## ONE THOUSAND PAID TRIBUTE TO RABBI HASKEL LOOKSTEIN

**RAMAZ PARENTS AND K.J. CONGREGANTS ATTEND ANNUAL DINNER**

Almost a thousand guests filled the largest hall of the New York Hilton Hotel on Sunday evening, January 21, to pay tribute to Rabbi Haskel Lookstein on the occasion of twenty years of association with Ramaz as a teacher and Principal.

The evening was a manifestation of warmth and appreciation to one who was himself a student of Ramaz and a member of its first graduating class.

Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, Founder of Ramaz, crystallized the mood of the occasion. He said: "We all join in a chorus of acclaim to you — as a learned Rabbi, as a brilliant educator and as a man of profound piety. But above all we salute you as a warm human being of kindness, compassion and love. Indeed, your soul is touched by saintliness."

One hundred and twenty children of Ramaz participated in a musical performance of song and dance that thrilled the audience. In cantata form they described the various interests

and personal as well as communal activities of the guest of honor.

A highlight of the evening was a rendition by the children of Rabbi and Mrs. Haskel Lookstein. Mindy, Debbie, Shira and Joshua described lustily and beautifully the personal qualities and home atmosphere of the Lookstein family.

The guest of honor spoke feelingly about all those who cooperated with him in the management and administration of the school. He presented a special scroll to Mrs. Lester Krulwich in appreciation of her devoted service.

Lawrence A. Kobrin, Chairman of the Ramaz Board of Trustees, read a scroll of tribute designed by Morris Wyshogrod and gave it to the Rabbi. Dr. Noam Shudofsky, on behalf of the Parents Council, gave the Rabbi and his wife an unusual silver memento of the occasion, carved and made by the Israeli artist Michael Ende.

The event will take its place in the annals of Ramaz as one of the great occasions in the history of the school.

Congratulations to him and to the SCA on this new association.

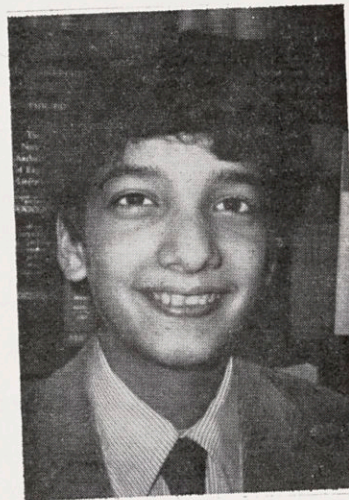
## Nine Ramaz Seniors Leave for Five Months of Study in Israel

## ARE YOU CONTINUING YOUR JEWISH EDUCATION?

We are pleased to present the program of studies for the Institute for Continuing Jewish Education of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun and Ramaz School. You will find a continuation here of some of the courses which we have been running in the fall and you will also find two new offerings for the spring.

### **Everyone should be able to read Hebrew**

One of those new offerings is an eight-session course in Hebrew reading for beginners. There is no reason for anyone in this community not to be able to read Hebrew competently. All who will follow this course will be able to follow a service in a synagogue and will enjoy, in particular, following the reading of the *Haggadah* this coming Passover.

### **When Harlem was Jewish**

Our second major new offering for the spring is a series of lectures and discussions by an outstanding graduate of Ramaz School, Dr. Jeffrey S. Gurock, who is at present an Assistant Professor of Jewish History at Yeshiva University. Dr. Gurock will be delivering a series of lectures this month at the YMHA on the same topic. He wrote his dissertation on this fascinating subject dealing with one of the most vibrant Jewish communities in America, which, alas, is no more but which has been dispersed into many other areas of Metropolitan New York.

This course will be held at the homes of members of the community. Students will find Dr. Gurock to be a very engaging young man from whom we can all learn a great deal and in whose historical material we will all find much interest.

