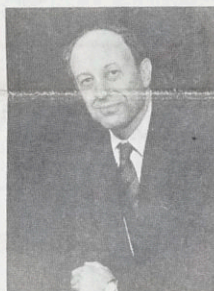
Chatan Torah

Walter Koppel has been a Trustee of Ramaz for many years. He served as President of the Parents' Council. During his tenure the role of President changed to a far more active and involved one, with a great impact on the life of the school. He was also one of the leaders in the creation of the Morris and Ida Newman Educational Center on East 78th Street which houses the Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Upper School.

Born in Hamburg, Walter escaped from Berlin in 1941 having lost his mother and four brothers and sisters at the hands of the Nazis. He arrived in America at the age of 13 without any knowledge of the English language.

He is managing director of Jaret International, a food and candy importing firm. He has done a great deal to help promote Israeli foods in the United States.

Together with the late Michael Barany, he was one of the pioneers in the creation of our Sukkah meal program. For many years he ran that program and his organization book is still the bible for all those who run it each year. He was first President of Mid-Pac, a political action committee in which many of our congregation are involved. He also served as President of the Men's Club. His wife, Yvonne, served as President of the Sisterhood and has directed the KJR Judaica Shop for the last two years, giving it a very solid base as a retail establishment. She and her mother, Mrs. Elsie Frohman, were involved in the chupah project and also the Torah cover project.

The Koppels' two sons, Steven and Michael, are both graduates of Ramaz. Steven and his wife Lynette are both lawyers and they have been actively involved in creating a *chavurah* of young people in our community.

Larry Kobrin served for five years as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Ramaz and he is now the general Chairman of the 50th Jubilee Celebration of the School. He himself was a student in the second graduating class of the high school, from which he went on to Columbia College and Columbia Law School at both of which he earned very high academic honors.

A member of the law firm of Cahill, Gordon and Reindel, he is acknowledged as one of the leading real estate lawyers in New York. It is as a volunteer, however, that he has made an extraordinary mark in the Jewish community. He is Associate Treasurer of Federation-UJA and he served for three years as Chairman of its Distribution Committee, which disburses all of the Federation's funds.

A member of the Board of Directors of Y.U.'s Wurzweiler School of Social Work, and a member of the American Board of Overseers of Bar-Ilan University where he is also a former officer, Larry has served as National Vice President of the Union of Orthodox Congregations of America and he has also been Vice President of our sister synagogue, The Jewish Center.

His wife, the former Ruth Freedman, aside from bringing three wonderful Ramaz students into this world: Jeffrey, Rebecca and Debra, is the President of the Joint Passover Association. She has transformed that agency into a magnificent philanthropic organization.

Larry and his family, including his parents and his brother and sister-in-law who are all cherish-

ed members of our congregation, have been involved in the life of Ramaz for almost 50 years. It is therefore particularly fitting to honor him on this occasion.

Stephen J. Kule has four sons in Ramaz, one in each division of the school: Pre-School (Matthew), Lower School (Jonathan), Junior High School (Michael), and High School (Andrew). That alone would entitle him to this honor on such a special year.

But there are many more reasons. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of both the congregation and Ramaz and he is one of the Chairmen of the 50th Anniversary Dinner which will be held at the Marriott on Sunday, January 18. He served in a similar capacity last year.

He and his wife, the former Wilma Dane, who comes from a family of synagogue and community builders, have had a major role in so many activities in our community. Steve served as President of the Couples Club and he transformed the Club in the process. He has served twice as Chairman of UJA and together with Wilma they have opened their home to the most successful UJA fund raising event ever held in our community. They are both Founders in the Building Fund of Ramaz and they are Master Builders at Yeshiva University. Steve also serves on the Board of Jewish Education and on the Board of Mid-Pac.

The Kule family is a fine example of commitment to Judaism and to Jewish communal life. May their future continue along the same lines as in the past.

We are very proud of our Chatanim this year. We feel that as we honor them they also honor us. We hope that they will continue to merit the approbation of the community for many happy and healthy years to come.

Hoshanah Rabbah services will be held Friday, October 24 at 6:45 AM in the Main Synagogue.

