BEGINNERS' MINYAN TO START SATURDAY MORNING JANUARY 10th

Responding to the need expressed by a number of members of the congregation and the KJ community, a special service for beginners will be incorporated into Sabbath morning services on a once-a-month basis. This introductory *minyan* will be led by Mr. David Bernstein a member of the Ramaz faculty who has previously served on the synagogue staff.

The service will begin at 9:30 AM and continue until 11:00 AM at which time the participants will proceed to the main synagogue for the balance of the service. It is geared to those wishing to improve their understanding of the Sabbath morning service with emphasis on structure and an explanation of the contents of the various prayers. Participants will gain a familiarity of the service leading toward greater participation in the main congregation. Through this *minyan*, attendees will gain additional insights into basic Jewish concepts and practices.

The *minyan* will be held the second Saturday of each month beginning with January 10th. It will meet in the 6th floor library. Those wishing to participate are asked to call the synagogue office (427-1000) in advance.

The Annual Dinner/Dance of the Ramaz Parents' Council will honor three members of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun for their extraordinary service to the school in the creation of the new Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Upper School building on East 78th Street. The Dinner/Dance will be held at the Waldorf on Sunday evening, January 18.

A. Phillip Goldsmith, a former Vice President of the Congregation and Honorary Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Ramaz, will be honored as Chairman of the Finance Committee for the Building Fund, which has now raised more than \$6,500,000 toward the \$8,000,000 goal necessary for the completion of the project. Mr. Goldsmith has been deeply involved in the planning and construction of the new building since the inception of this effort.

Melvin D. Newman, Vice Chairman of the Ramaz Board, will be honored as the Chairman of the Building Committee. Mr. Newman has given extraordinary leadership to this endeavor throughout the history of this project.

He and his family made the first major gift which propelled the Building Fund forward. This building is named The Morris and Ida Newman Educational Center, in memory of Mr. Newman's father and in honor of his mother.

Arthur C. Silverman, Treasurer of the school, is Chairman of the Construction Committee. In that capacity he has supervised every detail of the construction and all aspects of the funding requirements. His commitment to this project, in terms of hours and talent, has been matchless. In many ways, the building is a tribute to that commitment.

The Ramaz Dinner/Dance of course will not specifically benefit the Building Fund. All proceeds from this affair go to the Ramaz Scholarship Fund which helps to make it possible for many students, whose parents cannot afford the Ramaz tuition, to benefit from the education offered at the school. The Curriculum Development Fund of the school is also a beneficiary of this Dinner. That Fund helps to finance creative and innovative programs to enhance the Ramaz education.

We are happy to announce this event to the Kehilath Jeshurun family and we hope that many members of the Congregation will want to attend this affair to honor the three leaders cited above and to help Ramaz continue its outstanding work in the field of general and Jewish education.

RAMAZ STUDENTS RAISE ALMOST \$4,500 FOR UJA IN READATHON

A spectacularly successful Readathon was conducted by the children of grades 3 through 6 in the Ramaz Lower School with the proceeds going to UJA. Children read books and solicited pledges from parents, relatives and friends for each book which they would read.

There is no way of knowing how many books were actually read, though the amount probably numbers in the thousands. The results of this combined educational and philanthropic campaign, however, brought in close to \$4,500, which seems to be the largest amount ever raised by a school of our size for UJA.

Congratulations to Ms. Sandra D. Brickman, Headmistress for General Studies, and to all of the Lower School family - but especially the children themselves - for this splendid effort combining the best in *tzedakah* and educational growth.

WHAT YOU DIDN'T READ IN THE PAPERS

The *JTA* reports that on November 27 Arab terrorists conducted an ambush attack on a school bus carrying children from *Kadumim* to *Elon Moreh*, both *Gush Emunim* settlements. The bus, with 9 children and several adults aboard, was machine-gunned, the windows were shattered but, quick action by the driver who ordered the children to lie on the floor resulted in only minor injuries.

