A MESSAGE FOR THIS SEASON FROM 56 YEARS AGO

As we prepare for the High Holy Day season, it occurred to me that it would be good to share with you the contents of an ethical will written and left for his children by the late William Schulder. It was shared with me by his granddaughter, Diane Schulder Abrams at the time of her daughter Rachel Abrams' Bat Mitzvah last June. Its message is worthy of our attention as we begin the period of introspection and self-improvement that we hope will come from s'lichot, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

March 28, 1932

"To my dear children,

"You know how hard I worked and tried my utmost to give you the best I could afford in food, shelter and education and to lead an honest, clean and respectable life.

"Therefore I plead with you to uphold my wishes as follows:

"1. Be strict Sabbath observers. Your homes should be strictly kosher and you should otherwise uphold the Jewish religion and traditions.

"2. Honor, respect and take care of your mother as long as she lives, as she is your best friend in the world.

"3. Be honorable in your dealings commercially and socially.

"4. Be respectful to all - never consider yourself greater than the next man.

"5. Try your best not to insult anyone.

"6. Talk and treat everyone as kindly as possible.

"7. Keep together; be friendly with one another.

"8. Pass all this along to your children and see that they are brought up as Orthodox, honorable and respectful Jews.

"This being really fatherly advice, I hope you will follow these rules and God will help you.

"P.S.: I hope you will keep this letter and read it once in a while, but at least on the day of my *yahrzeit*. Please give a copy to each child."

SHABBAT SHUVA DRASHA; TOWARD A DEFINITION OF JEWISH ROLE MODELS September 17, 6:10 PM

Rabbi Haskel Lookstein will deliver the annual Shabbat Shuva Discourse this year on Saturday afternoon, September 17th, following Mincha services at 6:10 PM in the Main Synagogue. His subject will be "TOWARD A DEFINITION OF JEWISH ROLE MODELS".

In the German *minhag* there was a designation of honor called *Chaver*. When somebody had that title it indicated that he was a *talmid chacham*, a God-fearing Jew, a personification of *chesed* and a person who served as a role model for how a Jew ought to live.

In our Congregational family there was one such person who had that honor. He was the

father of the late Alfred I. Kahn who was known as *Heh-Chaver Naphtaly*.

Rabbi Lookstein will devote his Shabbat Shuva discourse on Shabbat afternoon, September 17th, to an halachic and aggadic description and analysis of what a *chaver* ought to be. In so doing he will offer guidelines for all of us on the qualities that ought to be developed by Jews who are serious about their Judaism. The discussion will have much relevance for our lives during this penitential season and for the year ahead.

We extend an invitation to men, women and children to attend the Shabbat Shuva discourse this year.

THIS IS THE SEASON

ELUL

The forty day period beginning with Rosh Chodesh Elul and continuing through Yom Kippur has historically been a time of repentance and forgiveness for the Jewish people. These days correspond to the time when Moses received from God the second set of Tablets. These second tablets serve as an indication of God's capacity for forgiving, specifically His forgiveness for our sin with the Golden Calf. Therefore, numerous customs have been instituted throughout the generations to enable us to take advantage of this opportunity for divine forgiveness.

One of the most beautiful and moving of these customs is the sounding of the shofar each morning after the Shacharit service. The blasts of the Shofar serve as a divine alarm clock, awakening all of us to the need for self-evaluation and improvement.

Similarly, we continue the custom of reciting, as a community, the entire Book of Psalms during this period of the year. It is a custom that was initiated by Rabbi Joseph Lookstein, of blessed memory, and helps to sensitize us to the messages transmitted by the Psalmist.

Finally, beginning with the week which precedes Rosh Hashanah we recite Selichot prayers each morning. The essence of these prayers is the recitation of God's Thirteen Attributes of mercy upon which we call during this period of penitence. We also recite the Vidui (Confessional) during the Selichot prayers and in so doing begin our petition for God's forgiveness.

ROSH HASHANAH

Rosh Hashanah, the beginning of our year, brings with it all of the resolutions for spiritual improvement that are part of a new beginning. The tone of the day is determined by a mixture of feelings of trepidation and celebration. We remain aware of this day as the beginning of God's judgement, and yet we enter into it with the confidence that God will accept our prayers and grant us forgiveness. It is a time which has traditionally been associated with the synagogue service, and yet there are many beautiful ceremonies that take place at home.

At the Table

The festival is ushered in by the lighting of candles over which the special festival blessing is recited. The special benediction "Shehecheyanu" is added.

After the reciting of kiddush and the washing of hands, a "motzi" is made over two round challahs (symbolizing the cycle of the year) and the bread is dipped into honey before it is eaten. The symbol concerning a sweet year is readily apparent. The use of a round challah and the dipping of the bread into honey is continued for the entire High Holy Day season, ending with Hoshanah Rabbah.

