PURIM EVENING AND THE CHILDREN

Please bring all children from Nursery through Grade 6 to the Synagogue at 5:45 on Wednesday afternoon. The younger children (Nursery through First Grade) are to gather in the Etra Chapel on the first floor. The older children (Second through Sixth Grades) will meet in the Gymnasium. Youth leaders will bring the children to the special sections reserved for them in the Main Synagogue and they will also provide them with the appropriate noisemakers and Purim sweets. Parents are asked to join the regular service in the Main Synagogue until its conclusion, at which time they may pick up their children at the locations listed above.

THE DEEPENING POPULATION CRISIS IN THE JEWISH COMMUNITY

Excerpts from a sermon delivered by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein on February 4, 1978. It is reprinted here because of its message for the Jewish community. A second installment dealing with proposed solutions to the problem will be published in the next issue of the Bulletin.)

On January 30 and 31 of this year, the Commission on Synagogue Relations of Federation sponsored a conference on Jewish population, to deal with a problem which, if not solved, could, God forbid, lead to the disappearance of the Jewish people.

Lest one be accused of crying demographic wolf, it might be helpful to quote Dr. Elihu Bergman, Assistant Director of the Harvard Center for Population Studies, in "The American Jewish Population Erosion," Midstream, October 1977. In that article Bergman estimated that a hundred years from now the American Jewish community is likely to number no more an 944,000 persons and conceivably is few as 10,420. While some argue with the severity of those figures, no student of Jewish communal life today doubts that we face a disastrous decline in the Jewish population in America over the next few generations — a decline which, if not halted, promises to make Jewish life as we understand it today, extremely difficult to maintain in this country.

There are two factors which are responsible for the decline and the gloomy prognosis for the future. The first is the very low birth rate of American Jews.

Demographers tell us that if the birth rate is 2.1 children per family, a society will have achieved zero population growth. That is, 2.1 children per family on the average will maintain the present generation size in the next generation.

The American Jewish birth rate right now seems to be at 1.6 children er family. This low birth rate alone would be enough to reduce the American Jewish population by one-third within seventy years.

The second part of the problem is the rising rate of defection from the Jewish people. Sociologists estimate that the current rate of intermarriage among American Jews is at least 33 percent and probably a good deal higher. Religious dropping out is also on the increase. For example, in 1961 when Jewish college seniors were asked what religion they belonged to, 13 percent said "no religion." In 1969 that figure had risen to 21 percent.

The result of the low birth rate, the high intermarriage rate and the increased defection rate to "no religion" leads the most conservative demographers to assume that the Jewish population in America is losing 25 percent in each generation. This means that if the present Jewish population is a little over 5,000,000 (which is the new estimate, considerably reduced from the 6,000,000 estimate of just a few years ago), that number will be reduced to a little over 2,000,000 four generations from now. Imagine what this will mean in terms of the vitality of Jewish life, the survival of Jewish institutions (synagogues, yeshivot, community centers, hospitals, etc.) and the power of a Jewish electorate to influence governmental decisions affecting Jews here and in Israel. It all adds up to a terrible problem.

Things Are Getting Worse-Not Better

Moreover, a realistic prognosis would show that the trend toward a lower Jewish population is not even remaining the same; it is increasing. There are several reasons for this.

- 1. The divorce rate among Jews is increasing. One in four and perhaps one in three Jewish marriages are ending in divorce. It is axiomatic that fewer children are born when the divorce rate rises.
- 2. Marriage is being deferred to a later age by Jews as by the general population. The older the couple is when they get married, the fewer children they are likely to have.
- 3. More women are working than ever before and many of them are working in professional careers. The tendency is for working women to have fewer children than non-working women and for professional women to have even fewer children because they cannot afford frequent or prolonged breaks in their professional life.

Feminism, too, is an important factor in the lower birth rate among Jews. Despite whatever advantages feminism may have brought to women

IN BEHALF OF ANATOLY SCHARANSKY A Demonstration, a Hunger Strike and a Petition

What can you do for Anatoly Scharansky, the young Soviet Jewish activist who has been held incommunicado in Lefortovo Prison in Moscow since March 15, 1977? The question is a most pressing one now because the prosecutor has informed Scharansky's mother that investigations on charges of treason have been completed and the court has appointed a lawyer to "defend" Scharansky. This amounts to an official indictment of the young activist. The penalty for treason can be death. Your help will serve not only to support Scharansky but also to strengthen other Soviet Jews who are intimidated by the KGB's treatment of this splendid young man.

