## Over One Thousand Attend Iraqi Jewry Memorial Meeting In Main Synagogue

Last Sunday, for the second time in about a year, (the last time was February 3, 1969) Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun served as host to a special memorial meeting of prayer and protest in behalf of the Iraqi Jewish community and specifically in memory of more than a score of Iraqi Jews who have been executed during the past year by the Baathist regime.

The meeting which was attended by over one thousand people who jammed our Main Synagogue and some of whom overflowed into the street, was sponsored jointly by the American Committee for Rescue and Resettlement of Iraqi Jews and by the New York Board of Rabbis. Speakers included Hon. Jacob K. Javits, Hon. Charles Goodell, U. S. Senators from the State of New York, Congressman Lowenstein of Nassau County, Hon. Charles H. Silver as well as other communal leaders. The eulogy was pronounced by Rabbi Gilbert Klaperman, President of the New York Board of Rabbis.

Rabbi Haskel Lockstein conducted the special order of service before many members of Kehilath Jeshurun. It was especially gratifying to see on hand a good many of the young people of our congregation who understood the need to demonstrate their concern for their fellow Jews and who came to this prayer meeting and brought their friends.

Rabbi Klaperman expressed the feeling of the gathering when he said that the time for protest is over and the time for action has begun. Protests fall on the deaf ears of a world which stood unmoved while six million Jews were exterminated, which watched unconcerned while 2.3 million Jews in Israel were threatened with annihilation in June of 1967 and which continues to be insensitive and indifferent to the plight of Jews in benighted lands of oppression.

# Carl Gershman Speaks To Packed Congregation At Impressive Collegiate and Young Adult Sabbath

A first in the annals of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun was celebrated last Sabbath morning when, as part of a Collegiate and Young Adults Sabbath, a young man from our community addressed the congregation on a topic of current interest. The young man was Carl Gershman, the recently married son of Mrs. Joseph S. Gershman and her late and immortal husband. He addressed the congregation in a packed auditorium on the subject: "Countering Anti-Israel Propaganda on the Campus."

Following the regular service — sans sermon — the congregation proceeded to the Auditorium of the Synagogue House where it filled all of the more than three hundred and fifty seats. The listeners were well rewarded for their

interest with a brilliantly conceived and delivered lecture on the problem of Israel's public image on the American university campus.

Mr. Gershman traced the results of a trend in the antipathy toward Israel manifested by the New Left beginning with its convention on the new politics in Chicago shortly following the 1967 six-day war. He demonstrated the falacies upon which this leftist opposition to Israel rests. He explained the reasons for its development and analyzed how the Arab propagandists have systematically exploited certain ideological points in the New Left to serve their own base interests.

At the conclusion of his talk, Mr. Gershman described the creation of "the Youth Committee for Peace and Democracy in the Middle East" a non-sectarian organization whose purpose is to reach college and university youth with the message so eloquently expressed by our speaker. # A DIGRESSION ON THE JEWISH CALENDAR

(This coming Friday and Shabbat, we will begin the month of Adar I. It is this month which is doubled to make the Jewish leap year, as will happen this year. I thought you would be interested in the following passage which succinctly explains some of the enigmas about the Jewish calendar. It comes from page 68 of Herman Wouk's classic exposition of Judaism, "This is My God," published by Doubleday and available in a Dell paperback edition. H. L.)

"The Bible says the Jews left Egypt at midnight by the light of the full moon, the moon of the spring equinox, on the fourteenth night of the month of Nissan, about thirty-two hundred years ago. This, then, is the night for observing Pesach, the Passover.

An immediate timing difficulty arises. The Jewish year, like the Mohammedan, has twelve moon months of twenty-nine or thirty days. The year of the sun, which governs the seasons, is about eleven days longer. A moon calendar drifts backward at a rate of about a month every three years. Mohammedans successively observe Ramadan in winter, fall, summer, and spring. But the Mosaic law specifies that Passover is a spring holiday; the freedom feast must come in blossom time. The old Jewish solution of this problem was a leap month every few years, proclaimed by the Sanhedrin. When the dispersion destroyed the nation, and communication between the centers of learning in exile began to break down, the rabbis worked out a perpetual calendar on a nineteenyear cycle, with seven leap months so arranged as to keep Passover forever at the equinox. This calendar has the respect of modern astronomers. In nearly two thousand years Passover has not drifted out of the springtime, and in the foreseeable future it will

In ancient days each new month was proclaimed by the central court in Jerusalem when the crescent moon appeared. The only doubt, of course, was whether it would show up twentynine or thirty days after the last new moon. As soon as the Month was announced, runners went out all over the Mideast to advise the Jewish communities of the date of their holy days. Those settlements that were more than fourteen days' journey from Jerusalem had no way of knowing the exact day of Passover. To be sure of keeping the festival properly, they observed both

#### **Arms For Israel Makes Sense**

(This note was excerpted from Near East Report, a Washington letter on American policy in the Near East. This bi-weekly publication is highly recommended for your interest and information. Geoffrey Kemp, writing on "Dilemmas of the Arms Traffic" in the current Foreign Affairs, asserts that "the most important U.S. policy objectives have been served by supplying certain weapons to Israel" and that "it would be unwise to deny Israel further supplies in the hope that such restraints would enhance the prospects of a multilateral political settlement."

The author, from M.I.T.'s Center for International Studies, explains that the safest military situation in the Near East exists when Israel has "clear superiority" over the Arab states and both sides know it. The likelihood of a new full-scale war increases when either side doubts Israel's military dominance. For if Egypt believed she could successfully challenge Israel's airpower "the temptation to plan a major offensive against Israel would grow". And if Israel had reason to fear such an Egyptian challenge she "might prepare for preemptive action."

Kemp concludes that to lessen the chances of another Arab-Israel war and a U.S.-Soviet confrontation, the United States must provide Israel with an "optimum" military deterrent force.

#### ADL ASKS PRES. NIXON TO HALT FEDERAL FUNDS FOR ROAD TO GERALD K. SMITH SHRINE

The national chairman of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith appealed directly to President Richard M. Nixon recently to prevent government financing of a road leading to the "Christ of the Ozarks" project, a shrine promoted by "the notorious anti-Semite, Gerald L. K. Smith," in Eureka Springs, Ark. In a telegram to the President, Dore Schary asked that he direct Commerce Secretary Maurice Stans and Transportation Secretary John Volpe to withdraw \$182,000 of U.S. funds allocated for the road. Earlier direct representations to Mr. Stans and Mr. Volpe failed to forestall the grant.