On the first night of Rosh Hashanah, an apple is dipped into honey. Before tasting the apple, the blessing over fruit is recited. After tasting the apple, a special prayer is recited: "May it be Thy Will to grant us a good and sweet year."

On the second night, it is customary to wear a new garment and to have it in mind when the blessing "shehecheyanu" is recited as part of the kiddush. In addition, a new fruit, not previously enjoyed this season, is eaten. Before eating the fruit, the blessing over fruit is recited.

Tashlich

The Tashlich service takes place on the first afternoon of Rosh Hashanah which this year falls on Monday. This ceremony takes place along the banks of a river or some other body of fresh water. Appropriate prayers are recited as part of this mystical custom, indicating our desire to cast off all sins from our person and correct our ways.

In our community, we customarily gather for Tashlich before Mincha, at 5:30 PM, near the 85th Street entrance to the reservoir path in Central Park, or at 86th Street and the East River in Carl Shurz Park.

Rosh Hashanah Greetings

On Rosh Hashanah, upon leaving the Synagogue, all extend the High Holy Day greeting:

CANTOR AVRUM DAVIS, NORMAN BULOW AND DR. ADAM N. BENDER TO BE HONORED AS CHATANIM ON SIMCHAT TORAH



We are proud to announce in the name of the officers of the congregation the designation of Cantor Avrum Davis, Norman Bulow and Dr. Adam Bender as *Chatanim* for this coming Simchat Torah. They will be inducted into their honorary offices on Monday, October 3rd, Shemini Atzeret. They will be called to the Torah on the following day.

Chatan Torah

The highest Torah honor of the year will go to Avrum Davis who has been Cantor of Kehilath Jeshurun for the past fifteen years.

Chazan Davis was born in Jerusalem in the Old City and started singing at the age of nine with such great cantors as Rosenblatt, Kwartin and Herschman. Before he arrived in the United States in 1942 he was a member of the *Haganah* in the pre-state.

Cantor Davis studied at the Metropolitan School of Music and at the Chofetz Chaim Yeshiva. He served as Cantor at Congregation Shaarei Tefillah in Far Rockaway for twenty five years where he established a reputation as a cantor's cantor. He produced a series of records and tapes which serve as models for *chazanim* around the world. He pioneered a new style of cantorial music which combines the beauty of the traditional *chazanut* with a concentration on congregational singing and maintaining the pace of a service that is suited to modern Jews.

He and his wife Esther have become cherished members of our community. They are the proud parents of four children and five grandchildren. Their son Mayer has been our Assistant Cantor for the past two years; their son Ruby is a Trustee of our congregation. Many other members of the family and friends have been attracted to KJ because of the Davises.

Both Esther and Avrum came from musical and rabbinic families. Their contributions to the spiritual life of KJ and other synagogues are a reflection of that background. We are honored to be able to honor our Chazan this Simchat Torah as a tribute to him and to Esther for all that they have done and as a prayer for their continued health and wellbeing in the years ahead.



Chatan B'reishit

Norman Bulow is one of the most beloved members of the congregation. Together with his wife Tova he has made a major impact on the KJ community since they moved from Clearwater, Florida about a dozen years ago.

A graduate of New York University with a degree in Finance and Marketing, Norman has served as Executive Vice President for Sales at the Seagram Company and now is with the investment banking firm of M. J. Whitman and Co. The father of three sons and one daughter and the proud grandfather of three granddaughters and one grandson, Norman has had great nachas and joy from his family.

A past president of Congregation Beth Sholom in Clearwater, Norman served KJ as President of its Men's Club and as Treasurer of the congregation. Together with Tova they have maintained an open home to people in this community and they have played a leading role in Adult Education, *Chevra Kadisha*, *Bikur Cholim* and just about every important act of chesed which can be performed for the community.

One of his children, Shoshana and her husband Rabbi Asher Berkowitz are graduates of Ramaz and they now have a daughter, Rivka at Ramaz with Talia, please God, soon to follow. Rabbi Berkowitz is on the faculty of the Ramaz Upper School and runs the Beginyan here at shul. We are happy and proud to be able to honor the head of such a wonderful family by designating him as *Chatan B'reishit*. In addition to everything else it is the gift of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun to Norman and Tova who, please God, this year will celebrate their thirty-sixth wedding anniversary.

Chatan Maftir

Traditionally, the youngest of the honorees is designated as *Chatan Maftir*. We are happy to bestow that honor on a relative newcomer to our congregation who in just a few short years has made a real difference in the life of this community.

Dr. Adam Bender was born in this neighborhood, raised in Great Neck and, according to a family tradition, is a direct descendant of the sainted Rabbi Nachman of Bratslav.

