### MAYER DAVIS ELECTED CANTOR OF **CONGREGATION KEHILATH JESHURUN**

We are pleased to announce that at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun Mayer Davis, son of our Cantor Emeritus Avrum and Esther Davis, was elected Cantor of our congregation.

Born in New York City and raised in Far Rockaway, Cantor Davis learned his chazanut from his father and also from cantorial studies at the Cantorial Institute of Yeshiva University. He holds a B.A. in Jewish studies from Queens

Cantor Davis began his cantorial career at the age of 17, when he conducted his first High Holy Day services. He has held various cantorial positions for over 13 years. Mayer Davis is also a person of diverse musical talents. He has performed as guest soloist with the Zamir Chorale of New York and he was co-founder and lead vocalist of TAYKU, a pioneering contemporary Hebrew music ensemble which performed extensively in concert halls and universities throughout the United States.

An innovative and creative song writer, he has performed musical recitals for various Jewish organizations and he has a diverse repetoire of Jewish music which he has performed for enthusiastic audiences throughout the New York Metropolitan area. He is currently working on a new recording featuring his own original Jewish music as well as the best of new contemporary works. The album is planned for release in the spring of

## ESSENTIAL FOR AMERICANS TO 'SHOW UP'IN ISRAEL NOW

American Jews are correctly, outraged by the Arab rock throwers and knife wielders in the Holy Land who attack worshippers at the Western Wall and innocent civilians in the streets.

We are angry at a United Nations that condemns Israel unfairly and ignores the atrocities of Israel's enemies. We are disappointed in the Bush administration's readiness to join in that condemnation in the interest of maintaining the coalition of the nations of the world against a vicious and dangerous tyrant in Iraq.

All of our rallies have addressed these awesome problems. We must maintain vigilance and pressure in the weeks and months ahead to deal with these vital issues.

But there is another problem that we have thus far ignored and which threatens to dwarf all of the others in importance. That problem is the disappearance of American Jews from the streets of Jerusalem and all of Israel during the past three years and, particularly, for the past three months.

Those few who have returned from spending the High Holy Days season in Israel report that the hotels are empty. At one point during Sukkot there were nine guests in the Jerusalem Hilton, where once one practically needed to know a government minister to get a room during a festival season. We hear reports that one-third of all the hotel workers in Israel will be laid off by Nov. 1. That represents the loss of at least 1,500 jobs.

The issue, however, is far more than economic. It is the morale of our brothers and sisters who know they are repudiated by much of the world-they now fear they are also being abondoned by American Jews. That fear is potentially much more destructive than Arab rock throwers, U.N. blame throwers and even United States guilt throwers. The feeling that Israelis are isolated even from the Jewish community here is potentially so demoralizing as to raise the possibility of hopelessness in Israel itself.

If, in fact, we leave the streets of Israel empty of American Jews, then we are handing the Arabs their greatest victory. If we are afraid to go on missions, and to pray at the Kotel, to see the beautiful sights of the Holy Land, what do we expect of Israelis? When will they turn around and call us cowards, traitors or, even worse, bystanders as were our fore bears 50 years ago.

The terrible irony of our timorous mood here is that the facts of life in Israel are vastly different from what American Jews fear. I was in Tel Aviv during the last three days of August, when the talk of gas masks and storing provisions was at its height. Friends questioned me about why I was going at such a dangerous time.

However, I felt absolutely no danger. I looked at the crowds on the beach, the sunbathers around the pool in the Tel Aviv Hilton and all of the other people going about their business of working or touring.

The reality in Israel is so different from the false images conjured up on TV and in the newspapers. The reality is, quite clearly, that it is much safer to walk on any street in Israel than on Park Avenue and Fifth Avenue in New York.

It is up to you and me to change this distorted perspective about Israel. It is up to us to show other American Jews that a visit to Israel is joyous, uplifting, inspiring and very safe. The only way to do this is by going. You and I must drop whatever we are doing and go to visit.

That is why Congregation Kehilath Jeshuran and the Ramaz School have launched Operation L'Hitraot with a mini-mission to Israel. It will leave Nov. 10 and return Nov. 16. We urge other congreations and schools either to join us or, better yet, to form their own mini-missions. Give up a week and gain a land.

If you had the flu for a few days, your business or profession would not cease to exist. Instead of the flu, then, fly to Israel on El Al and see and be seen in the Holy Land.

There are some problems about which we can only scream but cannot solve. The perception of American Jewish abandonment of Israel, however, is one problem that is immediately solvable.

A prominent motion picture personality once said: "Ninety percent of life consists of just showing up." Perhaps we might say that 90 per-cent of what we can do for Israel right now is to just show up. *L'hitraot!*

#### KJ RALLIES FOR ISRAEL -SUNDAY, OCTOBER 21

A mass rally for Israel and Jerusalem was held in the Main Synagogue of the congregation on Sunday afternoon, October 21, at 5:00 o'clock. The synagogue was filled with over 1,000 persons while about 700 gathered outside to hear the rally on loudspeakers on East 85th Street.

