RAMAZ STUDENTS FAST FOR CAMBODIANS AND COLLECT FUNDS FOR THEIR RELIEF

In an impressive display of concern for their fellow human beings, the Ramaz Middle and Upper Schools embarked during November on an extended campaign to sensitize themselves to the plight of the Cambodians and to take steps within their means to relieve that plight.

It all began with a young lady in the 6th grade by the name of Lisa Gallin (daughter of our members, Dr. and Mrs. Richard Gallin) who spoke at a Shabbat assembly about the starving nd dying children of Cambodia. The nildren of the Middle School organized a relief campaign and raised well over \$500 to help their fellow human

beings in the Far East.

Not to be outdone, the students of the Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Upper School, under the leadership of Eugene Major (son of our members, Dr. and Mrs. William Major), President of the G.O., and other leaders of the Jewish Affairs Committee, organized a day of solidarity with these unfortunate people from the other side of the world. After several days of preparation, through speeches in the classrooms, posters all over the school and various reminders, the student body gathered on Wednesday, November 28, for special programs in support of the unfortunate people of

Cambodia. They were addressed by Samuel Haber, Honorary Executive Director of the Joint Distribution Committee. They gave up lunch for that day and contributed the amount which they would have spent on their own lunches. The Ramaz School officially contributed the amount which the school lunch program saved by not serving lunch to children from grade 8 through 12. hose funds, plus the individual contrioutions of the students, brought in \$817 for Cambodian relief, a number which corresponds to the number of the student body in Ramaz today.

TORAH WRITING CEREMONY HELD ON NOVEMBER 18

Impressive Memorial Tribute to Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein

Those who were present on Sunday morning, November 18, will never forget the beautiful and moving service and the inspirational memorial to our beloved Senior Rabbi, Joseph H. Look-

stein, of blessed memory.

The Main Synagogue, both on the main floor and in the ladies' balcony, was comfortably filled with many members of the Congregation and parents of Ramaz who heard Joshua Lookstein and Peter Miller lead the Shacharit Service and then listened in rapt attention as Elie Wiesel and Rabbi Israel Miller spoke movingly about the Rabbi and about the significance of the Torah Writing ceremony in his honor.

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein introduced the guest speakers and set the tone for the morning. Milton Berkowitz and Irwin Shapiro, Co-Chairmen of the Torah Writing project, presided over the proceedings. Cantor Davis rendered a beautiful cantorial selection. The Ramaz Chorus brought many of the assemblage to tears with its magnificent singing under the direction of Michael Berl while 31 leaders of the Congregation, the School and the community were called to the central bima to write letters in the beginning of our Torah.

It was a beautiful ceremony from start to finish, filled with nostalgia, sentiment and, above all, dignity. As Rabbi Haskel Lookstein remarked at the close, it was the kind of event which the late Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein would have loved. It was very much in his spirit

and in his style.

We would like to thank Mr. Berkowitz and Mr. Shapiro together with the entire Torah Committee for planning so beautiful a function. Our gratitude to all

who participated in the service and program. They helped to make this one of the most memorable occasions in the history of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun.

And Now for the Future

The Torah Committee informs us that every member of the Congregation and every parent in Ramaz will be invited during the course of the coming months to write a letter in the Torah. The invitation will be a personal one and the writing will take place in groups of a reasonable size. We would like to stress that there is absolutely no fundraising associated with this project. Sam Haber expressed it well when he said "I am proud to be here and to be associated with this magnificent demonstration of concern for human beings. It is an honor for me to join you in this demonstration of solidarity with those in need."

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein, in commenting on Mr. Haber's words, reminded the students that what they were doing was very deeply rooted in the Jewish tradition. As the Torah states: "You know the plight of the strangers for you yourselves were

strangers in Egypt."

It is nice to see that students in a yeshiva, who are the first to turn out for Soviet Jews and for demonstrations of support for Israel, can also react sensitively to the plight of non-Jews who desperately need our concern, our prayers and our help.