The son of the late Dr. Morris B. Bender, a renowned neurologist, Adam is himself an outstanding neurologist and serves as Associate Professor at the Mount Sinai School of Medicine where he directs the Neuromuscular Clinic. He completed college and medical school, internship and residences in internal medicine and neurology at Columbia University.



His association at Mount Sinai brought him the best possible gift—Paula, a pediatrician who has made a wonderful reputation for herself both professionally and personally in this community. Together Paula and Adam have been marvelous examples of religious growth and ever increasing development in Jewish knowledge and commitment. The three Bender children include Melissa who became a Bat Mitzvah at KJ, David who is entering the First Grade at Ramaz, and Shira, a future Ramaz student.

In their six years at KJ both Adam and Paula have become active members of the *Chevra Kadisha*. Adam was President of the Couples Club and has served on the Board of the Men's Club in addition to being a Trustee of the congregation.

His most dramatic service to our community is the extraordinary way in which he sounds the *Shofar* for us during the High Holy Days.

We are all moved by the Bender family. They represent models of young Jews who are constantly growing in their understanding and observance of *Torah* and *Mitzvot*. It is a privilege for us to honor them.

THE FAST OF GEDALIAH

On the day after Rosh Hashana, Wednesday, September 14 we observe the fast of Gedaliah, in memory of the assassination of Gedaliah ben Achikam, the governor of Jerusalem following the destruction of the First Temple in 586 BCE. The death of Gedaliah marked the final hammer blow, as it were, to the first Jewish Commonwealth.

The fast day is observed from before dawn until nightfall which is at 7:41 p.m.

BLESSING THE CHILDREN ON YOM KIPPUR EVE

There is a beautiful custom that a father—or mother—bless his or her child on the eve of Yom Kippur after the meal before the fast. The blessing is much more detailed than the simple Biblical priestly blessing which is given to the children on Friday evening before *kiddush*. We would recommend to you that you bless your children every Friday but that, in particular, you bless them on Yom Kippur eve. The text of the blessing and a translation appear below.

FOR BOYS:

"May the Lord make you as Ephraim and as Menasheh"

FOR GIRLS:

"May the Lord make you as Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah"

May it be the will of our Father in Heaven to place within your heart love and reverence for Him. May you revere God all the days of your life so that you will not sin. May He bless you with the desire to study Torah and observe His commandments. May your eyes look straight ahead, your mouth speak wisdom and may your heart be filled with reverence. May your hands always be involved in the accomplishment of Mitzvot and may your feet run to do God's bidding.

May the Almighty grant you righteous sons and daughters who will also occupy themselves with Torah and Mitzvot all the days of their lives. May He grant you moral substance and livelihood—morally, graciously and abundantly—

and may you never have to depend on human help. May your profession always allow time for service to God.

May you be inscribed and sealed in the Book of Good and Long Life together with all the righteous of Israel.

YOM KIPPUR A Day of Self-Denial

The Day of Atonement is, among other things, a day of self-denial. In addition to avoiding food, drink, washing, and the use of lotions and oils, Jewish tradition calls for refraining from the wearing of leather shoes.

The reason for this provision is that wearing a proper pair of shoes makes one feel complete and well-groomed. It is precisely the absence of that feeling of completeness which is called for on the Day of Atonement. Through this mood of moderate self-denial, we are moved to prayer, penitence, and wholesome introspection.

May we request our worshippers take a step in the direction of Jewish tradition by arranging for a pair of non-leather footwear for Yom Kippur this year. An ample selection is available in any shoe store. We think you will find that conforming with this practice will help you to derive more from the most meaningful day on the Jewish calendar.

We call to the attention of our worshippers that the sounding of the *Shofar* on Monday and Tuesday mornings of Rosh Hashanah will take place at approximately 10:00 A.M.

Please plan to be in attendance at services by that hour so that you will be present for this important religious observance.

JNF EMERGENCY DRAWS STRONG RESPONSE

BAR MITZVAH BOY LEADS THE WAY

The response to Rabbi Lookstein's letter to the KJ/Ramaz family asking people to contribute to the JNF in order to plant trees to replace those which have been destroyed by the enemies of Israel, has been most gratifying. While we have not reached our \$50,000 goal, we are well over half way toward it.

Perhaps the most extraordinary response came from Gregory Fragin, a young man whose bar mitzvah was scheduled for Monday, Labor Day, September 5. He is the son of Patrice and Gary Fragin, and the brother of Michael who is entering the sophomore class at the Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Upper School and, currently, a student in the 8th grade at the Westchester Day School. Here is the letter which he wrote to the JNF:

"Dear Sirs,

To think that so many of the trees and forests that have been planted by my parents, grandparents, cousins, friends and by myself over the last 40 years are being destroyed by systematic arson is a devastating fact. These trees have always represented the past, present, and the future of the State of Israel. I cannot permit this to happen. I must react.

