YOM HASHOAH HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE DAY

**SERVICE TO BE FOLLOWED BY SHOCKING FILM OF FARRAKHAN
AT MADISON SQUARE GARDEN MONDAY EVENING, MAY 5, AT 7:30 PM**

The observance of Yom HaShoah-Holocaust Remembrance Day has, in recent years, gained a considerable recognition as an important date on the Jewish calendar. In communities throughout the world and especially in Israel and America, congregations, schools, and other organizations and institutions have marked this day with seriousness and commitment. We are proud that Kehilath Jeshurun has been in the forefront of this effort as more than 500 people now gather in our Main Synagogue each year.

The Yom HaShoah program at KJ traditionally begins with a memorial candelighting ceremony in memory of the 6 million Jews who perished during the Holocaust. This year, we have once again asked members of our congregation and their families who are survivors of the Holocaust as well as the adult children of survivors and young children of survivors to light these memorial candles. A listing of the participants and their history is listed elsewhere in this bulletin. It is important, however, for us to realize that the Yom HaShoah service and program is not intended only for the direct survivors of the Holocaust. Each of us who lives today is a survivor and we, as a people, are responsible for one another. It is incumbent upon each Jew to observe Yom HaShoah and we, therefore, urge all in our community to join with us on Monday evening, May 5, at 7:30 PM.

The program itself will include readings from Holocaust literature, special memorial prayers and appropriate selections performed by the Ramaz Lower School chorus under the direction of Carol Goldberg.

We are the mourners of those who died in sanctification of God's name. Please join us in marking the yahrzeit of the 6 million men, women and children — our brethren.

DIANA AVIV TO DISCUSS DILEMMA FACING SOUTH AFRICAN JEWS AT SEUDAH SHLISHIT ON MAY 10

The efforts of the South African Jewish leadership for most of the past century have been aimed principally at attempting to eliminate anti-Semitism and obtain for the Jewish community benefits available to other white South Africans. As a result, the Jewish community is viewed by black South Africans as part of the white ruling minority, and the Jewish community has been less than forthcoming in tangible steps to spell this image according to Diana Aviv, Director of National Affairs and Community Services for the National Council of Jewish Women.

Integral to the position of the South African community is the relationship between South Africa and Israel. In 1952, when Israel voted against apartheid in the United Nations, South African Jews faced increased anti-Semitism from the ruling white population. Since 1967, Israel has become an important trading partner of South Africa, especially as a supplier of military equipment, and the condition of the South African Jews has improved notably.

The South African Jewish community is today facing very serious problems. What can or should be the Jewish community's response to apartheid? What will happen to the Jewish community? Can the community expect to bear more than its share of the brunt of the disestablishment of apartheid, both in terms of financial loss and physical wellbeing? Is the orderly abolition of apartheid possible?

Diana Aviv will address questions such as these at a congregational Seudah Shlishit sponsored by the Men's Club on Saturday, May 10, following Mincha services which begin at 6:45 PM. Ms. Aviv was born and educated in South Africa, has studied its history and sociology extensively both in and out of South Africa, and she has a first hand knowledge of the conditions in South Africa from her work as a social worker there.

On behalf of the Men's Club, Asher Levitsky, Chairman of this program, has invited the entire community to what promises to be a stimulating afternoon on a subject of great importance to the Jewish community not only in South Africa but here in America and in Israel as well.

REV. LOUIS FARRAKHAN — A HITLER OF OUR TIMES?

On October 7, 1985 when Jews throughout the world were celebrating Simchat Torah, the Rev. Louis Farrakhan was speaking to a packed, standing room only crowd at Madison Square Garden which actually flowed out into the street around Penn Station on his views of America and of Jews.

