PROFESSOR HAROLD FISCH TO RETURN TO KEHILATH JESHURUN AS SECOND SCHOLAR IN RESIDENCE ON SHABBAT, FEBRUARY 13-14

Family Dinner To Be Held Friday Evening

The second Scholar in Residence Shabbat and Friday Evening Family Dinner will be held on the Shabbat of February 13 and 14. Dr. Harold Fisch, who spoke so eloquently from our pulpit last year, will make three presentations to the congregation. Following *kabbalat Shabbat* services and a Friday Evening Family Dinner, Professor Fisch will speak on: **THE LIMITS OF SCIENCE**. Recognizing Judaism's openness to new knowledge, he will question whether science need not be subject to moral controls. This question has become particularly urgent in an age of genetic engineering, nuclear science and depth psychology.

On Saturday morning, Professor Fisch will speak from the pulpit during Shabbat morning services on: **THE LIMITS OF LEADERSHIP**. Recognizing the Rabbi as a recent model in Jewish leadership, Dr. Fisch questions the validity of that leadership today and ponders the Rabbi's role in the future.

Between *mincha* (4:30 pm) and *maariv* services on Saturday afternoon, Professor Fisch will speak on the topic: **THE LIMITS OF ART**. Observing that the tabernacle in the wilderness was conceived as a supreme work of art, but that the golden calf was also a great popular success, Dr. Fisch challenges our ability to discriminate. He acknowledges that today we see all art and poetry treated as sacred, even when they have become subversive. Professor Fisch examines our text's treatment of this question.

HAROLD FISCH

A graduate of Oxford University, and living in Israel since 1956, Dr. Fisch has been Professor of English at Bar Ilan University since 1957 and is head of the Institute for Judaism and Contemporary Thought. In 1977 he attended the thirty-second United Nations General Assembly as a member of the Israeli delegation.



Professor Fisch's writings have been mainly in the field of literary criticism. He is also known as an eloquent spokesman for religious Zionism and his articles on Jewish themes and Israel's current problems have appeared in periodicals throughout the Jewish world.

Dr. Fisch has just published a new book, **THE ZIONIST REVOLUTION: A NEW PERSPECTIVE**. Here, Professor Fisch argues that over the years, the real spiritual and religious motives of Zionism have been

DR. MICHAEL WYSCHOGROD AND DR. JACOB REINER TO AGAIN HIGHLIGHT TUESDAY EVENING PROGRAM

RABBI SHMUEL GORDON, EVELYN BERGER AND MESHULAM MOSKOWITZ TO CONTINUE

MR. ISRAEL D. ROSENBERG'S "TANYA" COURSE SHIFTS TO TUESDAY

A selection of seven courses, offered in two time periods, will round out the ten week spring semester that begins on Tuesday evening, February 3. Classes are offered on every level of Judaic background and a record attendance is again anticipated.

The first class period runs from 7:30 pm to 8:20 pm. A twenty minute "social and snack" break precedes the second class period, which runs from 8:40 pm to 9:30 pm.

Dr. Wyschogrod's course will discuss MARTIN BUBER'S interpretation of Judaism, addressing contemporary issues in Jewish life. Dr. Wyschogrod is Professor of Philosophy and Chairman of the Department at the Bernard Baruch College of the City University of New York.

Rabbi Reiner's course in CLASSICAL JEWISH HISTORY will highlight the Roman Period through the Islamic Era. Dr. Reiner is an Assistant Professor of Jewish History at Yeshiva University and at Queens College of the City University of New York.

Mr. Israel Rosenberg, Ritual Director of the Congregation, will continue his ongoing study of TANYA, one of the fundamental works of Hasidic philosophy.

Evelyn Berger's course in BEGINNER'S

HEBREW is designed to prepare students for participation in synagogue services.

One of the more unique courses offered by the Institute is the HEBREW CALLIGRAPHY course, presented by Meshulam Moskowitz. Both Ms. Berger and Mr. Moskowitz are members of the Ramaz faculty.

