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## RAMAZ UPPER SCHOOL RENAMED IN HONOR OF RABBI JOSEPH H. LOOKSTEIN AS PART OF TRIBUTE AT FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY DINNER

Close to 1,000 people, including many members of the congregation, many parents and friends of Ramaz School and distinguished dignitaries from the world Jewish community gathered on Sunday, January 20 in the Grand Ballroom of the Waldorf Astoria to pay tribute to our Senior Rabbi, Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, on the occasion of his Fiftieth Anniversary as a Rabbi in Kehilath Jeshurun.

There were many dramatic moments in the evening and some poignant ones as well. Beginning with the seemingly endless stream of guests and well-wishers who participated in the receiving line that opened the festivities and continuing to the last guest who lingered for a final farewell at the conclusion of the evening, there were beautiful words and sentiments expressed and felt by the entire assemblage. It was a magnificent outpouring of love and esteem for a spiritual leader who has guided the destinies of our congregation and this entire Jewish community for the last half century.

Walter Koppel, President of the Parents Council of Ramaz School, opened the formal festivities by welcoming all of the guests and explaining the significant nature of this evening. He introduced Cantor Avrum Davis who led the gathering in the National Anthem and Rabbi Sol Roth, a former Rabbinic Assistant in our congregation who has just been elected President of the New York Board of Rabbis, who delivered the Invocation at the Dinner.

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein presided at the program for the evening. He delivered a brief, moving address about the impact of his father, not only on the personal lives of the members of the community, but also on the wider community in general.

Harry W. Baumgarten, President of the Congregation, delivered greetings in which he explained the difficulties in properly acknowledging the magnificent role that Rabbi Lookstein has played in the development of this congregation and the community around it. "How can we recognize and acknowledge adequately," he asked, "the inspired leadership that our Rabbi has given to the Jewish world: to its rabbis and laymen, to its yeshivot and charities, to its communal institutions in America and in Israel, to Zionism in theory and practice, and, most important of all, to Jewish education on the home front and 6,000 miles away?"

"Although our praise might be inadequate," the President said, "we have tried to do our best through this Dinner. The attendance, the participation and the magnificent fund raising achievement in behalf of the Ramaz Scholarship Fund are all a way of saying to our Rabbi, Thank You!"

### **A Scroll Presented**

Hyman I. Bucher, Chairman of the Centennial Committee of the Congregation, and a Trustee whose association with our Rabbi goes back to the former's Bar Mitzvah, then presented the Rabbi with a beautiful commemorative scroll from the congregation. The scroll, designed and created by Morris Wyshogrod, a parent of Ramaz, read in part as follows:

"To Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein: For fifty years you have been our Rabbi, our teacher and our friend. You have made Kehilath Jeshurun the symbol of modern Orthodox Judaism in its noblest expression. You have created and nurtured the Ramaz School, enabling our children to integrate harmoniously the traditions of Judaism with the heritage of western civilization.

You have inspired us with your ser-

mons, encouraged us with your optimism, consoled us in our time of grief, rejoiced with us in our happy moments and touched our lives deeply with your warmth, your wit and your wisdom. For all this we cannot praise you adequately or thank you sufficiently. We can but pray to God for your health and happiness and for our privilege to have you for many years to come as our Rabbi, our teacher and our friend. With our love and esteem Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun."

### The Tribute From Ramaz

Joseph Lorch, a Trustee of the Congregation and Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Ramaz, then presented the Rabbi with a symbol of the gratitude of Ramaz and the entire community. He read before the assemblage a commemorative scroll whose words we reproduce here in part.

"Monuments need not be erected for the righteous; their deeds are their proper memorial. Jerusalem Talmud, Sh'kalim 2:5. By the decision of the Board of Trustees of the Ramaz School and in gratitude to Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein who fashioned Ramaz in 1937 from his own spirit and substance, who served as its first Principal and who has given it thirty-seven years of brilliant leadership and inspired direction; we hereby declare that the Ramaz Upper School will henceforth be known as: The Joseph H. Lookstein Upper School of Ramaz."

