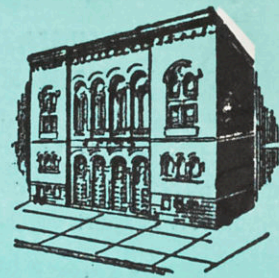

SPECIAL NOTE FOR ROSH HASHANAH

In accordance with the practice developed over the past number of years at Kehilath Jeshurun, the sermons which will be delivered in the Main Synagogue and in the Auxiliary Service on both days of Rosh Hashanah will be delivered at the conclusion of the regular service.

We call to the attention of our worshippers the fact that the salient ritual of the festival, the sounding of the Shofar, will take place at approximately 10:00 o'clock.

Please plan to be in attendance at services by 10:00 o'clock, so that you will be present for this important religious observance.

—FOR YOUR ATTENTION— SYNAGOGUE ORDINANCES AND PRACTICES

1. There will be no vacant seats in the Main Synagogue or in the Auxiliary Service. All seats will be reserved. Worshippers, therefore, are requested not to bring children or guests unless reservations have been made for them.
2. Special guards will be in attendance at the entrances to the Main Synagogue and to the Auxiliary Services. Admission cards must be shown to them. This regulation is essential for the comfort and convenience of worshippers.
3. A seat may be used only by the one for whom it was reserved. High Holy Day tickets are not transferable. Please abide by this ruling in order to avoid embarrassment to all concerned.
4. Special Children's services will be held on Rosh Hashanah and on Yom Kippur. The service for children from the ages of seven to twelve will be held in the Children's Chapel on the sixth floor. The service for youngsters in nursery through grade one will be held in the Dining Hall. Both of these services will begin at 11:00 A.M. and will conclude at 1:00 P.M.

A HOLIDAY MESSAGE DON'T SELL YOURSELF SHORT!

One of the lessons we try to teach our children is to aim high, to reach beyond themselves and, above all, not to sell themselves short.

This lesson was applied beautifully by the Lubavitcher Rebbe in a pastoral letter during Elul some years ago. In effect, what the Rebbe said was: "In spiritual matters and particularly in Teshuva — Repentance — do not sell yourselves short by underestimating your own capabilities."

The Rebbe's lesson is worth taking to heart during this season of the year. Every one of us possesses great spiritual reservoirs, a pure soul and an abundant capacity for righteous living and pious behavior. Our problem does not lie in our capacity but rather in our confidence. Too often we sell ourselves short religiously.

Moreover, as fathers and mothers, as communal leaders, as teachers, and as friends we sell other people short also. We are afraid to make spiritual demands on others for fear that they will turn against us and reject our council. We fail to teach religious behavior for fear of alienating the student.

During this High Holy Day season, stop selling yourselves short. Make demands upon yourselves — you can fulfill them. Set spiritual goals for your family — you can attain them. Establish religious priorities for every phase of your life — and then realize them. Resolve to be a better Jew, a more pious person, a more humble human being — and fulfill the resolution.

The Rebbe's message was anticipated by Hosea in the Haftorah for Shabbat Shuva when he said, "Return O Israel up to the Lord your God," upon which the Talmud comments: "Teshuva is a great process: it brings one right to the holy throne of God."

SPECIAL CEREMONIES CONNECTED WITH ROSH HASHANAH

Although we usually think of the High Holy Days in terms of the Synagogue Service, there are many beautiful ceremonies that take place outside the House of God.

At the Table

The festival is ushered in by the lighting of candles over which the special festival blessing is recited. The special benediction "shehecheyanu" is added.

After the reciting of kiddush and the washing of hands, a "motzi" is made over a round challah (symbolizing the cycle of the year) and the bread is dipped into honey before it is eaten. The symbolism concerning a sweet year is readily apparent. The use of a round challah and the dipping of the bread into honey is continued for the entire High Holy Day season, ending with Hoshanah Rabbah.

On the first night of Rosh Hashanah, an apple is dipped into honey. Before tasting the apple, the blessing over fruit is recited. **After** tasting the apple, a special prayer is recited: "May it be Thy Will to grant us a good and sweet year."

On the second night, it is customary

to wear a new garment and to have it in mind when the blessing of "shehecheyanu" is recited as part of the kiddush. In addition, a new fruit, not previously enjoyed this season, is eaten. Before eating the fruit, the blessing over fruit is recited and the "Shehecheyanu" is added.