Two courses offered by Rabbi Shmuel Gordon are designed to bring the student a clear understanding of the ways of Judaism. TOPICS IN JEWISH THOUGHT AND PRACTICE is a continuing seminar in the beliefs and observances of Judaism. His other course, PRAYER, PRAYER AND PRAYER BOOK (SIDDUR) analyzes different aspects of prayer, as well as the structure and meaning of the various services. Rabbi Gordon is also a member of the Ramaz faculty.

HOLOCAUST LITERATURE SEMINAR CONTINUES TO SPRING SEMESTER

Led by Dr. Maurice Wohlgernter, the Seminar in Holocaust Literature continues to follow its schedule on Wednesday evenings from 7:30 to 9:30 pm.

Rabbi Wohlgernter's approach is not a study of the holocaust itself, but rather an examination of the literary responses to it. Emphasis is on the themes of survival, testimony, resistance, evil and responsibility, meaning and meaninglessness, as well as the future of Jewish existence. Particular emphasis is given to the ethical, philosophical and psychological aspects of

the holocaust experience as described in its literature.

The schedule for the next four sessions is as follows:

February 11: **This Way For the Gas, Ladies and Gentlemen**

February 25: **Child of the Holocaust**

March 11: **Kingdom of the Jews**

April 1: **Sophie's Choice**

The class is in the 8th floor Board Room. Coffee and tea are served.

LUNCH AND LEARN ENTERS FOURTH MONTH

One of the particularly innovative programs added to the catalogue of synagogue activities this year has been a very exciting weekly "Lunch and Learn". Each Wednesday at 12:00 noon, members gather in the synagogue library to lunch together and then participate in one of four programs offered on a rotating basis over each four week period.

In his week, Rabbi Haskel Lookstein has conducted a review and most interesting discussion of a recent magazine article of contemporary Jewish interest. Yiddish and Yiddish Folklore has been the topic of a very warm and frequently nostalgic presentation by Rabbi Mayer Moskowitz, Headmaster of Judaic Studies in the Ramaz Lower School. Robert J. Leifert, Executive Director of the congregation, has been discussing the conditions and problems of American Jews today, and how we face them for tomorrow. His presentations on the "Jewishness of Jewish Leadership in America" have been quite provocative and controversial. Ramaz Music Director, Michael Berl, with the aid of his accordion, has brought the spirit of Jewish Music to the "Lunch and Learn" sessions, by teaching new songs and reviewing old favorites.

Lunch is at noon, the program follows immediately thereafter and concludes at 1:30 pm. Please call the synagogue office to indicate your participation or just come any Wednesday.

RETURN OF MIDTOWN LUNCH AND TALMUD WARMLY RECEIVED

A nice *chevrah* has developed amongst the participants of the Tuesday Midtown Lunch and Talmud course conducted by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein. The *shiur* is learning the Tractate of Megillah, described in greater detail under the listing of Rabbi Lookstein's Saturday afternoon Talmud *shiur*, presented elsewhere in this section.

Each week, the class meets in the conference room of the office of one of its members. Lunch is served from 12:00 to 12:30 and the *shiur* runs from 12:30 to 1:30 pm. Students are encouraged to join and asked to call Rabbi Lookstein's office to learn the midtown location of the next class meeting.

EGIN WEEK OF FEBRUARY 2

Semester to Be Most Ambitious Ever

EIGHT SHIURIM OFFERED BY RABBIS LOOKSTEIN AND BIELER AND DR. GILBERT KAHN

A program of eight *shiurim* continues to be offered throughout the week.

Prior to regular Shabbat morning services, Rabbi Jack Bieler offers a Talmud *shiur* at 8:00 am in the Jess Ward Library. This particular *shiur* is designed to expose the participants to variegated topics that appear in a typical Talmudic chapter. One "amud" (side of the page) is covered per session.

On Saturday afternoon, Rabbi Haskel Lookstein conducts a Talmud *shiur* one hour before *mincha*. The class studies the Tractate of Megillah, including the laws, history and religious principles of the Purim festival. This Tractate also discusses the institution of Torah reading, the selections that are read at various times during the year, and many other principles involved in synagogue worship. The class is conducted in English, and is available for students of different backgrounds. The text of the Talmud is studied together with analysis of the Rishonim and Codes. This Tractate is also discussed in Rabbi Lookstein's Tuesday Midtown Lunch and Talmud program, discussed elsewhere in this section.

