

YOUNG MARRIEDS DISCUSS ORTHODOX JEWISH INVOLVEMENT IN POLITICS

The Young Marrieds Group of the congregation assembled, 66 strong, for its annual meeting in the home of Rabbi and Mrs. Haskel Lookstein, on Saturday night, February 3rd. The meeting not only attracted a large attendance to our Associate Rabbi's home; it also stimulated a vociferous and enthusiastic discussion of the involvement of the Orthodox Jew in local and national political problems.

The guest for the evening was Dr. Charles Liebman, Professor of Political Science at Yeshiva University. Dr. Liebman, in a brief talk, cited studies and surveys which show that while all Jews as a group tend to be more liberal than the norm in the population, Orthodox Jews, on the whole, tend to be more conservative in their political views by comparison with Conservative and Reform Jews.

Dr. Liebman presented a number of theories to explain this tendency.

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There is sometimes a feeling among traditional Jews — though a mistaken one — that the problems of the general community are less important than are matters of specifically Jewish concern. Thus, whether there is more public housing or less, more integration or less, more government involvement in directing the economy or less, are sometimes considered to be matters of marginal significance. The inappropriateness of such a stand on the part of traditional Jews was debated with great fervor at the meeting.

Secondly, there is a tendency on the part of the more religious elements in the population — sometimes referred to as the more fundamentalist groups — to be suspicious of change in the status quo, in general. Orthodox individuals and organizations often reflect this reluctance to change.

Dr. Liebman also cited several theological positions which tend to be reflected in more conservative behavior on the part of those who accept these positions. One example would be the theological view that the goal of man is primarily self-improvement rather than social betterment. This is, of course, a Christian bias, but it is one which has made something of an intrusion into traditional Jewish circles — a mistaken intrusion, but nonetheless real.

The Young Marrieds heatedly debated the points raised by Dr. Liebman, not only in the formal question and answer period that followed his presentation, but also for several hours thereafter. This was, without a doubt, one of the most provocative discussions ever held by this group. It gave the members a chance to see some of the flaws in their own thinking and the extent to which traditional Judaism has been affected by theological concepts and theories which are distinctly foreign to it.

"The Ethical Quest As A Religious Experience" To Be Discussed on Wed., Feb. 28

The next lecture in our Adult Institute's series on "Directions in Orthodox Judaism on the American Scene," will be delivered by Rabbi Martin L. Gordon on Wednesday evening, February 28, at 8:30 o'clock, in the social hall. The title of his lecture will be: "The Ethical Quest as a Religious Experience."

Our recent evening with Rabbi Zalman Posner of the Lubavitcher Movement served as an excellent preface to Rabbi Gordon's subject. Rabbi Posner, it will be recalled, stressed the ethical movement in Judaism as being the method whereby man may be inspired to the service of God.

Recently, a new generation of Orthodox Jewish thinkers and scholars have begun to highlight the ethics of Judaism and their message for our day. Considerable research has been done in trying to discern the Halakhic approach to contemporary ethical problems.

The areas which have been explored are business ethics and professional relationships, the control of the individual by society and the role of the individual in molding and influencing society.

One of the leading lights in this new generation of scholars is Rabbi Martin L. Gordon, Instructor in Religious Studies at Yeshiva University's Stern College for Women. Rabbi Gordon has been a Fellow at the University's Rogozin Center for the Study of Ethics and Human Values.

THE WEEKLY PORTION YITRO

"Seeing Without Understanding"

In the preliminary verses to the description of the revelation at Mount Sinai, our weekly portion states: "And all the people saw the sounds . . . and the voice of the Shofar . . . And the people saw and trembled and stood back at a distance."

Apparently, the Torah wants to stress that the use of the sense of sight as distinguished from the sense of hearing was particularly important in grasping the message of Divine Revelation. Seeing is believing; hearing is not. Testimony in a court of law based on hearsay is inadmissible according to Judaism; only testimony based upon what one witnessed with his own eyes is acceptable.

In general, to see something is to understand it, while to hear about it may provide one with information, but still leave one indifferent. We hear about poverty in the slums; but to enter a slum tenement and see it with your own eyes produces a different reaction altogether. We hear about the brutal war in Vietnam; but to see the results of that war in veteran's hospitals is quite something else again.

Our sages tell us, in commenting on this verse, that "no one among the people was blind and no one was deaf." We suspect that the Midrashic comment was meant more in a figurative sense that in a literal one.

"And the people saw and were moved." The impression was fixed. The message was understood. The maximum impact was achieved.

AN EVERLASTING MEMORIAL

We bring to the attention of our members and worshippers that in our Main Synagogue there are Memorial Tablets upon which may be inscribed the names of dear departed ones.

On these Tablets, each name is inscribed on an individual plaque which bears the name of the deceased and the date of the yahrzeit in Hebrew and in English. Memorial lights are located on either side of the individual plaque. These lights are kindled on the yahrzeit and at every memorial service. On these occasions memorial prayers are recited for all those whose names are inscribed on the Tablets.
