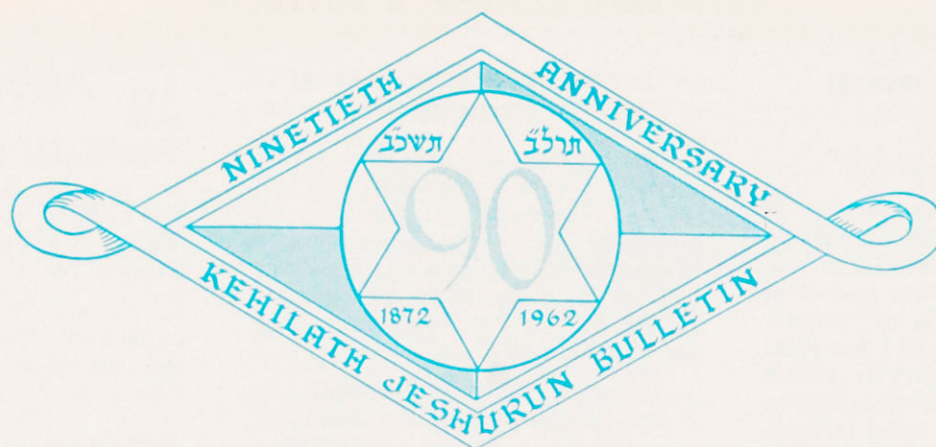

"THE RELUCTANT MOSES — WHAT MAY WE LEARN FROM HIM?"

THE WEEKLY PORTION

SHEMOTH

"Building for Leadership"

We are all familiar with the story of the birth of Moses which appears in this week's portion from the Torah. The child was brought up by his mother as the agent of the daughter of Pharaoh. We read in the Bible "And the child matured and she brought him to the daughter of Pharaoh and became her son . . . And it came to pass in those days that Moses matured and he went out among his brothers and he saw their travails."

Our sages remark that the child matured first in the home of his mother and then again in the home of Pharaoh's daughter. This would indicate that his early development was supervised by his mother. It comes, therefore, as no surprise that upon his complete maturity he went out among his brothers and "he saw their travails".

It would appear that the training which he received in his mother's home rendered him capable of feeling the anguish of the Children of Israel. It is by no means natural for a child to be sympathetic to the problems of others. This is an acquired characteristic. It must be learned by the child and it must, therefore, be taught by parents.

The ideal method for teaching such concern is for the parents themselves to show concern for others. This method was epitomized by Moses' mother who was, as we read in this week's portion, the mid-wife for the Jewish People at that time. It was she who saved countless children from being cast into the sea by the officers of Pharaoh.

Parents can learn from the example of Moses' mother. If in their discussions at home they evince concern for the welfare of the Jewish people, their children will catch their concern from them. If they support the United Jewish Appeal, the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies, and other philanthropic organizations which help our fellow Jews, their children will develop a sense of the importance of charity and rendering help to those in need.

"And the woman took the child and she nursed him." From all that we know of Moses we must assume that he was nursed not only on the milk which sustains life but the milk of human kindness which makes life worthwhile.

HEADLINES OF JEWISH INTEREST

Because of the newspaper strike which has brought about a blackout of all the news including news of Jewish interest, we devote a larger portion in this week's bulletin to a review of items of Jewish interest which might have come to our reader's attention were the regular New York papers publishing daily.

Figures on a new Jewish census

According to a survey compiled by the World Jewish Congress, there are now 12,915,000 Jews in the World, living in 122 lands. 10,000,000 Jews live in free countries; 5,500,000 in the U. S., 2,200,000 in Israel. There are about 2,300,000 Jews in the U. S. S. R. Because of the recent influx of Jews from North Africa, France has moved to fourth place in its Jewish population which now numbers over 500,000.

Economic Problems or Religious Persecution?

Of 90 U. S. S. R. citizens sentenced to death for so-called "economic crimes," 50 were Jews, the Sunday Telegraph of London stated, in a summary of anti-Jewish actions in Russia. The newspaper charged the U. S. S. R. with "a deliberate policy of making the Jews the scapegoats for widespread embezzlement and profiteering".

Since the appearance of this information in the Sunday Telegraph of London, nine Jews were sentenced to death and ten others were given long prison terms in two separate mass trials in the Ukraine. All were charged with "economic crimes".

Jerusalem Court Pronounces Sentence in "Yossele" Case

Shalom Shtarkes was sentenced by a Jerusalem District Court to three years imprisonment for kidnapping his nephew Yossele Schumacher and to two years for perjury in connection with the case. The sentences will run concurrently. One of the judges in the three member court was Benjamin Halevi.

Institute of Jewish Law Established in Israel

An Institute of Jewish Law was established last week under the joint

auspices of the Law faculty of the Hebrew University and the Institute of Jewish Studies.

The foremost task of the Institute will be the compilation of detailed indices of legal material contained in Rabbinic Responsa, codes (Posekim) and other Rabbinic ordinances (takanot). The Institute will serve, as one of its purposes, as a basis for the Legislative Department of the Ministry of Justice with the aim of basing Israel Parliamentary Law on the principles of Jewish Law.

Exemptions for American Investors in Israel

The Knesseth approved an amendment to the tax law extending to ten years the exemption from income taxes of approved investments in Israel. The amendment, designed to encourage capital investments in the State of Israel, also provides other new advantages to investors.

Government Grants \$636,000 to Albert Einstein Medical Center

A grant of \$636,000 has been awarded by the United States Government to the Albert Einstein Medical Center to help build a new three story 1,300,000 research center. The new research center will be an annex to the Hospital's present research building in which some 140 scientists and technicians are engaged in research supported by more than \$2,000,000 in annual grants.

West Germany moves to extradite Nazi from Chile

The West German Government last week formally requested the Government of Chile to extradite Walter Rauff, a leading Gestapo Officer and former General of Hitler's S.S. Corps, who is under arrest in Chile on German charges of having participated in the war time murder of 9,000 Jews.

SUMMER CAMP IN ISRAEL FOR TEENAGE BOYS

We are in receipt of an announcement from the Rabbinical Council of America about a new American camp in Israel which will be operated for the first time for six weeks during July and August of 1963. The camp, Camp "Daromah", will be conducted under the auspices of the Rabbinical Council of America and will be housed on the grounds of the Yeshivat Hadorom.

The total cost for the season, including all transportation charges, will be \$875. Two age groups will be accepted, a Bar Mitzvah group (ages 13-14) and a senior group (15-17).

In addition to the athletic and swimming program of the camp, there will be a special study program for advanced Yeshiva students and one for those who are less advanced in their studies. The campers will also enjoy a complete tour of Israel.

Nasser's Military Campaign Threatened by Pending Congressional Legislation

An early campaign in the 88th Congress was anticipated to implement the Keating - Halpern Amendment to the Mutual Security Act which would bar United States Foreign Aid to nations like the United Arab Republic which used their own resources, freed by means of American aid, to purchase soviet arms and to conduct military campaigns in foreign countries. Senator Jacob K. Javits, Republican of New York, and Senator Ernest Gruening, Democrat from Alaska, both of whom recently visited the Middle East, are expected to ask the Senate to embark upon a new appraisal of American Foreign Policy in that troubled area.