"I am becoming a Bar Mitzvah on September 5, 1988. In honor of each of the guests that will help celebrate my Simcha I would like to plant a tree in Israel. I am enclosing a check for \$1025.00 in order to plant 205 trees.

"I will be in Israel for Yom Kippur and Succot. I hope it would be possible for me to plant some of those trees.

"Please credit Ramaz High School with the money.

"I know we will be successful.

SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE MAKING GREAT STRIDES

MASSIVE FOOD DRIVE SET FOR KOL NIDRE NIGHT

The KJ Bulletin is proud to announce that the congregation's Social Action Committee is seeing the results of its efforts in a number of new areas.

The clothing drive, begun after Passover, has made donations to a number of organizations that distribute garments directly to those in need. Several of these organizations have expressed particular appreciation for the quality and cleanliness of the donations coming from KJ reporting that most contributions from our synagogue can be given to those in need without further cleaning or repair. In the three month period between April 15 and mid-July, more than 6,000 garments were distributed. The contributions continue to pour in.

Food items are being distributed though on a much smaller basis to a number of organizations, including Project Ezra, the Yorkville Pantry and through efforts of the Unitarian Church which regularly feeds homeless people in their facilities. Also, many individuals in need of food come to our door and are able to select items from the food basket.

ON THE EVE OF YOM KIPPUR, PRIOR TO KOL NIDRE SERVICES ON TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 20, EACH MAN, WOMAN AND CHILD IS ASKED TO BRING AT LEAST ONE UNOPENED BOX OR CAN OF FOOD SO THAT WE MAY DISTRIBUTE THESE ITEMS TO THE POOR AND HOMELESS OF NEW YORK. Barrels will be set up in the entrance lobby of the synagogue so that as congregants enter the building, they may drop their packages right into these receptacles. Last year's effort met with outstanding success. We want to do even better this year and thus we ask *everyone* to participate and to bring as many items as you can. We prefer that the items be kosher in order to serve Jewish needs to the greatest extent possible.

A number of members of the congregation will be participating in the Dorot food distribution project to elderly Jewish people

on the West Side. It will be held on Sunday, September 18, at 11:00. Our KJ group of volunteers will meet at the Studio Elementary School, 124 West 95 Street. They will be given a brief orientation and assigned a person to visit for about an hour. Participants can go in pairs if they so wish. Please let Doris Travis know of your interest in this by calling her in the evening at 755-5376.

BIKUR CHOLIM APARTMENT

A Bikur Cholim apartment is now available through a joint effort with the Lenox Hill Bikur Cholim project. The apartment is at 131 East 78th Street and can accommodate up to eight people. KJ is contributing to the financial support of this facility and Sue Robins is serving as one of the coordinators of this important effort in our community.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

A network of concerned volunteers on the committee is reaching out to our community with friendly visits, telephone calls and hospitality. During the summer months we have been able to formalize this program.

The Carter Burden Center For The Aging at 445 East 85th Street has been in touch with the congregation and vice versa and will be pleased to hear from volunteers for their efforts from KJ. They have provided us with applications for volunteer work with them and background information on the Center. Those interested should get in touch with Ms. Barbara Stevenson at 879-7400 and indicate you are a member of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun. Please let us know of your involvement with them as well.

A special subcommittee under the leadership of Sue Javitt is spearheading a voter registration drive in time for the fall elections. More is written about that on this page.

DO JEWS REALLY VOTE?

Recent studies astonishingly reveal that there are today at least one million Jews not registered to vote in this country.

Exceptionally high rates (around 90%) of voter registration and election day turnout were a distinguishing characteristic of Jewish political behavior in the United States for decades. For a variety of reasons, including a high level of education, civic pride, belief in democracy, and gratitude for the right of full participation in American national life—a right historically denied them—Jews have been among the nation's most dedicated participants in the electoral process.

Much to the surprise of political and Jewish experts, however, registration and voting rates of American Jews have fallen sharply in recent years. In cooperation with the Synagogue Council of America, the coordinating agency for the national Conservative, Orthodox and Reform Jewish movements, our congregation has joined a nationwide effort by synagogues to reverse this trend.

The Social Action Committee's voter registration effort is trying to aid each unregistered congregant and community friend to become a part of the electoral process. The New York primary is September 15th, and election day is November 8th. The final day to register is Thursday, October 13th. If you have moved since the last election or if you have not voted in the last four elections, you must reregister at this time. Registration forms are available through the synagogue office.

Please keep in mind two special groups of voters, youth and elderly. Many of our sons and daughters need extra encouragement to register and vote. And many of our senior citizens need special assistance to fulfill their civic responsibility. Please help us to involve every voting age member of our congregation. The committee will arrange for people to help senior citizens who may need assistance in getting to the election polls.

Participating in the democratic process is a privilege and responsibility we all share. Let's make sure that our synagogue community is proudly represented on election day!