In Washington, a State Department spokesman, when asked to comment on the ambush, said: "My comment is the same as it has been on all of the other deplorable occasions. It is an act of violence which we think is deplorable and which we wish fervently would not happen. I don't think that's the way to solve the problems in that area in the world."

We wonder what the response of the world would have been if Jewish "terrorists" had machine-gunned an Arab school bus carrying Arab children. Would it have made the newspapers? What kind of denunciation would have been forthcoming from our State Department and from governments around the world?

AN INTERESTING "FIRST"

A study, made by the Board of Jewish Education of Greater New York, indicates that, for the first time in the history of any community in the United States, the student population of day schools has overtaken and passed the student population of supplementary schools. The exact figures are as follows: There are 55,513 children enrolled in 198 day schools while there are 52,769 students enrolled in the 368 supplementary schools of greater New York.

What an astonishing statistic! One wonders what the members of the Board of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun would have said when they met in 1937 to consider the "preposterous" idea put forward by the late Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein to establish Ramaz School if they had been able to envision that statistic of Jewish education enrollment 43 years later. Thank God, there were visionaries in our community in 1937.

FOR VIKTOR BRAILOVSKY — A FESTIVAL WITHOUT LIGHTS

In 1972 Lev Roitburd and Viktor Brailovsky each submitted applications for exit visas to Israel. Today - eight years later - Lev Roitburd is finally on his way to fulfilling his dream, but Viktor Brailovsky may be on his way to three years in a Soviet labor camp.

Lev Roitburd, an Odessa engineer, completed a two year sentence in 1977 for "resisting arrest." He became the first of seven former Prisoners of Conscience who were still denied permission to emigrate after having served time in prison or exile. As this Bulletin went to press, the Roitburd family looked forward to celebrating their release over Chanukah with relatives in Israel.

For Viktor Brailovsky, however, Chanukah was not a festival of freedom. After years of KGB threats and harassments, he was seized in his Moscow apartment and charged with "defaming the Soviet state and disturbing public order." If convicted, Viktor can receive a three year sentence.

Brailovsky, a prominent computer scientist, has long been a key figure in the refusenik community. His weekly scientific seminars and informal conferences have attracted both refuseniks and western scientists and have provoked Soviet authorities to search his apartment repeatedly for scientific papers.

Viktor also served as editor of the *samizdat* journal *Jews in the USSR* - a magazine devoted to the history, culture and problems of Jews in the Soviet Union. The charges against him appear to be in connection with his role in this publication.

Viktor Brailovsky's imprisonment ironically coincided with the opening of the Helsinki Accords Review in Madrid and represents a blatant example of Soviet disregard for the basic principles of human rights. Speaking of her husband's arrest, Irina Brailovsky said, "the real reason they acted - and to our great surprise on the very

opening of the East-West Conference in Madrid - must be because of Viktor's refusal to remain quiet about our plight and the plight of tens of thousands of other Soviet Jews who are unable to emigrate."

While Soviet authorities have intensified their campaign against Soviet Jews, the arrest of Viktor Brailovsky is particularly ominous. Brailovsky's detention is the first such move against a veteran activist in almost three years. Moreover, the simultaneous release of Lev Roitburd is an apparent attempt to mitigate world reaction to the move against Brailovsky. This is a tactic which was used by the Soviets in 1977 when they arrested Anatoly Scharansky and released Soviet Jewish Prisoner Mikhail Shtern. It was employed again in 1978 when Vladimir Slepak, Ida Nudel and Josif Begun were exiled and key Moscow activists Iosif and Dina Beilin were allowed to emigrate.

Viktor's arrest leaves his wife, Irina, alone in Moscow with their six year old daughter Dalia and their nineteen year old son, Leonid. Leonid was denied admission to Moscow University and is now eligible for the Soviet draft. Conscription would delay his emigration for seven years, while evading army service would result in a prison sentence.

As we reflect on the Chanukah just past and the Hasmonian victory over oppression, let us remember Viktor Brailovsky who waits in darkness. Cable your support to his family; your protests to Soviet officials.
