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SYLVA ZALMANSON FREED FROM PRISON

Friday, August 23 was a great day for Soviet Jews as well as for the American Jewish Community which has worked fervently to support the renaissance of our brothers in the Soviet Union. On that day, Sylva Zalmanson, who had been sentenced to ten years in prison during the Lenin-grad trials in December, 1970, was released from prison six years before the end of her term.

This is the first time that any Jewish Prisoner of Conscience has ever been released before the completion of a full term of sentence. We hope and pray that Sylva Zalmanson's case will not be unique, but that she will be only the first of many others to be released in the near future.

The reasons for this new development are not difficult to understand. Much of the credit goes to Senator Henry Jackson and to members of the present and past administration who have made the plight of Soviet Jewry a matter of vital concern in the establishment of normal relations between the USSR and our country. The National Conference for Soviet Jewry and the New York Conference for Soviet Jewry, together with other community action groups, are equally deserving of praise and gratitude for making this dramatic development possible.

We have a feeling, however, that when the full story of Sylva Zalmanson's release is told — and it cannot be told at present — members of the KJ-Ramaz family will have specific reasons to be extremely proud and gratified. At the present, we can say no more.

We join with all of American Jewry, Soviet Jewry and our brothers throughout the world in expressing in the traditional fashion, our gratitude upon hearing this wonderful news: "Blessed art Thou O Lord our God King of the Universe Who is good and Who makes things good." Baruch ha-tov v'ha-meitiv!

Reserve Now for Meals In the Sukkah

Although Rosh Hashanah is not yet upon us, it is already necessary at this point to make plans for meals in the sukkah during the Sukkot Festival. We are very pleased to inform the membership of the congregation that we will serve catered meals in the synagogue sukkah in the evenings and at lunch for each day of Yom Tov and for Shabbat Chol Hamoad.

Specifically, meals will be served on Monday evening, September 30, Tuesday lunch and dinner, Wednesday lunch and Friday evening, October 4 and Saturday lunch. Although full course dinners will be catered for each meal, we have arranged to keep the cost at a moderate \$7 per plate and \$3.50 for children of any age attending with their parents.

We are grateful to Michael Barany, Chairman of the Sukkah Committee and all of his co-workers for making this extraordinary effort on behalf of the congregational family. May we remind our members that space in the sukkah is limited and that we will take reservations on a first-come, first-served basis only.

All reservations, accompanied by a check, must be in the synagogue office ten days before the Sukkot festival.

Provide for a Lulav and Etrog

As we prepare in advance for the Sukkot festival, may we remind our worshippers of the need to arrange for a Lulav and Etrog for themselves and their families. These symbolic fruits are used in the synagogue and at home throughout Sukkot.

From year to year the procession in the synagogue becomes more impressive as more and more worshippers join the line of march, many of them with their children. May we also remind our readers that the purchase of a Lulav and Etrog is a direct source of support for the economy of Israel. The mitzvah of providing a Lulav and Etrog, therefore, is a double one.

Please inform our Ritual Director, Israel D. Rosenberg, about your order for Lulavim and Etrogim. He will make all of the necessary arrangements.

SPECIAL CEREMONIES CONNECTED WITH ROSH HASHANAH

Although we usually think of the High Holy Days in terms of the Synagogue Service, there are many beautiful ceremonies that take place outside the House of God.

At the Table

The festival is ushered in by the lighting of candles over which the special festival blessing is recited. The special benediction "shehecheyanu" is added.

After the reciting of Kiddush and the washing of hands, a "motzi" is made over a round challah (symbolizing the cycle of the year) and the bread is dipped into honey before it is eaten. The symbolism concerning a sweet year is readily apparent. The use of a round challah and the dipping of the bread into honey is continued for the entire High Holy Day season, ending with Hoshanah Rabbah.

On the first night of Rosh Hashanah, an apple is dipped into honey. Before tasting the apple, the blessing over fruit is recited. **After** tasting the apple, a special prayer is recited: "May it be Thy Will to grant us a good and sweet year."

