SAMUEL SINGER, MORRIS WYSHOGROD AND RABBI JACK BIELER TO BE HONORED AS GROOMS OF THE LAW ON SIMCHAT TORAH

Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun is proud to announce the appointment of three distinguished members of our community as Chatanim who will preside over the celebration of the completion of the Torah this year. They will be officially inducted into their offices of honor before Musaf on Shemini Atzeret. We will rejoice with them on Simchat Torah. We shall conclude the festivities with a kiddush in their honor after services on Simchat Torah morning.

Our Chatan Torah is a distinguished Trustee of Kehilath Jeshurun and Ramaz School. He is one of the elder statesmen of our community and a fine example of devotion to Jewish causes, commitment to the well-being of worthy institutions and devotion to family.

The president of Mars Associates and of the Normel Construction Corporation, Sam Singer is a graduate of Cooper Union with a B.S. in civil engineering. He and his firm, led now by a second generation of the family, have built some of the finest schools and public buildings in our city.

Mr. Singer gave many years of service to both the Congregation and Ramaz as Chairman of the Joint House Committee. His service during building programs in the 1960s was vital in the successful completion of new additions for the synagogue and the school. He not only gave of his expertise but he also contributed his time, talent and organizational effort to the enhancement of both synagogue and school.

Sam Singer is the first to arrive in *Shul* every Shabbat and Yom Tov morning. He loves his tradition and the smile on his face

testifies to his warmth of feeling toward people, toward Judaism and toward God.

We are proud to honor this splendid Jewish gentleman along with his wonderful wife, Florence, and the lovely family that reveres both of them and follows in their footsteps.

Our Chatan B'reishit was born in Warsaw and suffered through the most difficult period of modern Jewish history. He is the only survivor of his family. His parents, sister and one brother were killed in the first liquidation of the Warsaw Ghetto in 1942 while another brother died during the uprising in 1943.

A survivor of Majdanek and Theresienstadt, he began a new life in 1947 when he arrived in the United States. He was graduated three years later with honors from Pratt Institute and just two years later married his wife Helen, who with her parents survived the Holocaust in Poland with the help of righteous gentiles.

Morris Wyshogrod has contributed generously of his time and talent in many artistic activities in behalf of the Congregation and Ramaz. He is totally committed to both institutions and there is no task that is too small or too large for him to undertake.

His greatest pride is in the fact that his son and daughter are both graduates of Ramaz and, together with his son-in-law, are carrying on the religious and cultural tradition from which Mr. Wyshogrod comes. They are also bringing the message of the Holocaust to the Jewish and general community through the efforts of Second Generation.

Our Chatan Maftir is one of the most respected members of our community. He is a brilliant teacher in the Congregation and in Ramaz where he has attracted a host of students who love to learn with him and to explore Torah and its relevance in a variety of disciplines.

Rabbi Bieler and his wife Joan have made a profound impact upon our community. In a quiet way, they serve as splendid examples of people who take their religion seriously, who grow in the way of Torah and *mitzvot* and who set an inspiring pace for all of us to follow.

Rabbi Bieler is a graduate of Yeshiva College and Rabbinical School. He holds a Master's degree from the Ferkauf Graduate School of Yeshiva. Joan recently received her Ph.D. in biology from CUNY and does research at Sloan Kettering Institute.

Of course the best thing that the Bielers have done in our community is to share with us Dani and Miriam, their delightful children, who bring all of us increasing happiness and *nachas* each year. That is the extra dividend that comes from our Chatan Maftir (the word Maftir implies something additional).

Mazel tov to all of our Chatanim and to their families. May they continue to earn the respect, admiration and gratitude of the Congregation for many happy and healthy years to come.

This will be followed by further singing and brief Torah discourses by Rabbi Haskel Lookstein and Rabbi Jack Bieler. Following this part of the evening, we will *bench* together and conclude the festivities.

We hope that the spirit of the Hakafot Unlimited will help to usher in a year of joy and happiness, unlimited, with the Torah as our inspiration.

PENITENTIAL SEASON ENDS

HOSHANAH RABBAH SERVICE OCTOBER 19, at 6:45 AM

Hoshannah Rabbah services will be held Monday, October 19 at 6:45 AM in the Main Synagogue.

Hoshannah Rabbah traditionally marks the close of the penitential season. For that occasion, the Cantor is robed in his white *kittel*. Many of the melodies of the High Holy Days are sung. The congregation makes seven circuits around the *Bimah* with *lulav* and *etrog*, and finally, of course, the *Aravot* are taken and eventually used in their customary colorful fashion.

Following the service, Sandy Eisenstat, President of the Congregation, will sponsor breakfast for all who are in attendance. It will have the traditional fare, embellished for the *Yom Tov*.

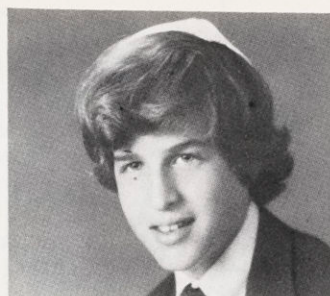
