Rabbi Recalls Forty Years of CKJ Sisterhood at Closing Meeting

"The budget of the Neediest Cases Fund today is larger than the budget of the Sisterhood 40 years ago," said Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, guest speaker at the closing meeting of the Sisterhood on May 22nd.

He went on to relate many interesting moments in the life of the Sisterhood and paid special tribute to his wife, Mrs. Gertrude Lookstein, who, as he put it, "was a shy and frightened second president."

Rabbi Lookstein told of the importance of the Sisterhood to the synagogue and how it had evolved from a Bible class. "Any organization born of a Bible class will survive," he said. "That is why we have such an outstanding group."

Mrs. Monica Hollander called upon Mrs. Meyer Texon to read the report of the Centennial Luncheon, held at the Waldorf on May 16th. Over \$3,000 was raised. 349 people were present.

The new members were inducted into the Sisterhood by Mrs. Gertrude Lookstein, Membership Chairman.

Mrs. Meyer Texon, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the slate of officers for the coming year: The officers, who were unanimously elected, are: Mrs. Eugene Hollander, President; Mrs. Haskel Lookstein, Vice President; Mrs. Frank Roth, Treasurer; Mrs. Milton Berkowitz, Recording Secretary and Mrs. Samuel Silverstein, Corresponding Secretary.

Mrs. Hollander closed the meeting by thanking all the Chairmen who had performed their functions so admirably during the year. She indicated that all are looking forward to a full Centennial Year of Sisterhood activity.

AN URGENT MESSAGE Reunion With USSR Relatives

The rapidly changing situation of Jews in the Soviet Union and the world-wide attention focused upon the plight of Soviet Jewry encourage the hope that if positive steps are taken **now**, an increasing number of Soviet Jews can be reunited with their families in Israel, the United States and other countries.

Of the 3,000,000 Jews in the Soviet Union, most of those who wish to leave want to resettle in Israel. A number of Soviet Jews, however, have indicated their wish to join relatives in the United States and other Western countries. It should be noted that the United States government recently eased the entry of USSR Jews to this country.

In order to emigrate, whatever the destination, a Soviet Jew must, according to Soviet requirements, submit a letter of invitation (vyzov) from his relatives abroad. For Soviet Jews who wish to come to the United States, the American relative **must** initiate this process. Indeed, unless this relative does take such action, the Soviet relative cannot, under Soviet requirements, begin to take the various steps neces-

sary for him to be permitted to leave.

United Hias Service, the world-wide Jewish migration agency, is prepared to advise about the specialized procedures necessary to effectuate family reunion and to assist in other ways in order to make it possible for relatives in the USSR to come to the United States and other countries.

In the course of many years of separation, some American Jews may have lost contact with their relatives in the USSR. United Hias, through its world-wide location service, can assist families to locate their relatives in the Soviet Union and throughout the world, and thus facilitate reunion of families separated for years.

In light of recent developments, American Jews with relatives in the Soviet Union are urged to get in touch **at once** with United Hias Service, 200 Park Avenue South, New York, N.Y. 10003. HEADLINES OF JEWISH INTEREST

Giving Credit Where Credit is Due

We reprint below, without comment, two excerpts from dispatches that appeared in the April 25th overseas issue of the Jerusalem Post.

"Relations between the United States and Israel have reached their highest peak of understanding in the five years since the Six-Day War, Ambassador Itzhak Rabin declared . . . Ambassador Rabin said Israel was 'more than thankful' to President Nixon for translating his determination to maintain the balance of power in the Middle East from 'words to deeds'. **All of Israel's requests for arms needed for defense had been granted, Mr. Rabin said.**

"Israel was similarly grateful to the Congress for providing the funds to purchase the arms and for providing assistance for relief of the defense burden. Speaking to leading members of the Senate and the House, Mr. Rabin said: 'You wouldn't believe how much we are relieved at what you have done for Israel'."

"At the National Press Club luncheon, Mr. Abba Eban said that the 'tenacious fidelity' of the U.S. to four elements of stability in the Middle East was responsible for the relative tranquility in the area. The four elements are, he said: cease-fire; maintenance of the balance of power; the principle of non-imposition of peace terms; and Washington's availability to mediate. Throughout his short visit here (in the U.S.), Mr. Eban has emphasized the new high point in U.S.-Israel relations which he said had attained 'the highest degree of mutual confidence and understanding ever known' between the two countries."

A Matter of Luck

"Everything is a matter of luck", says Jewish tradition, "even a Sefer Torah in the Holy Ark". One Torah might be used every Sabbath while another might come out only once a year.

UJA NEEDS CASH

During the month of May 2,500 Soviet Jews arrived in Israel. On the basis of the immigration thus far, it appears that the estimate of 30,000 Soviet Jewish immigrants will prove correct.

Pledges for the 1972 campaign of the UJA are coming in gratifyingly. Unfortunately, there is a terrible shortage of cash. We have been asked to communicate with our readers about this serious shortage.

Failure to translate promptly the generous pledges into cash will force Israel to cut services for Soviet Jews or to slow down construction of housing for young couples and large families who are living in slum conditions. The problem of security and defense also must be borne in mind.

All this means one thing to you and me: If we have a UJA pledge which is outstanding we must convert it into cash today. Please act now!