This talk followed a series of appearances as part of a nationwide tour which, with minimal publicity, drew rather substantial crowds in Los Angeles, Washington, Atlanta, and Detroit in the range of seven to fifteen thousand each. Under the guise of presenting a program of economic independence for blacks, Farrakhan preaches a dream of viciously anti-Semitic and anti-American diatribes which, on occasion, make his audiences jump to their feet and applaud according to the Washington Post.

Having gained wide recognition during Jesse Jackson's presidential campaign, Farrakhan attracts a broad spectrum of the black community including public officials, professionals, families with young children and his base — Black Muslims. At most rallies, the average age of those in attendance is about thirty.

Funding for Farrakhan's organization — POWER, or People Organized to Work for Economic Rebirth — comes from a \$5 million interest free loan from Libyan Dictator Muammar Qaddafi. In fact, Qaddafi, as keynote speaker via satellite at Farrakhan's 1985 convention called on Black Members of the United States Army to desert and form their own army to "destroy white America." Farrakhan has never rejected Qaddafi's appeal.

It is important for us as Jews to know who our enemies are. It is important to come on Yom HaShoah and see a videotape of Farrakhan at Madison Square Garden and to see the crowd around him. We will see our enemy in action that night and we will then better know how to respond to this vicious challenge before us. We must combat this now.

Now it is our turn to glory in his freedom and celebrate with him by greeting him in a thunderous explosion of support on May 11. And, while celebrating, we must remember his words: "Our fight must go on."

Aside from the release of Shcharansky and the Essas family along with certain other leading refuseniks this year, the overall Soviet Jewish emigration remains virtually nonexistent. In all of 1985, only 1,140 Jews were granted exit visas, this compared to the more than 50,000 who were permitted to leave in 1979. There are still 400,000 Jews left in the Soviet Union who have begun the emigration process. 20,000 Jews have already been denied permission to reunite with their families or repatriate to Israel. At Solidarity Sunday we have the opportunity to reaffirm our commitment to those left behind. The largest turnout ever is necessary in order to show Soviet authorities that we have not given up the struggle to attain freedom for ALL SOVIET JEWS.

We are also proud to note that our member and Ramaz School Administrator, Dr. Noam Shudofsky is serving as co-chairperson of Solidarity Sunday this year. This should help insure an interesting and well run program and we in turn should lend support to his efforts and commitment.

**HERZOG RAPS U.S.
FOR ADVISING AGAINST
TRAVEL TO MIDEAST**

President Chaim Herzog publicly criticized the Reagan Administration for the "advisory" to members of Congress and other U.S. public figures to avoid travel to the Mideast in the immediate future because of threats by Libyan leader Col. Muammar Qaddafi.

Addressing a Bond's conference in Jerusalem, he said: "I welcome all the delegates, but when I see the American delegation I am pleased to note that there are still some Americans who are not prepared to take orders from Qaddafi as far as travel plans or anything else is concerned."

Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin told a meeting of the Foreign Press Association that the State Department caution amounted to giving in to terrorism.

At least two United States Senators, Gary Hart of Colorado and Bennett Johnston of Louisiana took the State Department warning seriously and cancelled trips to the Middle East which were to have included stop overs in Israel. Another Senator, however, Steven Symms of Idaho visited Jerusalem this week and told the Hebrew University audience, "I am not prepared to have Qaddafi as a travel agent?"

We encourage that kind of thinking and because we do Kehilath Jeshurun is organizing under the leadership of Rabbi and Mrs. Lookstein a trip to Israel this summer for a two week period from July 13 — 28. We urge our membership to contact the synagogue office now in order to get more details and plan to join the Looksteins on this very special trip intended to be of interest to those who have previously been to Israel but appropriate to those for whom this might be a first time visit.

The trip is a five star deluxe tour and the price is \$1859 per person/double occupancy. It will be a warm and exciting visit together for members of the KJ community.

A wonderful wife to a remarkable husband, Mrs. Zukerman spoke several languages fluently. She was a graduate pharmacist from the Columbia School of Pharmacy more than 50 years ago before professionalism among women was fashionable.