Following the regular daily minyan on Sunday mornings, Dr. Gilbert Kahn also teaches a Talmud *shiur*, beginning at 9:15 am. The class is studying Tractate Berachot, using the El Am edition of the Talmud. It is anticipated that the Tractate will be completed by the class towards the end of this year. Breakfast is served.

Mondays find Rabbi Bieler teaching *shiurim* both in the morning and in the evening. At 9:15 am in the new Ramaz School building at 60 East 78 Street, is a class in Parshat Hashavua. It is an in depth analysis of a significant theme associated with the Torah reading of the coming Shabbat. The subject for the evening class is Chumash and Commentaries, which is taught at the Bielers' home, 1641 Third Avenue, at 91st Street. It is a traditionally oriented learning session, focused on Leviticus XIX, Parshat Kidoshim. The Commentaries of Rashi, Ibn Ezra and Ramban are translated and discussed in their entirety.

Also taught at the Bielers' home is a *shiur* on Talmud and Rishonim on Tuesday evenings. It is a traditional *shiur* concentrating upon the 9th chapter of Bava Kama, "HaGozel Eitzim". Emphasis is placed on gaining familiarity with Talmudic terminology as well as the classification of the interpretations of Rashi and Tosaphoth.

AM HASEFER BOOKREADING CLUB SUNDAY EVENING, FEBRUARY 1

Following the rather spirited discussion led by Dr. Nathalie Friedman at the first session of the Am Hasefer Bookreading Club, participants are anxiously looking forward to session number two on Sunday evening, February 1.

At that time, Nancy Gallin will be leading a discussion of the book, *When Memory Comes*, by Saul Friedlander.

The book is described as a moving and disturbing memoir - the intellectual and emotional pilgrimage of a Jewish orphan studying to be a Catholic priest in Nazi occupied France, who later became a professor of history at Tel Aviv University. It is a conflict of cultures and identities in a post-emancipation world.

The gathering will be held at the home of Israel and Nathalie Friedman, 451 West End Avenue, at 81st Street. The apartment is 5D. New participants are welcome to join the group, and are asked to call the synagogue office: 427-1000, and tell Robert Leifert of your intention to participate.

Subsequent sessions of Am Hasefer will discuss *The Agunah* by Chaim Grade on March 29, and *Culture and Commitment - The New Relationships Between the Generations in the 1970's* by Margaret Mead on May 17.

The third course taught at the Bielers' home is offered on alternate Friday evenings. The subject is the Parshat Hashavua with a discussion of a second theme of the week's Torah reading, one other than that which was discussed in the Monday morning class. The presentation includes Talmudic and Midrashic interpretations.

SHABBAT MORNING BEGINNERS' SERVICE ENJOYS EXCEPTIONALLY FINE START

The Shabbat Morning Beginners' Service which was inaugurated on Saturday morning, January 10, was received with considerable interest and enthusiasm.

Intended for those wishing to improve their understanding of the Shabbat morning service, and geared to those with little or no background, more than twenty people attended the opening session. Emphasis is on the structure of the service and an explanation of its various prayers. The aim is for participants to improve their familiarity with the service, leading toward increased participation in the main congregation.

As a result of the first session, the participants decided to meet every other week, instead of the once a month that was previously planned. The service begins promptly at 9:30 am, and meets in the 8th floor Board Room. The Beginners' Service next meets this coming Shabbat, January 24. Next month, it will meet on February 7 and 21.

obscured. During the earlier years of State building, the secularist views largely prevailed. For many, the magic of Jewish independence was sufficient in itself, and Israel was thought of as a state like other states. But these attitudes are now being widely questioned, not least by recent immigrants, who are looking for a spiritual, and not just a physical, liberation. In these circumstances, Dr. Fisch contends, what is required is a reformulation of Israel's religious destiny and of the basic terms in which this destiny is conceived, namely the Covenant between God and Israel, as set forth in the scriptures.

Professor Fisch's three presentations follow the very warm and most enthusiastic reception he received as Rabbi Lookstein's guest when he spoke from the pulpit last year. We are pleased to welcome him back to Kehilath Jeshurun.