Among the speakers at the rally were Attorney General Robert Abrams; Comptroller Elizabeth Holtzman; Manhattan Borough President Ruth Messinger; Consul General Uriel Savir; Rabbi Mark Angel, President of the Rabbinical Council of America; and Kenneth Bialkin, Chairman of the Jewish Community Relations Council of New York.

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Rabbi Lookstein, who presided at the rally spoke stiringly about the three reasons for this rally. First, to stand up and express ourselves in the face of dangers to Israel; second, to protest the falsification of facts and conditions by members of the media who mislead the American public about what is actually going on in Israel; and, third, to answer the treachery of the United Nations and to take public exception to the position taken by the United States in supporting a resolution which condemned the Israelis who responded to an attack by Arab rock throwers at the Kotel without condemning the perpetrators of the action who had desecrated our holiest place on earth.

The Rabbi then indicated that there is a fourth reason for the rally, namely, to launch Operation L'Hitraot (described elsewhere on this page). He called upon the assemblage to join us in our mission of November 16-21 or, preferably, to form their own missions in their own communities and to show up in Israel to see and be seen.

One of the highlights of the rally was a performance of Jerusalem songs by the Chorus of the Rabbi Joseph H. Lookstein Upper School of Ramaz, led by Caroll Goldberg. The rally came to a conclusion with a beautiful song presented by Cantor Mayer Davis, a song of love for Jerusalem and loyalty to Zion.

Synagogues from the mid-Manhattan community supported the rally fully and sent their congregants to be part of the assemblage. It was community action at its best, led behind the scenes by the JCRC. In the face of terrible pressure on Israel and unfair condemnation of our people, New York Jewry stood up and protested in this rally and in similar rallies throughout the metropolitan area and said to the world: "We will not be silent in the face of such injustice."

#### TIME IS RUNNING OUT FOR SYRIA'S IEWS

There are still 4,000 Jews living in Syria. These Jews cannot leave Syria without leaving behind their loved ones and large amounts of money. Two Syrian Jews have been imprisoned for almost two years with no clue as to why they were put there or when they will be tried.

Syria's practice of torturing its prisoners, harboring terrorists, and denying its citizens basic human rights, prompted the United States government to label Syria officially a "terrorist nation". After each of the Israeli wars of 1948, 1967, and 1973, Syrian Arabs rioted against Syrian Jews, injuring persons and destroying property. Syria still considers itself to be at war with Israel.

Because of the events in the Persian Gulf, the United States is now considering an alliance with Syria. The time is running out for Syria's

They are challenged to reach their highest potential and are accepted and valued as human beings on their own terms and at their own levels.

The age range of Mishkon residents is from birth to 21. Children attend special education classes in public school or Hebrew day school.

The New Toy Collection is a project of the Social Action Committee. Children of the congregation up to Bar Mitzvah age have been asked to select one unopened and unused present that they have received for their birthday and give it to a child with special needs whether he be retarded, handicapped, poor, homeless or a recent immigrant. # PROCEDURES FOR LIGHTING CHANUKAH CANDLES

### Beginning with Tuesday evening, December 11

While the practice of gift giving has become an integral part of the Festival of Lights, the lights themselves are the principle observance of the holiday and should be highlighted as the central feature of Chanukah in the home.

1. The Menorah-While one Menorah suffces for the household, it is customary-and cesirable-for each member of the household to light his own Menorah. This is particularly recommended for the children in the family who will take special delight in kindling their own Chanukah candles or oil lamps. It is preferable to fulfill the mitzvah of lighting the Chanukah Menorah by using either oil lamps or wax candles. An electric Menorah may be placed in the window in order to fulfill the precept of publicizing the Chanukah miracle to those who are passing on the street.

2. The Time for Lighting-The candles should be lit as soon as possible after nightfall (30 ninutes after sunset). They should be allowed to burn for at least 30 minutes.

On Friday afternoon, December 14 (the 4th night) they should be lit before the Sabbath andles and they should be large enough so hat they remain lit for about an hour and a half. These special longer lasting candles are available at "Classics By Doina in the bynagogue lobby. You will need five (5) candles or each menorah.

3. Arranging the Candles-The candles are set into the Menorah from the right side as the randle lighter faces it. Each night an additional randle is placed into the Menorah.

4. **Lighting the Candles** The candles are lit from left to right as the candle lighter faces the Menorah-starting with the newest candle first. We begin by lighting the "Shamash". Then the blessings are recited-three on the first night and two on the other nights. After the blessings are recited, we light the candles by the flame of the Shamash.

The reason for using the Shamash is in order to avoid any practical use of the Chanukah candles. These candles are holy and their sole purpose is a ritual one-to proclaim the miracle of Chanukah.

5. **Concluding Songs-**Following the lighting of the candles we sing *Ha-nerot Ha-lalu* which expains the reason for the ceremony and *Maoz Tzur*, a ballad which describes in several stanzas how Divine Providence has intervened at various points in history to save us from our enemies.