Our Senior Rabbi then responded to all of the sentiments and expressions of the evening with a moving address describing his own gratitude for the occasion. He spoke about the three worlds of his concern: the world of the Holocaust in the past which we cannot forget; the world of our present efforts in which we are involved; and the world of Ramaz, which is our

### ... And God hardened the heart of Pharaoh . . .

Questions have been raised many times concerning the hardening of Pharaoh's heart by God. Is this a deprivation of free will? Was Pharaoh prevented from doing that which he felt was right.

The setting begins with a request. The request which Moses and Aaron made of Pharaoh was not a difficult one. Originally, they did not ask for the complete end to the slavery of the people, but merely for permission to take the children of Israel from their slavery for three days of prayer to God. Pharaoh answered saying that he did not recognize God and would not consider altering his plans for this God of Moses and Aaron. (Exodus Chapter 5, Verses 1-5) He continues to refuse to let the people go even after the Ten Plagues. These subsequent refusals are merely a repetition of the theme of this initial response. Pharaoh continues not to recognize God even under severe punishments. Is this a deprivation of free will? What indeed is free will? One definition may be that it is the ability to stand by one's convictions despite circumstances which would bend the real will of the individual. It is thus possible to view the hardships, the plagues, and the threats of God as challenges to the initial arrogant refusal of Pharaoh to recognize God. Pharaoh might well have succumbed, under these circumstances, in order to prevent further reproach from God. We learn, however, that God aided him, strengthened him, so that he could maintain his initial posture. Pharaoh, thus, was the victim of his own character, a victim of his own words, hardly a puppet of God at all.

The ultimate expression of free will must surely be the one which enables us to persevere, even under the most trying circumstances. Pharaoh represents the epitome of free will. His will is so free that it is liberated even from his own inner weaknesses which would have enslaved it. Even after the Ten Plagues, Pharaoh still pursues the children of Israel. This pursuit, which destroys his people in the Red Sea, indicates that he was not swayed from his initial conviction. Pharaoh does not recognize God and will not change his plans because of the words of God.

The meaning of this passage for us may well be that to have free will is good, but that we must be sure that we have proper convictions on which this will is based. The next sidra contains the giving of the Ten Command-

# Hon. Herman Katz, City Clerk, Makes the News and Scores Some Points

Our esteemed member and former Trustee, Hon. Herman Katz, City Clerk of New York City, was the object of the "Daily Closeup" column in the NEW YORK POST on January 23, 1974. The reporter cited Mr. Katz for his careful observance of all the rules and regulations regarding official city papers which he must verify.

The major concern of the article was with standards of propriety on which the City Clerk insists whenever he performs civil marriages in his office in the Municipal Building. Apparently, there is a ten-year-old regulation of his which bans slacks for brides and which requires ties and jackets for grooms. That regulation is now being challenged by the New York Civil Liberties Union as an unconstitutional violation of the right of freedom of

"Marriage between two people can have as much of an impact on society as the laws affecting the City as a whole," Mr. Katz said, in a quotation in the article. "We ought perhaps to have an American Civil Obligations Association to show there are obligations as well as rights in society. Our entire community activity is dependent upon formal association of marriage and I reject the notion that marriage is just like walking into a supermarket . . ."

"This is not a haven for all . . . in-

dividuals who want to deprecate the solemnity of marriage", said Herman Katz, who remembers with some distaste people coming in with "overalls with graffiti on them, demanding to get married."

It is interesting to note that Mr. Katz, as City Clerk, has introduced several procedures designed to encourage young brides and grooms to be married religiously, rather than simply civilly. He was also instrumental in changing certain city documents and forms in such a way as to make them religiously neutral. We are proud of the role of this member in the community of New York City, although we recognize that others may differ with his sartorial tastes at wedding ceremonies.
