Ramaz Seniors Establish Outstanding Record As School Completes 41st Year

Westinghouse Winner and Finalist Head List of Honors

We are proud to congratulate the Ramaz School, which is sponsored by Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun, on the eve of Commencement Exercises for the Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Upper School. Once again, the members of the senior class have brought honor to themselves, the school and the Jewish community through their outstanding achievements.

The school now stands sixth in the country in the 37 year history of the Westinghouse Talent Search by virtue of its second winner in two years, Roger Mosesson. Rebekah Zuckerman was also a finalist (among the top 300 out of 22,000 candidates nationwide) in this prestigious competition.

Seventy percent of the class won Regents Scholarships and two students were declared finalists in the National Merit Competition. Both figures represent the best record in the Yeshiva world and the former is probably the best percentage of any school in the state.

FATHER'S DAY

Father's Day has become such an orgy of commercialism and elaborate gift-giving, it has resulted in many Americans becoming oblivious rather than mindful of the original spiritual and human purposes that this day was intended to observe. Those purposes, simply put, regarded Father's Day as the culmination of a year-long expression of love, caring and respect that the father and husband shared with his family on a daily basis, rather than a once-a-year piling on of unnecessary ties and after-shave lotion.

The Biblical and Rabbinic traditions of Judaism sought to make the point about the ongoing nature of manifesting reverence and respect between parent and child in several ways. Thus, the Bible used the same expressions for honoring and revering parents as are used for honoring and revering God Himself, thus elevating such respect to ultimate importance in our hierarchy of values. Rabbinic Judaism requires that such reverence should be manifested in concrete ways, such as the following: A son or daughter should not sit in the place where one's father usually sits as a sign of respect; children should not talk in a place where the father is ac-

customed to talking and should not contradict him. Genuine honor calls for a child to provide the father with food and drink, clothing and covering and shoes, and in the case of a sick parent, to conduct him or her in and out of his residence. A child is not relieved of the obligation of honoring the father even if he is a bad man and a transgressor of religious law.

Of course, there is another side of the coin of Father's Day which the late Rabbi Abraham Heschel expressed with his usual trenchancy. The problem we face, he wrote, the problem I as a father face, is why my child should revere me. Unless my child will sense in my personal existence acts and attitudes that evoke reverence — the ability to delay satisfactions, to overcome prejudices, to sense the holy, to strive for the noble — why should he or she revere me?

Father's Day is a good time for both fathers and families together to ponder such basic questions of human relationships such as these in a society and in a time which badly needs the restoration of respect and reverence for the human personality.

YOM HA-SHO'A OBSERVED BY CONGREGATION AND RAMAZ IN IMPRESSIVE MANNER

For the first time in our history, almost the entire main floor of the Main Synagogue was filled to capacity by men, women and children who came to participate in this year's observance of Yom Ha-sho'a (Holocaust Day) on Wednesday, May 3, at 7:30.

The commemoration consisted of a Ma'ariv service at which Cantor Davis officiated; special readings from Holocaust literature, presented by Larry Kamerman, Mindy Lookstein and Rona Woldenberg of the Ramaz Upper School; choral selections by the Middle School Chorus of Ramaz; and a brief talk by Nathan Dershowitz, Director of the Commission on Law, Social Action and Urban Affairs of the American Jewish Congress. The entire program lasted one hour.

The program began with the lighting of six memorial candles by six survivors of the Holocaust, Mrs. Cornelia Kaye, Dr. Emory Klein, Mrs. Gabriella Major, Mr. Herman Smilow, Mrs. Malvina Wachter and Mr. Abraham Zlotogorski.

"Going to Shul to Say Kaddish"

Much has been said in dispraise of Jews who obey the rules of the Kaddish though otherwise they hardly ever pray at all. The contempt is unwarranted: the Kaddish must meet their needs better than anything else in the synagogue. And these are not only needs of the kind we have learned about from Freud, but also needs for style and tradition. Freud said that the collective neurosis of religion spares us the trouble of developing individual personal neuroses. With the Kaddish, Judaism spares each Jew the trouble of developing for himself a style — etiquette, ritual, mode of expression, symbolic action — at a time when he wants it and when he knows he cannot devise something personal that will be as good.

