THIS SATURDAY EVENING, APRIL 9, 8:30 PM

"A Single death is a tragedy. A million deaths is a statistic." Today, nearly half a century after Stalin made that remark, the millions of victims of Hitler's final solution have become something worse: a forgettable statistic!

Today, surveys reveal that most High School students are ignorant of the Holocaust. Not only High School students in developing Asian or African countries, but young children right here in America.

A teenager can rationalize the behavior of Hermine Braunsteiner Ryan, a concentration camp guard sentenced for helping kill 100,000 prisoners at Majdanek, as follows: "When the government tells you what to do, you have to do it. She was told to do a job." This is a teenager speaking in Queens, New York, on July 1, 1981, not Germany in 1945.

The Simon Wiesenthal Center invested two and a half years in the production of GENOCIDE, a multi image presentation which tells, through the actual documented words of eye witnesses, the story of the Holocaust in a way the world can neither forget, refute, nor ignore.

In it you will be introduced to a Jewish civilization which thrived in pre-war Europe. In it, you will meet the victims of Hitler's Genocide; the generation of Jewish children who never reached adulthood; the heroes who resisted, sometimes with their bare hands; the men and women of the ghettos who withstood the test of faith and courage, and the few righteous Gentiles like Raoul Wallenberg who stood tall and fearless. You will see and hear their story as you have never heard it before.

The experience is dramatic. Compelling. Draining. Shocking. Sometimes heartrending, and even wrenching. But its purpose is to challenge and inspire. It is completely and historically accurate. The Wiesenthal Center searched the archives of the world,

uncovering new historical material. It unearthed thousands of feet of previously unseen film footage and still pictures.

Because it is such an important story both historically as well as for the future of our children, Elizabeth Taylor and Orson Welles volunteered their time, their voices and their considerable talent in narrating GENOCIDE.

RAMAZ CHORUS TO FEATURE TWO ORIGINAL PIECES

IT'S MAY 1, 1983 DO YOU KNOW WHERE YOUR BRETHREN ARE?

For the Jews of the Soviet Union, 1982 was a most dismal and discouraging year. There was the closing of the gates of emigration, Prisoners of Conscience languishing in Soviet prisons, labor camps and in the fearful eyes of Soviet Jewish children harassed by KGB agents.

IN ALL OF 1982, ONLY 2,688 JEWS WERE PERMITTED TO LEAVE THE SOVIET UNION. THIS REPRESENTS A DROP OF 95% IN THE PAST THREE YEARS FROM THE OVER 51,000 JEWS WHO LEFT IN 1979.

The Soviets have not only brought a halt to emigration, they have also made every step in the long visa application process more frustrating and difficult. Soviet authorities require that every Soviet Jew who wishes to emigrate must obtain an official "invitation" from a "first degree" relative in Israel. The Soviets only place parents, children and spouses in this "first-degree" category and exclude Aunts, Uncles, Cousins and even siblings. Now, officials confiscate such "invitations" from the mail. Many of those who do receive invitations find they have been arbitrarily barred from submitting requests for exit visas. Many OVIR (emigration) offices are now open only a few hours per week and others have been closed entirely. If one does succeed in applying to emigrate, he may have to wait up to two or three years for an answer. Today that answer is likely to be

negative. The Soviets often do not even bother to justify refusals.

BECAUSE OF SUCH BUREAUCRATIC OBSTACLES, AND BECAUSE WOULD-BE EMIGRANTS ARE INCREASINGLY SUBJECTED TO HARASSMENT AND ECONOMIC PRESSURES, FEWER AND FEWER JEWS ARE APPLYING TO EMIGRATE.

The Soviet Jewish emigration movement sparked a revival of Jewish pride and culture in the USSR based on the hope of returning to the Jewish homeland. If the possibility of emigration fades, the Jewish cultural renaissance may fade away as well. We cannot permit that to happen to our brothers and sisters in the Soviet Union.

Every man, woman and child should feel it his or her personal obligation to be present at SOLIDARITY SUNDAY ON MAY 22 demonstrating his and her understanding of the needs of Soviet Jews and, particularly, the plight of those who have been refused visas or who are now in prison.

The Soviet government and Soviet Jews will be watching to see what kind of reaction American Jews have to the severe drop in emigration. The most important barometer for that reaction is Solidarity Sunday. Everyone who comes will have a share in demonstrating that we care. We need everyone.

The 111th Annual Meeting of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun will be held this year on Tuesday evening, May 3 at 8:00 PM. It will begin a new chapter in the life of KJ which has been serving this community since its founding here in 1872.

Kehilath Jeshurun has the privilege this year of inducting more than fifty new families into membership, continuing a pattern of growth that we have now enjoyed for several years. New officers and trustees will be elected, new associate trustees will be appointed and a tribute will be paid to those retiring from office.

We are pleased to note that a good number of members who are observing important anniversaries of their affiliation with the synagogue will be honored. At the same time, the assemblage will take the opportunity to memorialize those of our Congregational family who were called to their

eternal reward during the past year.

