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ONE THOUSAND WORSHIPPERS CELEBRATE PURIM AT KEHILATH JESHURUN

Last weekend was the most memorable Purim in the recollection of many members of the Kehilath Jeshurun family. At the evening services on Saturday night and at the gala morning service on Sunday, something in excess of one thousand worshippers celebrated this happiest of all happy holidays.

The main floor of the synagogue was virtually filled on Saturday night with men, women and children for the first Purim service. The service began with Mincha and was followed by a discourse on the laws and significance of the Purim observance.

By the time Ma'ariv began, there was hardly a seat left. Close to one hundred children filled the front section of the synagogue. They were, of course, armed with the proper implements with which to do battle with Haman.

The Megillah was read on Saturday night by our esteemed Associate Trustee, Mr. Joseph E. Adler. Time and time again he tried to slip past the name of Haman without notice, only to be stopped by the children, to the delight of all present. Sometimes, as a matter of fact, the children managed to get in two rounds of noise-making for a single mention of Haman's name.

The morning service was, if possible, even more impressive. In accordance with our tradition, the entire service was conducted by students of Ramaz High School. The entire floor of the main synagogue was comfortably filled, and many women were present in the balcony.

The students acquitted themselves admirably in conducting the service. The cantors were Richard Kahn and Steven Lorch. The Torah was read by Joshua Barzilay. Alan Kalischer served as gabbai.

KI TISSA "Making An Idol of Man"

Our portion for this week is noted for, among other things, the incident of the golden calf described therein. A people liberated only yesterday from slavery, who witnessed the miracle of the Red Sea, and who participated in the Divine Revelation at Sinai, now eschews the living God and turns to idol worship. How can we account for it?

Our sages tell us that the underlying cause of the deification of the calf was the erroneous deification of Moses. The people saw in Moses not the servant of God but the incarnation of the great liberator, the peerless emancipation. "For this man Moses, who took us out of Egypt, we know not what has become of him." When the human god disappears, an animal god is created as a substitute.

God had tried to avoid all of this. He had chosen a modest man as leader, one of halting speech and of self-effacing personality. Nevertheless, people tend to worship their heroes. And when the hero vanishes, if only temporarily, a new object of worship must be found.

Judaism stands clearly in opposition to this tendency. The doctor is not God; he is an agent. The president is not God; he is an instrument. The teacher or rabbi are not God; they are spokesmen for his revelation. The scientist, artist or musician are not God; they are gifted with God's talents and wisdom.

When Moses tried to restore the proper balance among the people, his challenge and rhetorical question were clear: "Who is for God, let him come to me!" I, the servant of the Lord, will lead the people who are servants of the Lord.

PASSOVER RELIEF APPEAL LAUNCHED

"All who are hungry let them come and eat with us."

This is a quotation, from the Haggadah, with which we begin the Seder Service on Passover night. Inasmuch as it is impossible for all of us to fulfill this statement literally, we observe its spirit and intent by giving to the needy before Passover. The traditional name for the Pre-Passover appeal in "MAOS CHITIM."

In our Congregation this Appeal has always elicited a warm and generous response. This year, a minimum of \$7,000 will be required to take care of those causes and individuals who turn to us for assistance. Out of this fund, too, we will be able to take care of special deserving families whose need we know and who would not normally come to the attention of public charity.

A special letter about this Appeal has already been sent to you. It is an Appeal to our entire Kehilath Jeshurun family — members, seat holders and friends alike — to respond generously to our campaign this year. We

approach all because we try to benefit all.

Together with the letter which you have already received, or will shortly receive, you will find a Passover Food Directory, showing all those products under the supervision of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America. This booklet, is sent to you to assist you in ordering your Passover food needs.

You can assist others in preparing for their Passover, by sending your contribution to the Passover Relief Fund, without delay. In that way, you will accomplish the most good.

As in the past, we will publish a list of donors in the Bulletin about two weeks before Passover.

When you sit down at the Seder table this year, the opening statement of the Haggadah will have added meaning for you when you realize that your contribution helped others who might not ordinarily come to your attention.