Tashlich

The Tashlich ceremony occurs on the first day of Rosh Hashanah. This ceremony takes place in the afternoon along the banks of a river or some other body of fresh water. Appropriate prayers are recited as part of this mystical custom, indicating our desire to cast off all sins from our persons and correct our ways.

In our community, we customarily gather for Tashlich about one hour before Mincha near the 85th Street entrance to the reservoir path in Central Park.

Rosh Hashanah Greetings

On Rosh Hashanah, upon leaving the Synagogue, all extend the High Holy Day greetings **לשנה טובה תכתבו** "May You Be Inscribed for a Good Year."

SHABBAT SHUVAH DISCOURSE

It is a traditional practice for a halakhic discourse to be delivered on Shabbat Shuvah, the Sabbath which occurs between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Such a discourse will be delivered by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein on Saturday afternoon, September 25th, following the Mincha service.

A cordial invitation is extended to all men and women, young and old, to attend the service at 5:50 P.M. and to remain for the discourse which will follow.

REMEMBER THE FAST OF GEDALIA

In the shadow of the Rosh Hashanah festival lies a fast day that is observed on the third day of the year, Wednesday, September 22nd. It is called Tzom Gedalia because it commemorates the assassination of Gedalia ben Achikom, governor of Judea, following the destruction of the land by the Babylonians.

With the death of Gedalia, the last embers of Jewish statehood and self respect were snuffed out. The populace, demoralized and hopeless, quickly assimilated into the pagan society of the day. Fifty years later upon the return of the first of the exiles, there was hardly a Jewish family left intact.

For this national catastrophe, we fast and mourn on the day following Rosh Hashanah, although the actual assassination took place on Rosh Hashanah itself.

A SUGGESTION FOR YOM KIPPUR

The Day of Atonement is, among other things, a day of self-denial. In addition to avoiding food and drink, Jewish tradition calls for refraining from the wearing of leather shoes.

The reason for this provision is that wearing a proper pair of shoes makes us feel complete and perfectly groomed. Women, especially, know that the right pair of shoes gives style and elegance to any outfit.

It is precisely the absence of that feeling of completeness which is called for on the Day of Atonement. Out of the spirit of moderate self-denial we are moved to prayer, penitence and wholesome introspection.

Today it is easy to conform to Jewish tradition in this matter. Non-leather footwear is readily available in shops in every neighborhood. Why not put your best foot forward this Yom Kippur by renewing this meaningful practice of our people?

For your information and use, we print below a translation of this blessing.

May God make you as Ephraim and Menashe (for girls, say: May God make you as Sara, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah).

May God bless you and keep you. May God cause his countenance to shine upon you and be gracious unto you. May God lift up the light of his countenance to you and give you peace.

May it be God's will to place in your heart love and reverence for Him, so that you shall be conscious of God all your days and thereby refrain from sin.

May you delight in His Torah and its Commandments. May your eyes always look forward, your lips speak wisdom, your heart meditate in reverence, your hands be occupied with Mitzvot and your feet rush to perform the will of your Father in heaven.

May God (ultimately) give you righteous sons and daughters occupied throughout their lives with Torah and Mitzvot. May He give you an abundant livelihood, one that shall be gained through methods beyond reproach, attained without dependence upon gifts from others and without undue excessive toil, leaving you free primarily for the service of God.

May you be inscribed and sealed for a good and long life among all the good people of Israel. Amen.

Reserve A Lulav and Ethrog

We remind our worshippers of the need to arrange for a Lulav and Ethrog. These symbolic fruits are used during the Hallel service and in the procession around the synagogue.

The Lulav procession in the synagogue has become more impressive each year as more worshippers join the line of march. It is desirable to have a Lulav and Ethrog for synagogue use and one for home use.

The purchase of a Lulav and Ethrog is a requirement of Jewish Law. There is, however, a practical element involved. When one purchases a Lulav and Ethrog, he simultaneously contributes to the strengthening of the economy of the State of Israel.

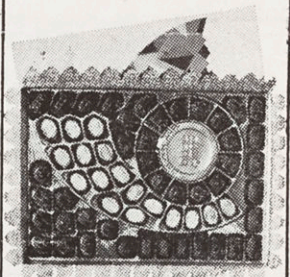

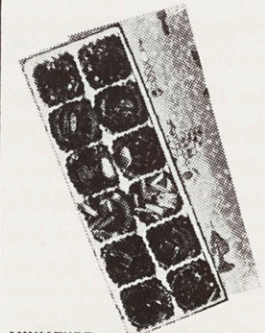