On the second night, it is customary to wear a new garment and to have it in mind when the blessing of "shehecheyanu" is recited as part of the kiddush. In addition, a new fruit, not previously enjoyed this season, is eaten. Before eating the fruit, the blessing over fruit is recited.

Tashlich

The Tashlich ceremony occurs on the first day of Rosh Hashanah. The ceremony takes place in the afternoon along the banks of a river or some other body of fresh water. Appropriate prayers are recited as part of this mystical custom, indicating our desire to cast off all sins from our persons and correct our ways.

In our community, we customarily gather for Tashlich about one hour before Mincha near the 85th Street entrance to the reservoir path in Central Park.

Rosh Hashanah Greetings

On Rosh Hashanah, upon leaving the Synagogue, all extend the High Holy Day greetings **לשנה טובה תכתבו** "May You Be Inscribed for a Good Year."

CHILDREN'S SERVICES BEFORE, DURING AND AFTER THE HIGH HOLY DAYS

We are very pleased to announce that special services for children will be held every Shabbat and Yom Tov, starting Saturday morning, September 14th. We will hold a junior congregation and a pre-junior congregation, which will cover the needs of children from Nursery through Grade 6.

Binny Shudofsky, who led last year's junior congregation so successfully, will once again conduct this popular youth activity. Dina Markson, who was in charge of the pre-junior congregation last year, will also be back to render her talented services in directing the activity for the younger children, through Grade 1.

The junior congregation meets every Shabbat and Yom Tov morning from 10 until 12 in the Synagogue Chapel. The pre-junior congregation meets every Shabbat and Yom Tov from 11 to 12 in the Dining Hall on the third floor.

For Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur

On both days of Rosh Hashanah and on Yom Kippur morning, the junior congregation and pre-junior group will both meet on a special schedule: 11:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M.

A NEW THEME FOR SHABBAT SHUVAH

The traditional discourse for Shabbat Shuvah usually concerns itself with ritual matters. This year, I should like to change the format as well as the nature of the lecture.

I will discuss the subject "Love of One's Fellow Man", concentrating specifically on the mitzvah of "Love thy neighbor as thyself" and "Thou shalt not hate thy brother in thy heart." I shall discuss the limits of the mitzvah of love of fellow man as well as the rituals and laws associated with this fundamental feature of Jewish life.

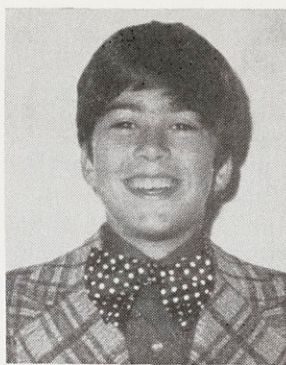
In addition, I shall try to discuss the question of whether love of fellow man applies to all people regardless of their religious persuasion, their moral and ethical standing, and other variables. The entire issue has important implications for our personal behavior and judgments.

Those wishing to prepare in advance are requested to examine the Biblical source in Leviticus 19, as well as the classical commentaries on the pertinent verses.

TWO SUGGESTIONS FOR YOM KIPPUR

The Day of Atonement is, among other things, a day of self-denial. In addition to avoiding food, drink, washing and the use of lotions and oils, Jewish tradition calls for refraining from the wearing of leather shoes.

The reason for this provision is that wearing a proper pair of shoes makes one feel complete and well groomed. It is precisely the absence of that feeling of completeness which is called for on the Day of Atonement. Through this mood of moderate self denial, we are moved to prayer, penitence, and wholesome introspection.

May we request of our worshippers to take a step in the direction of Jewish tradition by arranging a pair of non-leather footwear for Yom Kippur this year. An ample selection is available in any shoe store. We think you will find that conforming with this practice will help you to derive more from the most meaningful day on the Jewish calendar.

And For The Men . . .

Increasingly each year more men worshippers in the congregation don the traditional kittel for Yom Kippur. This garment, reflecting purity and simple piety, very much enhances the experience of repentance on Yom Kippur. Why not reinstitute this practice in your family for this Yom Kippur? Mr. Rosenberg will be happy to arrange for a kittel for you if you will simply call the synagogue office. Or, you might use one of the Sundays in Elul to go down to the Lower East Side and select a kittel personally.