The Jewish rites — the burial, the seven days at home, the Kaddish — have the advantage of being a tradition, a style. We need assume no responsibility for them, as we would for any personal or private symbolic action, nor can there be any question of their appropriateness. They are appropriate almost by definition, because of their antiquity, their near-universality, their publicness. Yet their publicness, so far from making them exterior and impersonal, makes them all the more appropriate to the particular relationship between mourner and mourned: the Kaddish I now say for my father, he said for his; and so back through a recession of the generations that exceeds what my imagination can grasp. Acting as my father acted, I become conscious that

PAVEL ABRAMOVICH — A SIMPLE HERO

The Case of Pavel Abramovich

Presently under threat of trial on charges of "parasitism" (for being without work, Article 209/1 of the RSFSR Criminal Code), Soviet Jewish activist Pavel Abramovich first applied for an exit visa to Israel in 1971 with his wife and son. Denied on grounds of "State's interest," Abramovich was promptly fired from his job as an engineer and has since earned his living as a private teacher of Hebrew. Though the Soviet authorities have long known of his activities, this latest harassment, which could result in two years imprisonment is a further attempt to discourage those Soviet Jews attempting to leave the USSR, as well as the further teaching of Hebrew, outside of formal university classes.

In a statement proving his innocence, Abramovich wrote, "I cannot consider myself guilty of parasitism in accordance with the law as, first of all, I give private Hebrew lessons and therefore have an income from which I regularly pay taxes. I also submitted a list of persons studying Hebrew with me to the Captain of the Militia, following his request. Secondly, fearing being accused of parasitism, I found a job for which I get a saalry.

"Unfortunately I cannot give the name of the workplace because of the fear to lose it. In addition, I was informed by the Deputy Procurator of the Pervomaisky region that I have the right not to inform the militia authorities of the name of my workplace. The investigation authorities have to prove the guilt and not vice versa, i.e. it is the duty of the investigation authorities to find the workplace.

Throughout his long wait for permission to emigrate, Pavel had demonstrated amazing courage and strength on behalf of other Soviet Jews. He has publicly renounced his Soviet citizenship, claiming instead Israel citizenship. He has sent appeals to numerous Soviet officials and international human rights organizations and been arrested on several occasions for demonstrating in protest of his continued denials. His home has been raided and personal property confiscated by Soviet authorities.

I met Pavel Abramovich on my last trip to the Soviet Union in October, 1975. He was at the Azbel Seminar where I delivered a paper on "The Biblical Hero as an Antihero," describing traditional Jewish heroes as people who possess great strength and yet who present a simple, modest, self-effacing countenance and character. Pavel Abramovich is such a hero. Going to Shul (Cont'd)

I am a link in the chain of being. Nor am I hindered from expressing particular, local, present emotion.

One of the things a Jew is supposed to say about someone who has died is the prayer that Abigail said for David (though in his lifetime and in his presence), that his soul may be bound up in the bundle of life. Saying this is of a piece with the rest of our ritual. Whatever its efficacy may be for the dead, it binds *me* up in the bundle of life, situates *me* in the procession of the generations, frees *me* from the prison of now and here.

Although we have been born when it is hard to believe in immortality, the Kaddish helps us to believe, a little. I know that it makes me think of my father often, more than forty times a week; and it will keep reminding me of him after I have stopped saying the Kaddish daily, when I hear someone else say it and I make the appropriate response. To think of my father, to recall him, is to hold off his mortality — and because ritual is eloquent, to hold it off still one generation further. Where has Daddy gone? To shul, to say Kaddish for Grandpa. By doing what allows my children to ask this question and receive this answer, I also allow myself to hope that my own mortality will similarly be delayed.

OF COMMUNITY INTEREST
