MELVIN STEIN, DR. NOAM SHUDOFSKY AND HARRY KLEINHAUS — THREE LEADERS IN THE STRUGGLE FOR SOVIET JEWRY — TO BE HONORED AS CHATANIM ON SIMCHAT TORAH

We are proud to announce that the Officers of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun have designated for the principal Torah honors of the year three members of the Congregation who have been leaders in the struggle for the freedom of Soviet Jews for the past ten years or more. Their designation this year is symbolic of the continuing commitment of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun to the well being of our brothers and sisters in the Soviet Union.

OUR CHATAN TORAH

Melvin Stein, the Chatan Torah, is a *magna cum laude* graduate of CCNY where he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He received his law degree from Yale and he is now a Vice President of the Equitable Life Assurance Society of America.

Mel, who is currently a Vice Chairman of the Greater New York Conference for Soviet Jewry, began working for Soviet Jews in 1965, before the issue was a popular one, when he founded the Center for Soviet Jewry. He is a co-author of *Courts of Terror*, the book which describes the so-called Taylor Project through which lawyers from America formally represented 19 prisoners of conscience in the Soviet Union. The leading legal scholar in this effort was Professor Telford Taylor of Columbia Law School.

Mel worked quietly and effectively to organize this effort. One of the direct results was the freeing of Sylva Zalmanson from prison in the Soviet Union. Mrs. Zalmanson now lives with her husband in

Israel.

Mel's wife, Susan, is a very supportive partner in his efforts and a wonderful member of the Congregation and the Sisterhood. She and their daughters, Ellice and Amy, both students at Ramaz, are regular worshippers, together with Mel, in our Synagogue.

The Stein family reflects through its commitments and standards a fine example of what traditional Jews can accomplish for themselves and the community.

OUR CHATAN BERESHIT

Our Chatan Bereshit, Dr. Noam Shudofsky, has a BA degree from Brooklyn College and Master's degrees from NYU and the Jewish Theological Seminary of America from which he also has a Bachelor's of Divinity. He also earned the Doctor of Education degree from the Ferkauf Graduate School of Yeshiva University.

Dr. Shudofsky became involved with the Soviet Jewry movement following his pioneering visit to Moscow and Leningrad during Pesach of 1972 together with his wife, Nechi. They formed very close relationships there with Vladimir Slepak and others. He traveled once again to the Soviet Union with his son, Binny, in February of 1977. They were among the last to visit with Anatoly Sharansky prior to his imprisonment in March of 1977. Dr. Shudofsky serves on the Executive Board of the National Conference of Soviet Jewry and has been one of the principal program advisors for both that organization and the Greater

New York Conference, on which Nechi holds the office of Secretary.

Nechi and Noam's children, Binny and Miriam Shudofsky, now residents of Israel, Rachel and Stuart Chesner, now living in Cleveland, and Leora, who is a senior at Ramaz, reflect the great commitment of their parents to Soviet Jewry, to Israel and to every important Jewish involvement. Dr. Shudofsky has distinguished himself in our community most while serving as Administrator of Ramaz School for the past eighteen years. We are proud to honor the Shudofsky family for the admirable standards which they set and exemplify for the entire KJ/Ramaz community.

OUR CHATAN MAFTIR

Our Chatan Maftir, Harry Kleinhaus, is a graduate of Ramaz and of CCNY. He also holds a Master's in Business Administration from Columbia University. He and his wife, Rosalie, the daughter of our devoted member, Mrs. Sara Mandelbaum, traveled to the Soviet Union during the summer of 1972 where they spent extended time in Leningrad, Kiev and Moscow forming relationships with many of the great Soviet Jewish heroes who unfortunately still languish in the Soviet Union.

The Kleinhaus telephone bills for several years after their visit were enormous because of the constant calls to Russia. They were a source of important information in both directions and on one occasion they served as a conduit for an important Letter to the Editor of the New York Times

ACTION ON LEBANON NEEDED NOW

In a series of mailings over the past three months, the Jewish Community Relations Council of New York has been urging communication, by mail, cable and phone, to the White House, Senators, and Congressmen to indicate support for Israel. The results in most cases have been disappointing.

It is imperative that there be a broad scale mobilization through organizations, synagogues and community councils for a massive outpouring of mail. A well organized campaign by the National Association of Arab Americans and groups like Liberty Lobby has generated mail running as much as eight to one against Israel.

Communications should stress support for Israel's actions as the only way to secure the goal common to both the United States and Israel:

1. The guaranteed removal of the PLO from Beirut and from Lebanon.
2. The removal of all foreign forces from Lebanon.
3. The reestablishment and permanent securing of a strong and independent Lebanese government.
4. The achievement of a secure northern frontier for Israel, with a guarantee that the people of the Galilee as well as all of Israel will be free from terrorist attacks.

The PLO must not be accorded the recognition it failed to achieve in two decades of terrorist activity, and must not be rewarded for turning Lebanon into the international base for terrorism. And as the *New York Times* points out, it was "only the Israeli threat that made the PLO willing to consider withdrawal."

Regardless of developments in Lebanon communications are essential. Many Senators and Congressmen believe that there is significant erosion in the Jewish Community. Several have indicated that reports of mass defections in Congress are unfounded. However, with media reports what they are and the apparent "indifference" of the Jewish Community, these representatives are not going to go out front.

There are critical issues ahead including the foreign aid bill and the proposed sale of arms to Jordan. We must make clear our solidarity with Israel now if we are to expect the support of our elected officials. Each postcard and telegram, every letter to the editor, every call to a television or radio station and especially radio talk shows counts!