The third annual Memorial to Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein will be delivered this year by Carol Newman. A woman who grew up in our Congregation, Carol attended Ramaz from the pre-school through her graduation from the Upper School. She has, along with her family, remained active in the Kehilath Jeshurun family. We are certain the tribute will move each of us who knew and loved the late Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein and be interesting and educational to all who have joined the KJ family since his passing in 1979.

We are also pleased this year to have the opportunity to pay tribute to Rabbi Haskel Lookstein on the occasion of his twenty-fifth year in the Rabbinate of Kehilath Jeshurun. Rabbi Lookstein, who continues the family line in our congregation that started with his great-grandfather, Rabbi

Moses S. Margolies — "the Ramaz" who served this congregation for thirty years in the early part of the twentieth century and continued with his father, Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein, who was our Rabbi for fifty-six years from 1923 to 1979 has given the congregation and Ramaz School magnificent direction for the past quarter of a century. His impact on the American and, indeed, World Jewish Community is felt constantly through his outstanding example of dedicated leadership.

SPECIAL REPORT: CRIME AND THE ELDERLY

In an effort to make our membership more aware of means of preventing crime and becoming victims, we print here notes furnished to us by the Burden Center for the Aging - Crime Victims Assistance Programs. In this fact sheet, we deal with basic crime prevention techniques and discuss precautions you can take to protect yourself and your family.

Most felony crimes occur during the daytime, and the worst day for crime is Friday. The majority of felonies occur on the public street or thoroughfare.

ON THE STREET

Keep in mind that the way you look projects a certain image to others. People who appear confused, tired, or lost in thought look like easy prey. Walk confidently and assertively, keep your eyes and ears open, and do not stop to chat with strangers. If someone is following you, don't be afraid to let that person know you're suspicious.

Walk towards a busy area — a store, a crowded street — not your apartment!

PERSONAL SAFETY IN CITY STREETS

If you are out alone at night, try to avoid unfamiliar neighborhoods.

Be thoroughly familiar with your own neighborhood. Know the locations of police call boxes, which stores or restaurants are open all night, and which buildings have round-the-clock doormen.

Do not take shortcuts through parks, tunnels, deserted buildings, parking lots or alleyways.

Walk in the street if you think it is safer than walking on the sidewalk of a particular block.

Be alert when you are out walking; notice the other pedestrians on the street.

Notice who passes you. A mugger will often pass his victim, quickly turn, then grab the victim from behind.

Walk briskly, with a sense of purpose. If you do, a mugger may be inclined to avoid an encounter.

Change directions as often as possible if

you think you are being followed.

If a person continues to follow you, run. If you are chased, continue running and begin to shout or scream.

Carry a whistle: Keep it accessible (attached to a keychain is a good idea). If you are in danger, use the whistle immediately to attract attention.

Always have your door keys ready — but hidden — before you reach the vestibule leading to your apartment.

The Police Department further suggests that since the odds are against you in an attack, give up your valuables without a struggle. However, in a situation where you feel your life is in danger, fight. But fight dirty! Aim for the eyes, the abdomen, and the groin. Do not attempt to hit your assailant on the head, because you probably won't injure him or her. Use any sharp object such as a pen, pencil, keys, or an umbrella tip as a bayonet in soft, sensitive areas. Try to delay your assailant with these tactics, then run!

ON PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

Try to avoid deserted street corners when waiting for a bus — the extra walk to a busy intersection may be well worth your time.

When waiting for a subway or train in an uncrowded station, stand near the token or ticket booth. Try to ride in the front car in sight of the conductor if possible.

Falling asleep on the train or bus will leave you practically defenseless against criminals. Keep awake and hold your possessions firmly.

To avoid muggers or pickpockets, women should carry their purses close to their bodies and keep their fingers over the clasp or zipper, and men should keep their wallets hidden. Never display a lot of cash or credit cards.

SAFEGUARDING YOUR HOME

Taking precautions will also help you at home. For your personal safety:

- * Be especially alert in hallways, elevators, and basements; half of all

muggings take place in these areas.

- * Do not enter your home if the front door is open or unlocked.
- * Never let strangers into your home. (Carefully examine identification cards of service people).
- * Keep your doors locked at all times.
- * **CONTACT THE CRIME PREVENTION OFFICER IN THE PRECINCT FOR A FREE HOME SECURITY SURVEY. THEN INSTALL THE SECURITY DEVICES THAT THE OFFICER RECOMMENDS.**

BEWARE OF SCAMS

Elderly New Yorkers in particular lose millions of dollars to "con-artists" and swindlers. These criminals tend to prey on those who have worked hard to save a "nest egg" for retirement and other needs.

You could be approached; typically the con-artist will try to persuade you to participate in an innocent-looking plan, taking advantage of your trust and generosity to strangers. You may even be promised a cash reward for helping! **BUT BEWARE!**

Many of these schemes only empty your wallets and bank books. If you believe that someone is trying to swindle you, contact the police by calling your local precinct or the special fraud squad at 374-6910.

You should be suspicious if a stranger comes up to you on the street or calls you at home to ask that you:

- * Withdraw any money from your bank for any purpose;
- * Give or lend money or possessions which you are told will be returned or exchanged for some service;
- * Extend an invitation to your home for the purpose of making repairs, a phone call, or in order to get a glass of water.
