Our *Chatan Torah* is admirably suited for this honor. He is a *talmid chacham* of the first rank and a scholar of English and Comparative Literature.

Born in Toronto, Canada, he received his B.A. and *S'micha* from Yeshiva University and his M.A. and Ph.D. from Columbia. He is Professor of English and Chairman of the Religion and Culture Program at Baruch College of the City University of New York. He has also served as Professor of English at Yeshiva College, Stern College, Bar-Ilan and the New School.

Rabbi Wohlgelernter has authored three books, all of them published by Columbia University Press: *Israel Zangwill: A study* (1964); *Frank O'Connor: An Introduction* (1977); and *History, Religion and Spiritual Democracy: Essays in Honor of Joseph L. Blau* (1980).

At present, he is engaged in writing a critical study of the late Joseph Wood Krutch, which, when completed, will also be published by Columbia University Press—an unprecedented honor.

His wife, Esther, is a teacher in the public school system and they are the parents of Debra, Elli and Beth. Their

daughters are both graduates of Ramaz.

Our *Chatan Torah*, therefore, represents a remarkable combination of *Torah* and *derekh eretz* and we are pleased to be able to honor him in this fashion.

Our *Chatan B'reishit* was born in Austria-Poland, raised in Vienna during World War I and spent several years as a *halutz* in Israel to which he led some 80 of his countrymen.

Abraham I. Holzer comes from *chasidic* stock. His father was an outstanding student of *Torah* while his mother was a *Tchortkover chasid* and a close relative of Rabbi Mayer of Primishlan. You can sense his glorious spiritual background in the way in which he *davens* for the *Amud*, in his delight in chanting the prayers and in the glow which is on his face every Shabbat in *shul*.

Mr. and Mrs. Holzer's children are all Ramaz graduates. Two of them are doctors and one has a Master's degree in computer science and business administration. One of their grandsons is a student at Yeshiva University.

Last year Mr. and Mrs. Holzer presented the synagogue with a giant

tallit which will be used for the special *aliyah* for children on *Simchat Torah*. It is a source of special pride to us that on the first occasion when the *tallit* is used we will be honoring this proud and pious son of Israel and generous Jewish philanthropist with the highest Torah honor of the year.

Our *Chatan Maftir*, in keeping with a tradition of many years at Kehilath Jeshurun, is a younger member of the Congregation. Abe Esses is a graduate of Magen David Yeshiva and the Yeshiva of Flatbush. He received his Bachelor of Hebrew Literature and his B.S. in Mathematics from Yeshiva University where he belonged to the Pi Mu Epsilon Math Honor Society.

Abe, whose family background is Syrian, married a lovely Ashkenazic Jew, Barbara, who is also a graduate of Yeshiva of Flatbush and of Brooklyn College with a degree in political science. As they put it, their greatest achievements to date are Leo and Jeffrey, who delight the Congregation with their enthusiasm at our services.

Abe and Barbara have been very active in the activities of K.J. with par-

We hope that the spirit of Hakafot Unlimited will help to usher in a year of joy and happiness, unlimited, with the Torah as our inspiration.

PENITENTIAL SEASON ENDS

HOSHANAH RABBAH SERVICE OCTOBER 1, at 6:45 A.M.

Hoshannah Rabbah services will be held today, October 1, at 6:45 A.M. in the Main Synagogue.

Hoshannah Rabbah traditionally marks the close of the penitential season. For that occasion, the Cantor is robed in his white *kittel*. Many of the melodies of the High Holy Days are sung. The congregation makes seven circuits around the *Bimah* with *lulav* and *ethrog*, and finally, of course, the *Aravot* are taken and eventually used in their customary colorful fashion.

Following the service, Sandy Eisenstat, President of the Congregation, will sponsor breakfast for all who are in attendance. It will have the traditional fare, embellished for the *Yom Tov*.

**PROFESSOR HENRY F. GRAFF TO DELIVER
FIRST SUPPER LECTURE—OCTOBER 26**
"Jews in the Presidential Mind—And Vice Versa"

The historical relationship between American Jews and the Man in the White House has been at times proud, distressing, funny and puzzling—and never more tense and fateful than in 1980. In that light, Professor Henry F. Graff will inaugurate this season's Supper Lecture Series on Sunday evening, October 26 at 6:00 P.M. The title of the talk will be: **JEW IN THE PRESIDENTIAL MIND—AND VICE VERSA.**

Professor of History at Columbia and former Chairman of its Department, Dr. Graff has also taught at Vassar College and has lectured at major colleges and universities throughout the United States. His field of specialization is United States foreign relations and the history of the United States presidency.

Dr. Graff has written extensively for leading historical and popular journals and magazines. His book reviews have frequently appeared in the *New York Times Book Review* and his topical articles in *The New York Times Magazine*. Two of the best known of these dealt with the war in Viet Nam, and were based on detailed conversations with President Lyndon Johnson and his chief advisors. He has also published several books.

In treating the subject of this lecture, Professor Graff promises a reflective review appropriate to this presidential election year.

The cost for the Supper Lecture, including dinner, is \$7.50. All students may make reservations at the rate of \$4 per person.

**NEW JUDAICA SHOP
TO OPEN IN KJ LOBBY**

After months of planning, preparation and construction, we are pleased to announce the opening of the new Judaica Shop next to the checkroom in the synagogue lobby. The opening date is Sunday, November 2, 1980. The early November opening will allow a full month for Chanukah shopping for both gifts and other holiday necessities.

The shop is co-sponsored by the Congregation and Ramaz. Proceeds will go to support the youth program of the Synagogue and the after school activities of Ramaz.

The Judaica Shop will fill a void that currently exists in this part of the city. Differing from the average synagogue "gift" shop, it will serve as an educational resource center and be a showcase for the best Israeli arts and crafts.

Amongst the unique features of the Judaica Shop will be a *sforim* sale and Bar/Bat Mitzvah book registry. As books are particularly appropriate gifts for such occasions, students and parents will be able to register titles in which they are most interested. Friends and relatives may then be referred to the Judaica Shop with the knowledge that books already purchased will have been removed from the list. This will allow our families to further expand home Jewish libraries and allow our young members to begin to build their own. Prices will frequently reflect discounts, and the shop will be in a unique position to offer exceptional service.

The book department will have on display 250 titles of Jewish interest, including scholarly works, contemporary writings, art books, children's books, and specialty volumes. Jewish records will also be featured.

The Judaica shop will highlight items for the home, for Shabbat and holiday celebrations, as well as practical necessities such as havdalah candles and yahrzeit candles.