Demonstrations Past and Present

On Sunday, February 26th, the New York Conference on Soviet Jewry held a demonstration on 67th Street on one day's notice. More than 600 New orkers came to that demonstration and were addressed by Mayor Koch and Senator Javits. I am proud to announce that almost a third of the assemblage was made up of the KJ-Ramaz community which responded in magnificent fashion to the urgent summons to help a fellow Jew. I was never more proud to be associated with the congregation than when I

today and to society as a whole, the movement essentially discourages the kind of self-sacrifice that is essential for motherhood. As Blu Greenberg, an avowed Orthodox Jewish feminist put it recently, feminism preaches a value system that says to the woman in effect: "Me, for myself, now — and children later."

Taken together, the twin factors of a very low Jewish birth rate and a very high assimilation rate produce not the population bomb of which the PG advocates warn but, for the Jews at least, a population bust. We who have just lost six million are now facing additional losses of our own choice, the result of our own decisions. We ignore this problem only at our own peril.

looked out on that assemblage from the rostrum and saw so many friends and fellow worshippers.

There will be another giant demonstration which will be called on very short notice as soon as a date for Scharansky's trial is set. In fact, it is possible that by the time you receive this Bulletin, the event will have taken place. If not, please be alerted to be ready to come on a day's notice to a mid-town rally in behalf of Scharansky.

Hunger Strike March 15

On March 15, the anniversary of Scharansky's incarceration, American Jewry is being asked to conduct a hunger strike in sympathy with this young man. This should be done by fasting for a full day if possible or, at the very least, until Mincha time

at 12:30, after which, if one must partake of food, one should limit the amount. We will have a special morning service on Wednesday, March 15, at Kehilath Jeshurun at which we will recite special prayers. We urge our congregants to come and join with us in this expression of solidarity with Scharansky.

A Petition

Finally, the Greater New York Conference on Soviet Jewry is trying to collect 100,000 signatures on a petition, the text of which appears in this Bulletin. Please clip out the petition, get the ten signatures within the next couple of days and return the petition to the Synagogue Office without any delay. We would like to submit the 100,000 names by the end of March at the very latest.

PETITION IN BEHALF OF ANATOLY SCHARANSKY

It is now a full year that Soviet Jewry's foremost spokesman, Anatoly Scharansky, has been held in prison without formal charges, without legal counsel and without visitation rights. His only "crime" has been a desire to reunite with his wife in Israel. Soviet authorities have recently announced that they will hold him under these inhumane conditions for up to another half a year.

Incarceration under these terms goes against all international agreements of the Helsinki Accord, to which the Soviet Union is a signatory.

We demand that Anatoly Scharansky be released immediately and that he be allowed to rejoin his wife in his homeland, Israel.

K.J. REACTS TO ARMS SALES TO ARABS

In response to an appeal made on Saturday morning, February 18 during services, more than 200 Congregants contributed \$1.00 each to send a telegrate to President Carter expressing outrage over his decision to provide Egypt and Saudi Arabia with sophisticated arms. Until we are completely satisfied with United States policy in the Middle East, we must continue to let our voices be heard to our public officials. The text of the telegram follows:

"The undersigned wish to record their respectful but vehement opposition to the recent unfortunate turn of our country's foreign policy in the Middle East.

"We view with alarm the sending of sophisticated weapons of destruction to Saudi Arabia, a state that has not encouraged fruitful negotiations between Egypt and Israel.

"We are terribly disappointed that our country has failed to pressure Jordan to enter the negotiations and instead of that has begun to use pressure to force concessions upon Israel without negotiations between the parties to the dispute.

"We are all aware of the enlightened position you took as a candidate for the Presidency on August 31, 1976 and which played a significant role in our decision to support your candidacy. You said, in part: 'It's unfair for the world to blame the nation of Israel for the plight of the Palestinians; that's a major problem that must be shared with the whole of the Middle East. I know Resolution #242 of the United Nations as you know it—it calls on withdrawal of Israel from some of the territories that they acquired in 1967 and it also says that Israel must maintain defensible borders, and those decisions as that evolutionary process is continued, must be decided by the leaders and the people of Israel—not by outside forces.'

"We applauded that position at the time and we have watched with great satisfaction your elevating the issue of human rights to a high priority item on the agenda of mankind.

"We urge you to return to the basic policy of encouraging the process negotiation in the Middle East without exerting pressure through statementarms sales or the like. We are convinced that Prime Minister Begin and Israel in general appreciate Sadat's initiative, desire peace and are willing and able to settle all disputes — including the settlements in Sinai and the West Bank — if other Arab leaders will follow Sadat's example and negotiate without preconditions."