### **TALMUD**

#### **Berakhot**

**Instructor: Dr. Gilbert N. Kahn**

This course uses the El Am edition of the Babylonian Talmud, Tractate Berakhot, as its basic text. Its major concerns are laws pertaining to daily prayers and blessings. It will continue to meet throughout the year. Sessions begin with a light breakfast. Hours—Sunday mornings — 9:15-10:30.

#### **Moed Katan**

**Instructor: Rabbi Haskel Lookstein**

The Rabbi's Talmud Class will continue meeting Monday evenings. The group is studying the Tractate of *Moed Katan*, with plans to complete the Tractate by the end of the year. A *siyum* will be held at the conclusion of this program of study.

The class is open to veteran students of Talmud as well as newcomers who would like to learn this Tractate, which deals with the laws of the intermediate days of the festivals and also the practices of mourning according to Jewish tradition. Hours — Monday nights — 7:45-8:45.

#### **Nedarim, Chapter 4**

**Instructor: Rabbi Jack Bieler**

This section deals with legal responsibilities incurred by verbal declarations. Rabbi Bieler provides his students with an in-depth analysis of the text with commentaries. Classes are held at 8:00 A.M., in the Jess Ward Library, every Saturday morning.

#### **Hilkhot Shabbat**

**Rabbi Haskel Lookstein**

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein will continue his class on the Laws of Shabbat. He plans to complete the study of those laws by Shavuot. Here is an opportunity to learn how to observe Shabbat properly, meaningfully and inspirationally: to know what to do and why. Hours: Saturday afternoons, one-half hour before Mincha.

### **THE JEWISH COMMUNITY OF HARLEM, 1870-1930**

**Instructor: Dr. Jeffrey S. Gurock**

New York's second largest Jewish community was once in Harlem. Dr. Gurock will examine what attracted Jews to this neighborhood and what caused their departure to other parts of New York and the suburbs. He will explore the ties that were established between this community and other Jewish centers of New York. This course will enlighten us on a topic which, while very close to home, is very far from many of our minds. All sessions will meet on Sunday evenings.

### CHUMASH

#### Parshat HaShavuah

## Disturbing Statistics

A disturbing set of statistics were reported by Professor Leonard Fein of Brandeis University at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (JTA, Dec. 5). Professor Fein stated that one-third of all Jews who marry today take a non-Jewish mate. He reported, further, that the Jewish divorce rate now equals that of the population-at-large: 38% of all first marriages end in divorce. He added that the Jewish birth rate stands now at approximately 1.4 children per family, far below the replacement level even biologically and without taking into account the loss rate through intermarriage and assimilation. Furthermore, the Jewish birth rate is considerably below the national average of 1.7 children per family.

These statistics give all of us much cause for concern. If these figures do not change within the foreseeable future, the Jewish population of America will decline precipitously, with disastrous results for the survival of Judaism in this country.

## TWO ANSWERS TO ANNE ROIPHE

Among the letters which were sent to the New York Times in answer to the self-hating article which appeared on the front page of the Home Section on Thursday, December 21, 1978, entitled "Christmas in a Jewish Home," there were several which were sent by members of our congregation. We reprint here two of them, one by a sociologist and the other by a Ramaz student.

To the Editor:

I am responding to the article "Christmas in a Jewish Home," printed December 21, 1978. A high school senior interested in medicine, I am a third generation Yankee fan who speaks French and hopes to go to Paris. However, I celebrate Chanukah in addition to all the other Jewish holidays. A menorah, instead of a Christmas tree, lights my home every year for eight days. In other words, I, too, like Ann Roiphe enjoy all aspects of American society, yet I am totally aware of my religion and I love it with all my heart.

While the author of this article states that she doubts God because of the plagues He brought upon Egypt as well as the miracle of the Red Sea, she fails to point out the events that preceded God's action. Were not the Jews enslaved for 400 years before their exodus from Egypt? Did not Moses and Aaron ask Pharaoh to release the Jews in a peaceful manner? Was there not a decree passed down by the king of Egypt which stated that all first born Jewish males were to be thrown into the Nile?

