"AMERICAN WRITERS CONFRONT ISRAEL"

We are pleased to announce that Rabbi Maurice Wohlgelernter, who is Professor of English at CUNY, will address our next Seudah Sh'lishit on Shabbat afternoon, December 9, on the subject, "American Writers Confront Israel."

Dr. Wohlgelernter is the author of two books: Israel Zangwill: A Study and Frank O'Conner: An Introduction, both of which were published by Columbia University Press. He received his Ph.D. in English from Columbia.

He plans to discuss in this lecture the contrasting views of Saul Bellow and Gerald Green (author of "Holocaust") toward Israel. We expect that his presentation will be enlightening for all of us who read works by American Jewish authors.

PROCEDURES FOR LIGHTING CHANUKAH CANDLES

Beginning with Sunday Evening, December 24

While the practice of gift giving has become an integral part of the Festival of Lights, the lights themselves are the principal observance of the holiday and should be highlighted as the central feature of Chanukah in the home.

The following are a few items which should be kept in mind:

- 1. The Menorah While one Menorah suffices for the household, it is customary - and desirable - for each member of the household to light his own Menorah. This is particularly recommended for the children in the family who will take special delight in kindling their own Chanukah
- 2. The Time for Lighting The candles should be lit as soon as possible after nightfall (30 minutes after sunset). They should be allowed to burn for at least 30 minutes.

On Saturday night at home, the candles are lit after Havdalah. On Friday afternoon, they are lit before the Sabbath candles and they should be large enough so that they will remain lit for about an hour and a half.

- 3. Arranging the Candles The candles are set from the right side of the Menorah as the candle lighter faces it. Each night an additional candle is lit.
- 4. Lighting the Candles The candles are lit from left to right starting with the newest candle first. We begin by lighting the "Shamash." Then the blessings are recited three on the first night and two on the other nights. After the blessings are recited, we light the candles by the flame of the "Shamash."

The reason for using the "Shamash" is in order to avoid any practical use of the Chanukah candles. These lights are holy and their sole purpose is a ritual one — to proclaim the miracle of Chanukah.

5. Concluding Songs — Following the lighting of the candles, we sing ha-Nerot ha-Lalu, which explains the reason for the ceremony, and Maoz Tzur, a ballad which describes in several stanzas how Divine Providence has intervened at various points in history to save us from our enemies.
