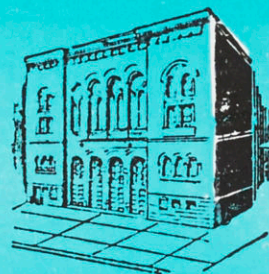

#### FINAL PASSOVER NOTES

##### Disposal of Chametz

No chametz may be eaten on Monday after 9:15 A.M. All chametz must be completely disposed of by 10:15 A.M.

##### Sale of Chametz

The ritual sale of chametz must be completed by early Monday morning. There are those who prefer to perform this ritual in person. The Rabbis and the Ritual Director are available for that purpose, through early Monday morning.

##### Services for First Born

Passover Eve is a traditional fast for first born. It is obligatory upon every first born who cannot observe the fast on Monday, April 20th, to attend the special service on that day and to participate at its conclusion in the light collation that is served. The service for the first born (Siyum Bechorim) will be held in the Chapel on Monday as part of the regular morning service. It will begin at 7:30.

The attendance at this service grows from year to year. We urge all first born to make a special effort to attend.

## A HOLIDAY MESSAGE

### "The Egg and Us"

The Festival of Passover is replete with explicit and implicit ethical lessons. One such lesson is the message emphasized by the Seder that, however glorious our victory over the Egyptians may have been, we are left saddened by the realization that it was achieved through the loss of human life. (The drowning of the Egyptians in the Sea).

This is one of the main reasons for the tradition of eating an egg at the Seder table. The egg is a sign of mourning and indicates our appreciation of the value of human life — even when that life is that of the oppressor. It is for a similar reason that, when we recite the ten plagues with which God afflicted the Egyptians, we drop some wine from our cups for each of the plagues. When a people suffers — even a cruel and oppressive people — our cup of joy can never be complete.

For much the same reason, we do not recite the full Hallel during the last six days of Passover. At the season of the year when God's creatures drowned in the Sea, the song of praise and victory must be somewhat muted. The victory had to be won; freedom had to be achieved; but human beings must not lose their compassion, even for the vanquished taskmasters.

This lesson has eternal implications for a people which knows that "in every generation they rise up against us to destroy us." It is particularly relevant for the Jewish People of our day which is faced with an ongoing

struggle against an intransigent Arab world and against a merciless and coniving totalitarian system that refuses to grant the right of survival and existence to the State of Israel.

In the face of such continuing enmity and ongoing aggressive intent, the Jewish people must redouble its efforts to relive the lesson of Passover. We are not a vengeful people, nor are we the servants of a vengeful God. We are a loving people who follow a gracious God. Justice must be done; wrongs must be righted; life and property must be protected; security must be sustained; but in the process, the sanctity of human life must remain inviolate. Every life must remain precious, even the life of our enemy.

The former Ambassador of the State of Israel to the United States, Hon. Avraham Harman, put it very well recently when he said from our pulpit: "Israel must fight in order to live; but it must never reach the point where it lives in order to fight."

As we partake of the egg, as we drink our partially filled cups and as we recite only half Hallel during part of this Passover season, may we recall the traditional devotion of the Jewish people to life and to peace. May this season of redemption inaugurate a new era of universal redemption in which the dream of brotherhood and peace in our world will be realized at last.

*THAT THE JEWS OF THE SOVIET UNION MAY KNOW  
THAT THEY HAVE NOT BEEN FORGOTTEN . . .*

At the Seder table one should have four matzot, the three traditional ones and an additional matzah which will not be eaten and which will symbolize the plight of our brethren in the Soviet Union, most of whom will be unable to obtain matzah for Passover this year.

In Jewish households throughout America, this year, the following formula will be recited at the Seder immediately prior to "Ma Nishtanah", after completing the recitation of "Ha Lachma Anya."

*THIS IS THE MATZAH OF OPPRESSION*

We set aside this "lechem oni" — this matzah of oppression — to remember the three million Jews of the Soviet Union. Most of them cannot have matzah on their Seder tables tonight. Conceive of Passover without matzah — without that visible reminder of our flight from slavery.

Think of Soviet Jews! They cannot learn of their Jewish past and hand it down to their children. They cannot learn the languages of their fathers and hand them down to their children. They cannot teach their children to be their teachers, their rabbis. They can only sit in silence and become invisible.

We shall be their voice, and our voices shall be joined by thousands of men of conscience aroused by the injustice imposed on Soviet Jews. Then shall they know that they have not been forgotten, and they that sit in darkness shall yet see a great light.
