

RABBI JOSEPH H. LOOKSTEIN ELECTED CHANCELLOR OF BAR-ILAN UNIVERSITY

Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, after serving for eight years as Acting President of Bar-Ilan University in Israel, was elected Chancellor of the University. The announcement was made by Minister Moshe Shapiro, Minister of the Interior in the State of Israel.

The Rabbi was greeted in his new capacity at a Charter Day Dinner, held recently at the Waldorf-Astoria, at which Vice President Humphrey received the first honorary degree awarded by the University. The Rabbi conferred the degree on the Vice President at an appropriate academic ceremony.

Rabbi Lookstein informed the gathering that a President, who will remain in residence at Bar-Ilan, has been elected. He is Professor Max Jammer, a world-renowned physicist and a member of the faculty of the University.

Bar-Ilan now has a student body of close to three thousand and a faculty of over four hundred. It is situated on a spacious and beautiful campus in Ramat-Gan, near Tel Aviv. About fifteen academic buildings are already on the campus, and several new buildings are in the process of construction.

In answer to a number of inquiries, the Rabbi explained that, contrary to newspaper reports, his intention is to pursue the functions of his new office without any change in his rabbinic duties at Kehilath Jeshurun and the Ramaz School.

The Rabbi heartily thanks the members of the Kehilath Jeshurun family who were kind enough to write to him and to congratulate him on his new post. He received countless messages from the members of the Congregation and from parents at Ramaz School.

"Building for Leadership"

We are all familiar with the story of the birth of Moses which appears in this week's portion from the Torah. The child was brought up by his mother as the agent of the daughter of Pharaoh. We read in the Bible "And the child matured and she brought him to the daughter of Pharaoh and became her son . . . And it came to pass in those days that Moses matured and he went out among his brothers and he saw their travails."

Our sages remark that the child matured first in the home of his mother and then again in the home of Pharaoh's daughter. This would indicate that his early development was supervised by his mother. It comes, therefore, as no surprise that upon his complete maturity he went out among his brothers and "he saw their travails".

It would appear that the training which he received in his mother's home rendered him capable of feeling the anguish of the Children of Israel. It is by no means natural for a child to be sympathetic to the problems of others. This is an acquired characteristic. It must be learned by the child and it must, therefore, be taught by parents.

The ideal method for teaching such concern is for the parents themselves to show concern for others. This method was epitomized by Moses' mother who was, as we read in this week's portion, the mid-wife for the Jewish People at that time. It was she who saved countless children from being cast into the sea by the officers of Pharaoh.

Parents can learn from the example of Moses' mother. If in their discussions at home they evince concern for the welfare of the Jewish people, their children will catch their concern from them. If they support the United Jewish Appeal, the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies, and other philanthropic organizations which help our fellow Jews, their children will develop a sense of the importance of charity and rendering help to those in need.

"And the woman took the child and she nursed him." From all that we know of Moses we must assume that he was nursed not only on the milk which sustains life but the milk of human kindness which makes life worthwhile. H. L.

OF COMMUNITY INTEREST

(We are happy to print below a statement which we received from Hon. Samuel H. Hofstadter, Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of New York. The timeliness and significance of this statement are evident from the text itself. Ed.)

"THE SPIRIT OF FREEDOM"

"December 15 marked the 175th anniversary of the adoption of the Bill of Rights (the first Ten Amendments) of the United States Constitution. Magna Carta and other charters of freedom were concessions from a sovereign ruler to a subject people. But our Constitution - opening with "We the people" - was a grant of power from a sovereign people to a government as its agent, with specific limitations particularized in a Bill of Rights. As Jefferson wrote to Madison (who drafted it): "A Bill of Rights is what the people are entitled to against every government." Indeed, historians agree that the Constitution might not have been ratified had the States not been assured that it would be supplemented by a Bill of Rights.

Originally, the Bill of Rights was operative only against the Federal Government; but the 14th Amendment rendered many of its canons applicable to the States. Supreme Court decisions insisting on the inviolability of individual privilege vindicate the Bill of Rights as an instrument of democracy in actual being - "a government of laws and not of men." It is a living demonstration that only through the rule of law are liberties meaningful and lasting - those sought by disorder and violence breed lawlessness, destroying the very foundation upon which freedom must rest."
