



RABBI SAUL BERMAN TO BE SCHOLAR IN RESIDENCE ON SHABBAT OF THANKSGIVING WEEKEND

Shabbat Dinner to Precede Opening Lecture Friday Evening

The Second Annual Scholar in Residence Shabbat and Friday evening dinner will be held November 27 and 28, the Shabbat of Thanksgiving weekend. Rabbi Saul Berman will make three presentations to the Congregation on the theme: THE LIMITS OF ETHICAL RESPONSIBILITY.

Friday Evening

Following *Kabbalat Shabbat* services beginning at 4:30 PM, Friday afternoon and a Friday evening family dinner, Rabbi Berman will speak on: DECEPTION AND DISCLOSURE IN BUSINESS AND SOCIAL RELATIONSHIPS. Citing the Jewish law of *Genevat Daat*, he will question how much information a person must share with another as to his true intentions in making a business offer or even in extending a social invitation. He will also discuss how Jewish law protects a consumer as to hidden defects. Due to space limitations, only those who attend the Friday evening dinner can be accommodated for this lecture. Reservations must be made through the Synagogue office in advance.

On Saturday morning, Professor Berman will speak from the pulpit during Shabbat morning services on: RITUAL AND ETHICS. Here he will ask whether the worlds of ritual and ethics intersect meaningfully or are they distinct dimensions of the life of an individual. Is there a connection between the religious life of an individual and his ethical practices? He will also examine whether religious symbols intensify the quality of interpersonal relations.

We are pleased to once again welcome Rabbi Saul Berman to Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun. In previous visits to the Congregation, he has been received with exceptional warmth and enthusiasm.

Distinguished Chairman of the Department of Jewish Studies at Yeshiva University's Stern College for Women, Professor Berman holds three degrees himself from YU, including Rabbinic Ordination. Additionally, he received a law degree from New York University, a Master's degree in Political Science from the University of California at Berkeley, and he conducted independent research at the Hebrew University School of Law. Currently, he nears the completion of a Ph.D. from the Tel Aviv University School of Law.

Rabbi Berman served in pulpits in Brookline, Massachusetts and Berkeley, California. While on the West Coast, he taught a seminar in Jewish Law at UCLA.

Rabbi Berman has been published widely, including his article on Law and Morality in the *Encyclopedia Judaica*. He is particularly proud of his essay included in the *Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Memorial Volume*. He is currently working on a series of essays on Jewish law and contemporary social and political problems.

Rabbi Berman will join us with his wife and their three children.

BE ONE IN A MILLION

How are we to go about obtaining the freedom of over 2,000,000 Jews who live under an unpredictable regime on foreign soil, 6,000 miles out of our grasp?

Over the years, many means have been tried. We've marched, shouted, picketed, negotiated, written letters and sent cables. We've experienced success. We've endured setbacks. Once again, it's time to put ourselves on the line. Literally.

At this time of unprecedented crisis in the Soviet Jewry movement, an international effort is underway to collect 1,000,000 signatures on a petition to Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev demanding free Jewish emigration and freedom for all Soviet Jewish Prisoners of Conscience. Throughout the world, people of all walks of life are signing the petition, bringing additional pressure to bear against the Kremlin with each stroke of the pen.

Here in the metropolitan area, the Greater New York Conference on Soviet Jewry is coordinating the petition effort. We need your help to sit at tables, to circulate petitions at meetings, to have everyone on your block or in your building add their name to the 1,000,000 signatures we need to be presented to Soviet authorities when the leaders of the international Soviet Jewry movement convene in Washington, D.C. in January.

With Soviet Jewish emigration at an all time low (perhaps fewer than 10,000 this year), incarceration of refuseniks mounting at a frightening pace (more have been arrested in the past five months than in the previous five years), we cannot afford to sit back and allow "someone else" to do something about it.

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PROCEDURES FOR LIGHTING CHANUKAH CANDLES

Beginning with Sunday Evening, December 20

While the practice of gift giving has become an integral part of the Festival of Lights, the lights themselves are the principal observance of the holiday and should be highlighted as the central feature of Chanukah in the home.

The following are a few items which should be kept in mind:

1. *The Menorah* — While one Menorah suffices for the household, it is customary — and desirable — for each member of the household to light his own Menorah. This is particularly recommended for the children in the family who will take special delight in kindling their own Chanukah lamps.

2. *The Time for Lighting* — The candles should be lit as soon as possible after nightfall (30 minutes after sunset). They should be allowed to burn for at least 30 minutes.

On Saturday night at home, the candles are lit after Havdalah. *On Friday afternoon, they are lit before the Sabbath candles* and they should be large enough so that they will remain lit for about an hour and a half.

3. *Arranging the Candles* — The candles are set from the right side of the Menorah as the candle lighter faces it. Each night an additional candle is lit.

4. *Lighting the Candles* — The candles are lit from left to right — starting with the newest candle first. We begin by lighting the "Shamash." Then the blessings are recited — three on the first night and two on the other nights. After the blessings are recited, we light the candles by the flame of the "Shamash."

The reason for using the "Shamash" is in order to avoid any practical use of the Chanukah candles. These lights are holy and their sole purpose is a ritual one — to proclaim the miracle of Chanukah.

5. *Concluding Songs* — Following the lighting of the candles, we sing ha-Nerot ha-Lalu, which explains the reason for the ceremony, and Maoz Tzur, a ballad which describes in several stanzas how Divine Providence has intervened at various points in history to save us from our enemies.