PLACES FOR NEW PRIMARY SCHOOL CHILDREN SCARCE

As of November 15 the number of applicants for the 3-year old nursery, 4-year old nursery, kindergarten and first grade for September 1980 had already exceeded the number of places in those classes. TO COMBAT **VOTER APATHY** YOU MUST VOTE

In response to an article in the October issue of the Bulletin stressing that in many communities Jews no longer vote in large numbers, The League of Women Voters has provided our Synagogue Office with voter registration forms. Now, you need not go down to Varick Street but simply pick up a copy at the Synagogue and mail it in.

Anyone who has moved since the last time he voted or hasn't voted in the last two elections must register. Forms must be received at the Board of Elections no later than January 25th in order to vote in the March 25th Presidential Primary.

In this time of special concern about Israel, our city's neighborhoods and many other domestic and international issues, it is crucial that members of the Jewish community express their views in the ballot box.

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PROCEDURES FOR LIGHTING **CHANUKAH CANDLES**

Beginning with Friday Evening, December 14

While the practice of gift giving has become an integral part of the Festival of Lights, the lights themselves are the principal observance of the holiday and should be highlighted as the central feature of Chanukah in the home.

The following are a few items which

should be kept in mind:

1. The Menorah While one Menorah suffices for the household, it is customary — and desirable — for each member of the household to light his own Menorah. This is particularly recommended for the children in the family who will take special delight in kindling their own Chanukah lamps.

2. The Time for Lighting — The candles should be lit as soon as possible after nightfall (30 minutes after sunset). They should be allowed to burn for at

least 30 minutes.

On Saturday night at home, the candles are lit after Havdalah. On Friday afternoon, they are lit before the Sabbath candles and they should be large enough so that they will remain lit for about an hour and a half.

3. Arranging the Candles — The candles are set from the right side of the Menorah as the candle lighter faces it. Each night an additional candle is lit.

4. Lighting the Candles - The candles are lit from left to right — starting with the newest candle first. We begin by lighting the "Shamash." Then the blessings are recited — three on the first night and two on the other nights. After the blessings are recited, we light the candles by the flame of the "Shamash".

The reason for using the "Shamash"

is in order to avoid any practical use of the Chanukah candles. These lights are holy and their sole purpose is a ritual one — to proclaim the miracle of

Chanukah.

5. Concluding Songs — Following the lighting of the candles, we sing ha-Nerot ha-Lalu, which explains the reason for the ceremony, and Maoz Tzur, a ballad which describes in several stanzas how Divine Providence has intervened at various points in history to save us from our enemies.

A REMINDER ABOUT THE RAMAZ DINNER

On Sunday, January 20, 1980, at the Waldorf, the Parents Council of Ramaz School will hold its Annual Dinner Dance. The evening will represent a celebration of the life and work of the late Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein. The Ramaz Chorus and Dramatics Society will present a cantata that evening depicting the varied career of leadership of this extraordinary personality who was Rabbi of the Congregation for 56 years and Founder and Principal of Ramaz.

The Journal for the Dinner, which goes to press by December 20, will offer an opportunity to members of the community to write memorial tributes to the Senior Rabbi expressing in their own words how the Rabbi touched their lives and influenced

their existence.

"SEE AND SANCTIFY: EXPLORING JEWISH SYMBOLS," MAJOR SPECIAL EXHIBIT OF YESHIVA UNIVERSITY MUSEUM

The Yeshiva University Museum's major special exhibition for the year, "See and Sanctify: Exploring Jewish Symbols," was announced by Sylvia Herskowitz, Museum director.

The environmental display will focus upon those symbols that raise the level of consciousness from the secular to the sacred, and upon a selection of objects that reflect symbolic significance. In addition to antique ceremonial silver, books and textiles, there is a fascinating assortment of curiosa. These include such artifacts as a World War I artillery shell casing manufactured by Krupp in Germany, used in the war by the Turkish army, and then taken to Palestine where it was transformed into a vase to commemorate the liberation of Jerusalem by General Allenby in 1917; a design by an architect inmate for an officer's lounge in Theresienstadt Concentration Camp and defaced by the camp commandant who thought the