The God who allowed the Holocaust to occur, for reasons we will never know, is the same God who saved Israel in the wars of 1948 and 1956, the Six Day War and the Yom Kippur War of 1973. How can a mere person who does not observe the commandments, who knows very little about her religion challenge the acts of God? Maybe, if the author had studied Judaism with the same intense conviction she had devoted to anthropology, history of art and psychology the author would realize that there is much more to Judaism than the ghettos of the past.

I would like to point out that Chanukah is much more than oil lasting for eight days. That oil was found at all was the miracle, for the Temple was totally destroyed by the Greeks (not the Romans, as the author stated). The miracle was also that the small group of Jews who refused to assimilate and to submit themselves to a mighty, intolerant power emerged victorious.

What gives Anne Roiphe, a woman who knows and understands her reli-

To the Home Section:

Anne Roiphe's article, "Christmas Comes to a Jewish Home," (Dec. 21) disturbed me for a number of reasons. First, Ms. Roiphe appears to be mixing apples and pears as she muses over her grandparents' probable response to her and her children's activities at this season. It is one thing to see the "Nutmcracker Suite," marvel at the Christmas tree in Rockefeller Center, watch Frosty the Snowman on television, or sing a couple of Christmas carols in the school assembly. It is another to order tree ornaments, hide Christmas presents in drawers, or hostess an annual Christmas party. The latter involve active participation in a holiday which, despite its commercialization, is imbued with religious significance. The former are seasonal manifestations or accompaniments of the latter — to be enjoyed or not according to one's esthetic taste. I am an observant Jew, but I love the fact that at this season, as I turn the dial on my stereo, I am likely to hear strains of Handel's Messiah — music that my Chassidic husband enjoys even more than I.

Second, I cannot agree with Ms. Roiphe's suggestion that attachment to one's people — in fact, to any ethnic or religious group — is the result of being "sealed off by sufficient hatred and prejudice" from others. I am not full of hate for my Christian neighbors, nor do I think I am prejudiced. Still, I am Jewish and proud of it. I love the Jewish people (although I don't always approve of the behavior of some Jews). I love the State of Israel (although I sometimes disagree with its actions and politics). And I believe that my observance of Jewish law and tradition will help to perpetuate a religion and culture that has contributed much to humanity.

Further, I resent Ms. Roiphe's implication that identification with what she calls a "tribal group" precludes love of Raphael, Giotto, or Michaelangelo. My husband and I marveled at the splendor of Rome, Florence, and Venice this past summer as we munched our raw fruit and vegetables (since we observe the "tribal" laws of Kashrut). The Sistine Chapel was beautiful beyond imagination — but what has appreciation of art, of literature, of music to do with Christmas trees in a Jewish home?

I was also astonished at the suggestion that rejection of Chanukah, of the Seder, of the synagogue and embracing the Christmas tree "obviously has something to do with education." My children are all committed and practicing Jews, despite their medical, law and graduate degrees. Yes — they were exposed to the "cheder" but also to the philosophy, art history, and anthropology Ms. Roiphe speaks of. I might add that I have studied and taught Sociology which informs us that society is a composite not of individuals, but of groups — be they religious, political, cultural, or ethnic — to which people belong and with which they identify. As a sociologist, I also know how very crucial is identity; those without it tend to search for it and the proliferation of cults in our anomic society is (sometimes all too tragic) evidence of the need for identity.

And finally, may I assure Ms. Roiphe that she is far from unique. Many studies reveal the same typical third generation assimilationist response. Therefore, to clothe this response in philosophical terms is somewhat pretentious. Fortunately, to counterbalance the assimilationist trend is the also common phenomenon known as Hansen's Law: "The grandson tries to remember what the son has tried to forget." Perhaps Ms. Roiphe's own children will someday remember what she has tried so hard to forget.