Hoshanah Rabbah traditionally marks the close of the penitential season. For that occasion, the Cantor is robed in his white *kittel*. Many of the melodies of the High Holy Days are sung. The congregation makes seven circuits around the Bimah with *lulav* and *etrog*, and finally, of course, the *Aravot* are taken and eventually used in their customary colorful fashion.

Following the service, Benjamin Brown, President of the Congregation, will sponsor breakfast in the Sukkah for all who are in attendance. It will have the traditional fare, embellished for the *Yom Tov*.

The entire community, men, women and children are invited to join us at 6:45 AM.

A Confidential Insider's Report From The Israeli Embassy

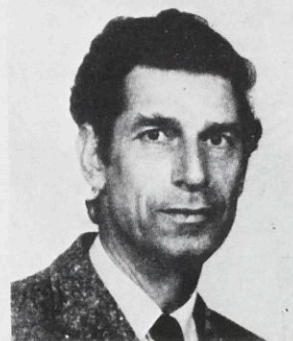

MIDTOWN JEWISH COMMUNITY TO SPONSOR BENEFIT CONCERT

Sunday, November 16 at 4:00 PM

In an effort to benefit the Midtown Board of Kashrut, the Mid-Manhattan Mikveh and Hat-zoloh Ambulance Corps, the Cantors of nine orthodox synagogues and three orthodox day schools in the community will put on a concert on Sunday afternoon, November 16 from 4:00 PM-6:00 PM.

The featured artists include our own Assistant Cantor, Mayer Davis and the Ramaz Lower School Chorus. Our own Cantor, Avrum Davis, is serving as co-chairman of this function with Rabbi Marc Schneier of Park East Synagogue. Rachell Gober is chairing the KJ effort for the program.

In addition to our own contingent, other artists include Cantors Peter Barron of The Jewish Center; Moshe Geffen of Park East Synagogue; Sherwood Goffin of Lincoln Square Synagogue; Joseph Malovany of Fifth Avenue Synagogue as well as the choruses of Manhattan Day School and Park East Day School.

This is the first time in recent memory that the midtown Jewish community has come together in such a demonstration of communal solidarity. In addition to KJ and Ramaz, other supporting institutions include Congregation Ohav Shalom, Congregation Orach Chaim, Fifth Avenue Synagogue, The Jewish Center, Lincoln Square Synagogue, Park East Synagogue, Spanish and Portuguese Synagogue, and the West Side Institutional Synagogue, in addition to Manhattan and Park East Day Schools.

Tickets are priced at \$20 per person. Members of the congregations are also invited to serve as sponsors for the event at \$100 entitling them to two admissions, preferential seating and admission to a post concert champagne reception.

The concert will take place at The Jewish Center, 131 West 86 Street. Tickets may be obtained by forwarding checks to the synagogue office indicating that they are for the concert.

JEWISH BOOK MONTH TO BE CELEBRATED WITH FIRST N.Y. JEWISH HERITAGE BOOK FESTIVAL

The first Annual New York Jewish Book Festival will take place November 9 and 10 at the Seventh Regiment Armory at Park Avenue and 67th Street. The contribution that Jewish authors have made to world literature will be the focus of the two day book fair. Festival hours are Sunday, 10:00 AM-8:00 PM, and Monday, 10:00 AM-6:00 PM. Participants will range from such personalities as Ambassador Binyamin Netanyahu, Theodore Bikel and Nobel Laureate, Isaac Bashevis Singer to the Antiquarian Booksellers' Association, Simon and Schuster and the Jewish Museum.

Close to 100 publishers, booksellers, academic presses and cultural institutions will display and sell works in English, Hebrew and Yiddish by Jewish authors and on Jewish topics. There will be illustrated lectures, poetry reading, discussion presentations and talks about writing for children.

A number of authors will be present. Tickets for the author programs are free but must be reserved in advance.

The YIVO Institute of Jewish Research will mount a special show at the fair exhibiting rare holdings from its libraries and archival collections. Continuous stage entertainment for the whole family will also take place on both days including storytellers Devora Menashe and Penina Schram, as well as performances by Mike Burstyn, Safam, Moshe Yess and the Zamir Chorale amongst others.

Admission to the festival is \$5.00 while senior citizens and children under 12 will be admitted for \$3.00. For advanced tickets to the author presentations send a self addressed stamped envelope to: Jewish Heritage Book Festival, 130 East 59 Street, New York, NY 10022 (Suite 1205).
